#### Dear friends,

These new faces will bring fresh opportunities to develop the relationship between church and school. We also have a new face at helm editing this magazine. After many years of faithful service as editor Lesley Hudson has now passed the reigns over to Chris Wright. On behalf of all the readers of The Bridge I would like to express sincere thanks to Lesley for all her hard work.

New faces, and many familiar faces, have, of course, been adorning our television screens and newspaper front pages in recent weeks as we have enjoyed (I hope) the 4-yearly spectacle of the Olympic Games. Enhanced by the stunning scenery around Rio de Janeiro, the pictures and stories of great sporting achievements have drawn us to marvel at the form and beauty of the human body at its athletic best. By achievements I am not just thinking of those who ended up standing on the podium to receive an Olympic medal. What about those who came 4th and so only just missed out (some by an astonishing 3/1000th of a second) on the ribbon around the neck? What about those who came last, yet were able to cross the line cheering and waving to the crowd, ever thankful of the opportunity to take part in this great global event?

Sport has the ability to bring people together and break down barriers that traditionally divide and keep people apart. Sport has the ability to point to important core values that can unite the people of the world. As we look back on the Olympics and forward to the Paralympics, the words of the Olympic creed are worthy of reflection:

"The most important thing in the Olympic Games is not to win but to take part, just as the most important thing in life is not the triumph but the struggle. The essential thing is not to have conquered but to have fought well."

It is the taking part; it is the struggle; it is the having fought well. These,

ultimately, are the important attributes that speak of how well we engage with our own life-journey.

Part of the life-journey must include regular times of rest, relaxation and refreshment: holidays, or holy-days. Such times allow us to step aside from our usual routine and give a different quality of attention to ourselves and those around us.

During part of my holiday this summer I enjoyed reading a book titled *Beauty Will Save the World*. The author, Brian Zahnd, suggests that "we live in a day when convenience and practicality have largely displaced beauty as a value". He suggests that the Church is not immune to this shift: "Even salvation is commonly viewed in a scientific and mechanistic manner and presented as a plan, system, or formula".

The challenge, Zahnd says, is for the Church to hold on to the teaching of Jesus as spoken as in the Beatitudes and so become a viable alternative to current-day political, commercial and religious power, thereby achieving what these powers promise to provide but fail to deliver.

Zahnd offers the challenge that in our life together as a community, and in our individual life, the need is constantly to ask ourselves, "Is this beautiful? Is this thought beautiful? Is this attitude beautiful? Is this action beautiful? Does it reflect the beauty of Christ?"

If the word we are about to speak, or the action we are about to carry out, is not beautiful then we should abandon it, because it is not of God and will only harm the other and ourselves.

As you travel on through the coming days and weeks, keep this question foremost in mind: "Is it beautiful?"

Beauty will indeed save the world.



Michael will also preach at the 10.00am Parish Communion on Sunday 25th.





#### **Showing of film 'Closure'**

#### 6.00pm Sunday 4th September in the Parish Rooms



**Closure** is a film inspired by true stories of Iranian Christian martyrs.

The loss of a family member, desire for revenge, and struggle to forgive is not a foreign concept to the director of "Closure" Joseph Hovsepian and lead actor Andre Hovsepian, as they had to confront their own father's brutal death by extremist groups in Iran in 1994.

Closure is a story of discovering redemption in the midst of struggle, and is based on recent events taking place in Iran.

An unexpected event unravels as a group of Iranian intelligence officers raid Dr. Dariush's home, where hundreds of bibles and Christian resources are exposed. Following the discovery, Dr. Dariush is immediately murdered in cold blood.

Cyrus, the doctor's son, who witnesses his father's cruel death, is forever changed as a result of his father's murder. Filled with resentment and bitterness, he is unable to cope with the past and push forward. At the turn of events, Cyrus finds himself face to face with his father's killer, now leaving him with a unique opportunity to seek vengeance or redemption.

The film is 62 minutes long. We will then spend some time in conversation together reflecting on the films, before saying Night Prayer. The evening will finish by 8.00pm

#### **News from the PCC**

#### Churchyard Boundary Wall

Following the work carried out in the spring to make the wall at the south east corner of the churchyard safe, Craven District Council has been investigating different options for the repair and rebuilding of the wall. The process to agree a suitable design specification is complex, involving engineers from the District Council and North Yorkshire County Council and possible contractors.

At the time of writing, a way forward has not been agreed. Consequently, it is likely to be some time before the wall is repaired.

#### Church Car Park Gates

Following the vehicle collision with the gates in December 2015 which necessitated the gates being dismantled, it is expected that the rebuilding of the gates will commence during the week commencing 5th September. During the period of the rebuilding access through the gates for both vehicles and pedestrians may be restricted.

Inspire us to grow our churches and be beacons of light and love for the people and communities of our diocese.


Help us all to lead our lives, in word and deed, in the name of Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

#### The Reverend Ian Busby, 1932 - 2016

Ian Busby, who was Vicar of Kildwick from January 1975 until December 1993, died on 17th August. He will be sadly missed by many in our community.

Ordained in 1964, Ian served a first curacy in Bedale in the (then) Diocese of Ripon, with a second curacy in Stevenage in the Diocese of St Albans. In 1971 he became Vicar of St Mary's, Shepall in Stevenage, leaving in 1974 to become Vicar of Kildwick.

During his 18 years as Vicar here lan's ministry was greatly appreciated. News of his death on the church Facebook page led to many comments saying what a kind and gentle person lan was. People have also remembered with fondness lan's wife Shirley who died in 2009.



Following Ian's early retirement on health grounds, he and Shirley moved to live in Farnhill. Whilst living here Ian was able to continue to serve as a volunteer chaplain at Airedale Hospital. Unfortunately, his Parkinson's Disease eventually forced a full retirement and after some time living in Currergate Mews in Steeton, Ian spent his last years living in Beanlands Nursing Home, Glusburn.

We give thanks for his life. May he rest in peace and rise in glory.



#### **Church Clock: Thanks And Update**

A short note to express our thanks for the very kind donations we have received towards the cost of the clock repairs, and also to update everyone about where we are with the repairs, and when we can expect them to take place.

When the clock had its annual inspection in May serious defects were found. Parts of the clock barrel were loose, and the thread of the screws holding



it were stripped, and therefore ineffective. Because this part is integral to the winding system, this could fail and damage the clock, and, more seriously, the person winding the clock. So the engineer made it safe by letting the weights run down and, clearly, left instructions that it remain so until such time as repairs had been undertaken. The total cost of the repairs will be £894.00.

Once this became known, many individuals, the Kildwick Parish Meeting and the Farnhill Parish Council have all kindly made donations towards the cost. We are delighted that the sum raised through these gifts amounts to £795.00. We would like to say a huge 'thank you' to you all and are immensely grateful for your generosity.

The process of clock repair is complicated by the fact that the barrel has to be disconnected and taken to the Cumbria Clock Company workshop near Penrith. For that to happen, we have to have a Faculty (Ecclesiastical Planning Permission).

For this to be granted, we have to explain the circumstances (not a problem!), and in law, we are required to display a notice about this for 28 days to enable any objections to be lodged. We do not expect any objections, but have to comply with the provisions. Once the 28 days are ended on 1st September we can then formally seek permission for the repair, and do not anticipate any problems with this.

Readers may also have noted that, recently, the clock not only did not strike, but also had stopped. We do not know why it has stopped, and will ask the Clock Company to repair it when they undertake the other work, since we expect this to take place shortly, and the two problems might as well be addressed together. At which point, the parish and the community will have a fully functioning, working and striking clock again.

# Rowan Williams calls for 'urgent action' to help South Sudan

The Diocese of Leeds is linked with the five dioceses of Sudan. The country was divided in 2011 with the creation of the new South Sudan.

The northern Sudan is largely Muslim Arabic. Christians are very much in the minority here and are very firmly repressed. South Sudan has many more dioceses and is largely a mix of Christians of various different denominations alongside African Animists. The country is torn with inter-tribal conflict.

The recent fighting in South Sudan claimed nearly 300 lives and forced thousands of people to abandon their homes. Many have sought refuge in church compounds across Juba. Now the former Archbishop of Canterbury, who visited South Sudan with Christian Aid in 2014, has echoed a call for peace.

"As the South Sudan Council of Churches says: 'The time for carrying and using weapons has ended; now is the time to build a peaceful nation.' I affirm and echo their cry for peace. I stand with them in praying that parties, communities and leaders do everything in their power to 'create an atmosphere where violence is not an option'."

#### **Farnhill Parish Council Summary of Draft Minutes**

The meeting of Farnhill Parish Council was held on the 28th July 2016 in Kildwick/Farnhill Institute. Three members of the Council were present and the Clerk. The minutes of the meeting held on the 23rd June 2016 were approved by the Council and signed as a correct record by the Chairman.

The Clerk informed NYCC & CDC Representative P Mulligan & CDC Representative Counc P Fairbank that they were welcome to come to the meeting if they wished, but that it was really not necessary as due to illness the meeting was only going to be to deal with urgent items.

Due to two members of the Council being unable to attend the meeting and another member being ill it was agreed to have a short meeting to discuss urgent items so the viewing of the trees was cancelled till the month after. Two residents of the village had raised concerns previous to the meeting about some of the trees and bushes at Arbour Top getting overgrown and looking unsightly as well as blocking the light. The Parish Council agreed to consider if any action needs to be taken when viewing the trees in August.

David Jones, the Representative from the Ambulance Service who was going to give the Parish Council some guidance on Defibrillators was unable to attend due to illness, so the item was deferred to the next meeting. The Committee members of the Institute have said they would be happy to have a defibrillator on the end wall, but near the roadside.

Highways have replied to the Parish Council's e-mail regarding increased road traffic noise following resurfacing in spring. They state, in response to your enquiry regarding increased road noise following the surface dressing that was carried out last spring. The treatment that was carried out was a double dressing that is recommended where road noise may be an issue as shown outlined in our design guide.

An e-mail has been received by the Parish Council from a member of the public stating that over winter 2015/16 a four-wheeled drive vehicle repeatedly used a section of verge on the East side of Bradley Lane, about 80 metres South of the parish boundary with Bradley as a parking place. The weight of the vehicle and the continuous wet weather quickly resulted in the sloping verge being flattened out and turned into a patch of mud which is now being used by all and sundry as a lay-by.

A couple of weeks ago someone took the opportunity to turn this new lay-by into yet another fly-tipping site. Three cushions from a sofa currently adorn it - no doubt, now that a start has been made, more items will follow.

Something similar happened about 15 years ago in almost exactly the same spot but on the West side of the lane. At the time CDC resolved this by placing large boulders on the verge, preventing both parking and tipping.

Clerk to write to both CDC & NYCC regarding the issue.

CDC have given their permission for the dead Elm tree at the top of the Arbour to be cut down and no objections have been received from Mr Roberts who rents the land from the Parish Council. The seating area has now been completed but discussion of further work was held over till next meeting when more Councillors were present.

#### **Introducing the Kildwick MiniRingers**

This autumn sees the introduction of the Kildwick MiniRingers. Drawing mainly fron the older children from Kildwick School, we are hoping to introduce a new generation to the arcane mysteries of Church Bell Ringing.

Surprisingly, the MiniRingers won't be in the tower much – we're going to gather upstairs in the Parish Rooms on a Thursday after school. There will be a "real" mini-bell up there and lots of games and other activities, all aimed at introducing young people to this ancient and fascinating art, learning how to control a bell, sometimes many times heavier that ourselves to ring at precisely the right moment. We might even ring some tunes, too...

The MiniRingers provide an introduction, tailored particularly to young people, but I hope that some may want to take things further and join a regular tower band. If this club is to be a success, we need, too, to entice a few older folk along. The children will be encouraged to bring their parents and others to engage with this, the noisiest "secret activity" in the country! Bell ringing includes all ages, from the very young to the near-geriatric!

#### The Birds in Your Garden

I'm sure most of you have noticed more Wrens in your garden this year than for quite a while, perhaps not an unexpected result of several winters without long frosty spells. To confirm this observation, some new BTO research has revealed that Wrens vary in their resilience to winter weather, depending on where in Britain they live. Maybe not too surprisingly they have found that Scottish Wrens are larger than those living in southern Britain, and as a result are more able to survive hard winter frosts.

Perhaps the most extreme UK example is the St Kilda Wren, which is a subspecies of our inland Wren and has only been found on Hirta, Dun, Soay and Boreray islands which lie some 40 miles west of the Outer Hebrides. It is both larger and has a more heavily barred appearance than its mainland cousin.

Altogether there are only a few hundred pairs, making it a great rarity and specimens of the adult birds and their eggs used to be highly prized. The St Kildans themselves even used to gather eggs to sell to collectors. Nowadays they are, of course, fully protected.

Wrens are amongst the UK's smallest songbirds, and their populations can decline following periods of cold winter weather, due both to the cold itself and to difficulties in finding sufficient insect prey. This new research, in collaboration with the University of East Anglia, shows that Wrens living in regions where winters are more severe have adapted to improve their chances of surviving.

The study used information collected by volunteers participating in the Breeding Bird Survey to show how susceptible Wren populations were to severe winter weather, measured in terms of the number of days with a ground frost. Northern populations were found to be able to cope with winters having up to 70% more frosty days than their southern cousins, showing quite a degree of local adaptation. The results demonstrate how closely adapted Wren populations are to their local climate.

Using information collected by bird ringers, the study also found that Wren body mass was approximately 5% higher in the coldest (eastern Scotland) region

than in the warmest (south-western) region. Larger individuals are likely to be favoured in colder parts due to the thermal advantage of larger size and their ability to store more body fat, something that has also been observed in other species of both birds and animals.

The findings of this study add to our understanding of how birds and other species respond to climate change. The work done shows that Wren populations should be able adapt to at least some change in average temperature, and indeed, being short-lived birds they can probably adapt more rapidly than most other species. Ultimately, the ability of any species to cope with climate change will depend upon whether the future rate of warming exceeds their ability to adapt.

Yet again we see that nature can adapt, it always has, but the worry is that the rate of change predicted is so rapid that many, especially longer lived species, simply will not be able to adapt fast enough.
