

It has been a momentous past few weeks on the national and global stage.

With the murder of 49 people in the Pulse nightclub in Orlando on 12th June, the murder of Jo Cox MP in Birstall on 16th June and the continuing gross violence in many countries including Syria, Turkey, Sudan, Burundi, Afghanistan, we have been bombarded with images that portray the evil of our human violence.



Overlapping all this was the last days of campaigning before the EU Referendum on 23rd June and all that has happened since the result became clear early on 24th June.

Certainly the manner of the campaign left much to be desired. The former Archbishop of Canterbury, Rowan Williams, wrote: "A campaign fought on both sides without a clear vision of either national or international identity, reverting again and again to manipulative, irrelevant anecdotal appeals to self-interest, is a poor advertisement for the democratic process as currently operating."

Both the campaign and much of the response to the result has exposed some of the worst of our human nature. Anna Rowland of Durham University said, "The fault lines of the referendum result run through the human heart, not simply between classes and communities."

How are we to respond to all that is going on around us? In particular, what should a Christian response look like?

Hear again the wisdom of Rowan Williams: "The challenge is how to restore the possibility of genuinely educated debate; which is a substantial challenge given the overwhelming dominance of populist rhetoric in most of the British press, whose effect on the debate has for the most part been corrosive. Grass roots political literacy has to be built; the voices of properly independent civil society (frequently silenced by warnings from regulators and the like in this debate) - from churches to local citizens' groups, from NGO's to universities (if they can ever free themselves from their present servitude to functionalist ideology) - have to be liberated. Above all, class and regional divisions have to be addressed without colluding with reactive, anxiety-driven populism.

"The Christian imperative is surely to tackle fears at their root and hold up the model of a truly interdependent world in which the welfare of each is inseparable from the welfare of all, nationally and globally; the model of the Body of Christ."

The Christian gospel, the Good News of God revealed in Jesus, is a message that speaks directly into the messiness of the human situation. God is Love and true love cannot but seek to bring hope out of despair, new life where all can seem lost. The drama of salvation is the story of God coming into the world to walk alongside us and lift us up when we fall.

Angus Ritchie, the Director of the Centre for Theology & Community, said, "It requires a patient engagement; listening and building relationships. Such patience was of course the practice of Jesus himself – not lecturing the people of his own day from afar on the need to welcome Samaritans, but living and working in Nazareth for thirty years before living out that costly hospitality."

This engagement and building relationships is not to be just between people of the same ethnic, religious or cultural background. The rise in hate crimes following the

Referendum result is to be wholeheartedly deplored. Thankfully there are interreligious bodies that are speaking out and their voices need to be heard.

Our Area Bishop, Toby Howarth, is a member of the Christian Muslim Forum and with Bishop Paul Hendricks, Shaykh Ibrahim Mogra and Anjum Anwar published the following statement: "Whatever our position on the EU Referendum, abusive, insulting or threatening behaviour towards Eastern Europeans, Muslims and other minority communities is unacceptable. We affirm the value of positive relationships across religious and cultural boundaries and encourage people from all parts of society to work together for human flourishing and our common life."

The future is uncertain and there is good reason for appropriate concern. But there is also good reason to believe and trust that God's gift to the world of Love, Joy, Peace will win the day.

The Bishop of Exeter wrote the following prayer for reconciliation following the referendum:

Eternal God, Light of the nations,

in Christ you make all things new:

guide our nation in the coming days through the inspiration of your Spirit,

that understanding may put an end to discord and all bitterness.

Give us grace to rebuild bonds of trust

that together we may work for the dignity and flourishing of all;

through Jesus Christ our Lord.

May the God of Peace bless you.

Following two very successful visits of Michael Hardin to St Andrew's in November 2013 and September 2014, we are delighted that Michael will be back again this coming September.



The General Synod of the Church \bigoplus THE CHURCH of England

The Church of England's 'parliament,' the General Synod, will meet in York on Friday 8th July until Saturday 9th July. A key focus during these two days will be how the Church's vision for a growing, confident and hopeful church can be put into action through the Renewal and Reform Programme.

The Church's governing body will discuss the vision and narrative for Renewal and Reform and key changes to legislation to make innovation and change easier for those engaged with church life at all levels. The Legislative Reform Measure will make it possible to amend or repeal some Church legislation by means of Orders approved by the Synod. Several other proposed pieces of new legislation will consolidate existing provisions into a more user-friendly form and repeal provisions which are obsolete. There will also be an opportunity for Synod to discuss a report from the Development and Appointments Group updating Synod on the progress of their work on the training and development of senior Church leaders.

The Synod will also discuss a report on "A Church of England Vision for Education" with reference to the establishment of a foundation for education and leadership. The Synod will also examine Annual Reports from both the Church Commissioners and the Archbishops' Council.

Aside from legislation linked to Renewal and Reform, Synod will also consider legislation which gives effect to two private members' motions which were previously passed by the Synod. The amending legislation relates to forms of vesture requirements for ministers and providing for those who have taken their own life to be buried in accordance with the normal burial service.

Synod will also be addressed by Bishop Ralf Meister of the German Evangelical Church, who will look ahead to the anniversary of the Reformation in 2017. It will receive a report from the Archbishop of York on his 6-month pilgrimage.

The formal proceedings of the Synod will end on Saturday 9th July.

Following a service on 10th July at York Minster, members of the Synod will take part in Shared Conversations on Scripture, Mission and Human Sexuality - following the regional sessions that concluded earlier this year - until Tuesday.

Dales jam in full swing

Showing of film *'Closure'* 6.00pm Sunday 4th September in the Parish Rooms

Closure is a film inspired by true stories of Iranian Christian martyrs. The loss of a family member, desire for revenge, and struggle to forgive is not a foreign concept to the director of "Closure" Joseph Hovsepian and lead actor Andre Hovsepian, as they had to confront their own father's brutal death by extremist groups in Iran in 1994. *Closure* is a story of discovering redemption in the midst of struggle, and is based on recent events taking place in Iran.

Synopsis

An unexpected event unravels as a group of Iranian intelligence officers raid Dr. Dariush's home,



where hundreds of bibles and Christian resources are exposed. Following the discovery, Dr. Dariush is immediately murdered in cold blood. Cyrus, the doctor's son, who witnesses his father's cruel death, is forever changed as a result of his father's murder. Filled with resentment and bitterness, he is unable to cope with the past and push forward. At the turn of events, Cyrus finds himself face to face with his father's killer, now leaving him with a unique opportunity to seek vengeance or redemption.

The film is 62 minutes long. We will then spend some time in conversation together reflecting on the films, before saying Night Prayer. The evening will finish by 8.00pm

15th July St. Swithun (or Swithin) - saint for a rainy day

St. Swithun is apparently the saint you can blame for rainy summers. It is said that if it rains on his special day, 15th July, it will then rain for 40 days after that. It all began when Swithun was made Bishop of Winchester in 852 by King Ethelwulf of Wessex. It was an important posting: Winchester was the capital of Wessex, and during the 10 years Swithun was there, Wessex became the most important kingdom of England.



During his life, instead of washing out people's summer holidays, and damping down their spirits, Swithun seems to have done a lot of good. He was famous for his charitable gifts and for his energy in getting churches built. When he was dying in 862, he asked that he be buried in the cemetery of the Old Minster, just outside the west door.

If he had been left there in peace, who knows how many rainy summers the English may have been spared over the last 1000 years. But, no, it was decided to move Swithun. By now, the 960s, Winchester had become the first monastic cathedral chapter in England, and the newly installed monks wanted Swithun in the cathedral with them. So finally, on 15 July 971, his bones were dug up and Swithun was translated into the cathedral.

That same day many people claimed to have had miraculous cures. Certainly everyone got wet, for the heavens opened. The unusually heavy rain that day, and on the days following, was attributed to the power of St Swithun. Swithun was moved again in 1093, into the new Winchester cathedral. His shrine was a popular place of pilgrimage throughout the middle ages. The shrine was destroyed during the Reformation, and restored in 1962. There are 58 ancient dedications to Swithun in England.

Editor: Some famous hymns of praise and thanksgiving were written in astonishing circumstances of pain and distress. Now Thank We All Our God is no exception....

The story behind the HYMN: Now Thank We All Our God

Now thank we all our God With heart and hands and voices, Who wondrous things hath done, In whom His world rejoices; Who, from our mother's arms, Hath blessed us on our way With countless gifts of love, And still is ours today.

Oh may this bounteous God Through all our life be near us, With ever joyful hearts And blessed peace to cheer us; And keep us in His grace, And guide us when perplexed, And free us from all ills In this world and the next.

All praise and thanks to God The Father now be given, The Son, and Him who reigns With them in highest heaven, The one eternal God, Whom earth and heaven adore; Fur thus is was, is now, And shall be evermore.

Martin Rinkart

The joy and serenity of this hymn are staggering, when you learn the circumstances in which is was written. Martin Rinkart was a pastor at Eilenberg, Saxony, during the terrible Thirty Years' War (1618-1648).

As a walled city, Eilenberg offered some protection to the inhabitants. No wonder that political and military refugees of all sorts poured into the city, making it dangerously overcrowded. Soon the water supply was fouled, the sanitation overwhelmed, and the food ran out – leaving people famished and diseased.

In 1637 a terrible pestilence swept through the city, killing some 8,000 people, including Rinkart's beloved wife. By that time Rinkart was the only minister left in Eilenberg, because the others had either died or fled for their lives. Rinkart alone conducted the burial services for 4480 people, sometimes taking as many as 40 to 50 funerals a day!

Eilenberge was besieged and overrun three times – once by the Austrian army and twice by the Swedes. When a Swedish general demanded the town pay him 30,000 thalers. Martin Rinkart pleaded that the impoverished city could never meet such a levy, but the general scorned him. At that, Rinkart turned to his companions and said: 'Come, my children, we can find no mercy with man; let us take refuge with God.' On his knees there and then, Rinkart led his friends in a fervent prayer and in the singing of a hymn. The Swedish commander was so moved that he decided that the levy be not 30,000 thalers, but instead 1,350 thalers.

Somehow, out of the hell of the Thirty Years War came this lovely hymn of peace and total trust in God. Martin Rinkart had had to dig deep into his faith to survive, and the result was utter, serene dependence on God – despite chaos and destruction all around

A message from Tim and Kate Lee, our mission partners

Dear Friends,

Thank you so much for being on this amazing, exciting journey with Jigsaw and us, it is an incredible journey which is confronting poverty and building individual children's lives by love.

Jigsaw

Tim and I have been faithfully supported by many churches and many of you to do the work of Jigsaw for the last 13 years and we

praise God for you and for CMS who administrates this support and walks with us on this Journey.

Over the last few years the support for Jigsaw has remained very strong but the support to CMS to pay Tim to do the work of Jigsaw has gone down significantly. CMS can only pay Tim from the money that comes in for his support which means they are now only able to pay him 2 days a week to do the work of Jigsaw which is difficult for us as a family. Tim's Jigsaw work, (both leading, nurturing and governing Jigsaw Philippines and the work for funding, resourcing and prayer support through Jigsaw UK) is a full time job plus evenings and weekends but the gifts to CMS for his pay only allows them to pay him two days a week. Tim does some supply teaching to help the income but his work for Jigsaw needs at the very least for him to work three days a week in the Jigsaw office. Our prayer and hope is that the funds going to CMS to support Tim can increase enough to pay Tim an extra day so he is paid three days a week which would really help our monthly finances.

CMS have told us that in order to pay Tim another day a week plus pension and NI the income to CMS (if gift aided) needs to increase by £650 per month. This email is going to all Jigsaw supporters which is 13 churches and 400 people so please don't think this is a personal email to you or feel pressured by it as we know so many of you give to the work of Jigsaw and CMS already. We **don't** want anyone to give anymore who is already giving to Jigsaw or to CMS unless feel lead to, but we would ask if you could help us by doing one or two of the following.

- 1. **Pray:** Please pray that God will work to increase the money going to CMS so that Tim may be paid 3 to do the work of Jigsaw. Please pray that God may increase the numbers of Jigsaw supporters, bring in new churches or groups or in other ways make this possible to happen.

The Birds in Your Garden



RED KITE



After an absence of many decades The Red Kite is now seen frequently in the skies over many parts of Yorkshire. It's an elegant bird, soaring on long wings with its long forked tail twisting as it changes direction.

Both Buzzards and Red Kites are raptors which use their broad wings for soaring and as such are not immediately distinguishable if only seen occasionally. Red Kites are larger than Buzzards with longer wings and the characteristic long forked tail that makes them so agile in flight. Apart from the usual weight difference the sexes are similar. John Harding's photograph shows a Red Kite from below – the most common view we get!

Adult red kites are sedentary birds, and each nesting territory can contain up to five nest sites. Both males and females build the nest using twigs with a lining of grass or other vegetation. They typically add sheep's wool, which they collect along with other unusual items such as pieces of plastic and sometimes even items of clothing: they are true kleptomaniacs! These plastic piecess can have dire consequences though, as they can form a waterproof membrane in the nest, causing pooling of water and failure of eggs or death of the young.

Red kites eat mainly carrion, being too weak-footed to kill any prey much bigger than a small rabbit. They also feed on chicks, small mammals and invertebrates such as beetles and earthworms, particularly in spring. They hunt by flying low over open country, using their forked tails to steer. Live prey is usually caught by surprise rather than speed, although they do sometimes make fast, twisting chases.

They prefer hilly country with woodland and open grassland occur close together, and have the often spectacular habit of forming communal winter roosts between when they assemble in large numbers.

<u>Red kites</u> are the closest bird we have to a vulture in Britain, and as scavengers, are particularly susceptible to poisoning. Illegal poison baits set for foxes or crows are indiscriminate and kill protected birds and other animals. There have also been a number of incidents of Red Kites and other raptors being targeted by wildlife criminals.

In Victorian times, shooting game birds such as pheasant and partridge became a popular pastime. Gamekeepers also thought that Red Kites killed their game birds and farmers thought that they killed their lambs. Although this was not true, (and still isn't!) Red Kites were shot and poisoned until, by the end of the 19th century,



they had disappeared from England and Scotland.

Only a few pairs survived in the valleys of mid-Wales, but under close protection, by 1992, there were 79 nesting pairs and by 2000, there were over 250 pairs. The recovery of the kites in Wales was very slow, probably because rainfall was high and the countryside did not provide much food.

More recently this Welsh population has been supplemented by re-introductions elsewhere in the UK. Between 1989 and 2010 some Welsh birds and several hundred from Spain Sweden and Germany were released in around a dozen sites throughout the UK, all

The very successful Yorkshire Red Kite Project was the fifth in the sequence and began at Harewood Estate in 1999 with 68 birds from the Chilterns being relocated.


A sighting of the first Red Kite in London for 150 years was reported in *The Independent* in January 2006
