The Vicar's Letter...

Dear friends,

Christmas is fast approaching and the pace of life is hotting up as we prepare for important times spent in the company of family and friends. But first the Church invites us to spend some time in careful and thoughtful preparation as we keep the season of Advent.



Advent is a time of waiting, of careful preparation for the coming celebration of Christmas. It is a time when we hear again the wonderful Old Testament prophesies that speak of the coming Messiah, God's anointed one. Our Lord is coming and we must be ready to welcome him when he comes.

But the nature of God's coming to his people is not what our human logic would expect. The Sunday before we begin the season of Advent the Church calendar invites us to celebrate the Feast of Christ the King. The one whose birth we will celebrate at Christmas is a King, but not in worldly terms.

Our King was born in the most humble of surroundings, where even the learned and the wise came to worship him. He grew up and went about proclaiming the good news of God's love and forgiveness. He spoke out against all that was evil and unjust in the world. He challenged the authorities of the time and for that he was killed on the cross.

The mystery at the heart of the Christian faith is that we worship God who is enthroned in splendour and light, yet reveals the power of his love in human weakness. The child whose manger we gaze at with joyful sentiment is the man whose cross we kneel at with heartfelt sorrow and whose tomb we run to in wonder and thanksgiving.

As we come to sing our Christmas carols and light our Christmas candles let us remember whose birth it is we celebrate, whose life, death and resurrection we glory in and whose coming again we long for.

In the midst of all the busyness, take time to ponder and wonder at the mystery that lies at the heart of our world and be ready to welcome God in Christ into your heart anew. Come and join with others as we offer our worship to the one who is our King.

I look forward to welcoming you to St Andrew's during the seasons of Advent and Christmas.

May you find peace and joy and Christ in your celebration of Christmas.

The Writing of Silent Night

Christmas Eve morning, 1818, the little Bavarian village of Oberndorf, and there was panic in the church of St Nicholas.

Mice had eaten through the bellows of the great organ. There would be no music for that Christmas Eve service.

The organist Franz Gruber rushed to tell Father Joseph Mohr, and both men paced the floor in consternation. Then Father Mohr stopped and pulled himself and his faith together. "What can we do?" he asked.

"We can PRAY." And so the two men prayed before Father Mohr trudged off in the heavy snow on his rounds of visits to the poor and ill of the village.

In one poor, humble cottage on the outskirts of the village, a woodcutter's wife had just given birth to a child. So Father Mohr paid them a visit, to welcome and bless the new baby.

It was early evening before he got back to the church, still deeply moved by the tiny face of the woodcutter's 'Christmas Eve child' nestled happily in its mother's arms. Father Mohr thought back all those centuries to another baby, sleeping soundly in his mother's arms... He longed to share this tender, tranquil scene with his congregation. On impulse, the priest sat down at his desk and took up his pen.

A short time later, Father Mohr called for Franz Gruber: "Here - please write a simple tune to this poem, something we can sing tonight to a guitar." Franz Gruber protested there was not enough time, but as he read the poem, he began to concentrate. He began to hum, and soon Father Mohr picked up the simply melody that had come to him.

A few hours later, that Christmas Eve, the congregation of St Nicholas, Oberndorf, were taught a new Christmas carol by candlelight and by guitar.

Silent Night! Holy Night! All is calm, all is bright! Round yon Virgin, Mother and Child, Holy Infant so tender and mild, Sleep in heavenly peace, Sleep in heavenly peace.

Silent Night, Holy Night...
With the Angels let us sing, Alleluia to our King;
Christ the Saviour is born. Christ the Saviour is born.

This Christmas, hundreds of millions of people around the world will sing this lovely answer to a priest and organist's prayer for musical help on that Christmas Eve so long ago.

The Parish Mission Statement

Called to be the Body of Christ,
we are here to share God's love with all people
through outreach and service
in our community and the world
through the power of the Holy Spirit.

Our exploration of the Parish Mission Statement continues this month with a look at the second line of the statement. The first line says *who* we are, as God's people gathered together in this parish. The second goes on to say something about *why* we are here.

Christians believe, first and foremost, in a God of love. At the start of every marriage service the following words are said: 'God is love, and those who live in love live in God and God lives in them'. We are to live in communion with God, the God who created us. But we are also to live in communion with our fellow human beings.

In the First Letter of John we read, 'Dear friends, since God loved us, we also ought to love one another...if we love one another, God lives in us and his love is made complete in us'. Jesus himself talked often of love. 'My command it this:' said Jesus, 'Love each other as I have loved you. Greater love has no-one than this, that he lay down his life for his friends. You are my friends if you do what I command'.

One day a Pharisee asked Jesus, 'Teacher, which is the greatest commandment in the Law?' Jesus replied, 'Love the Lord you God...This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: "Love your neighbour as yourself". All the Law and the Prophets hang on these two commandments'.

If we are to know what it is to be fully human we must know what is it to love and to be loved. We must be ready to give as well as to receive love. But this is not always easy, because love is invariably costly. True love demands something of us. True love speaks of sacrifice for the sake of the other.

Someone once asked Jesus how much he loved us. Jesus looked at the person, slowly opened his arms out wide and said, 'This much'!

God's love is a love that challenges our worldly ways, challenges our human logic. It is a love that says there is a better way of living. It is a love that speaks of letting go, sometimes, those things in our lives that we hold dear.

God loves us simply for 'who' we are, he does love us for 'what' we are. Love cannot be dependent on material possessions, on status in the community, on financial well being; love must be dependent only on the fact that we are human, created in the image of God, who wants us to know that love and share it with all people.

Dear friends, let us love one another.

NEWS FROM THE P.C.C.

At the meeting of the PCC on 12th November the major agenda item was finance. The treasurer informed the meeting of a predicted deficit in our accounts for this year of approx. £4000. This is a result of a smaller than expected increase in income, against the forecast increases in expenditure. It was agreed to have a Stewardship campaign in February next year to invite people to review their giving to the church in respect of time, talents and money.

It was also agreed to hold a Gift Day on Saturday 14th December to raise funds for a new church heating system. The present system is somewhat antiquated and will not be repairable should it break down! It is also wrong type of system for an ancient stone building. The PCC propose to install a hot-water radiator system.

Reports were received of two Deanery Synod meetings held in October. The PCC was asked to discuss ideas for future Deanery celebrations. The meeting also gave its support to the proposal to establish a 'Grief and Loss Support Group' across the Cross Hills & District Fellowship of Churches. It is hoped that the costs of initial training for the group will come from money devolved from the Diocese to the Deanery.

The Social Activities Group reported on arrangements for the Autumn Fair and on plans for the Flower Festival next May. A report was also received from the Young People's Work Advisory Group. The idea of having a space for children within the main body of the church was discussed and approved.

The next meeting in December will include an Advent Meditation. The PCC are keen that its meetings should not always be taken up by matters of business; an occasional spiritual input is important too!

Sweet dishes for Christmas

Raspberry and White Chocolate Trifle

150g (6ozs) white chocolate 2 tablesp rasp. jam
7 fl.ozs crème fraich 2 fl.ozs Sherry
8 fl.ozs double cream 350g (12ozs) frozen raspberries

4 – 6 trifle sponges

 Break the chocolate into pieces and place in a bowl, heat the crème fraich with 3 fl.ozs of the cream, add this to the chocolate and stir until melted. Cover with cling film and chill for about 2 hrs.

 Cut the trifle sponges in half and sandwich together with the jam. Place in bottom of a glass serving dish and sprinkle with the sherry; allow to soak then cover with the frozen raspberries.

Whisk remaining cream until thick then fold into the chocolate mixture.
 Spread on top of the fruit and decorate with a few extra raspberries.
 Serve chilled.

Hot Fudge Sundae

The children may like to make this.

25g (1oz) butter 50g (2ozs) soft, brown sugar 5fl.ozs double cream 1 banana sliced squeeze of lemon juice 12 scoops Vanilla ice cream 1 X 37g bag of Maltesers crushed

To decorate cherries or choc flakes

- Place butter, brown sugar and cream in a saucepan and heat gently stirring until the sugar has dissolved. Bring to the boil then simmer for 2 mins. Remove from the heat and set aside to cool slightly.
- Toss the banana in the lemon juice and then divide between 4 sundae glasses, cover with the ice cream and crushed Maltesers. Pour the sauce over and top each glass with a cherry or chocolate flake.

ast month I wrote about the beautiful church at Innellan where George Matheson was minister. This month it is his story and how he came to write a wonderful, well known hymn.

George Matheson was born in Glasgow in 1842. Unfortunately his eyesight was very poor and by the age of 18 was nearly blind. This handicap however did not stop him graduating M.A. with honours in 1862 and twelve years later Edinburgh University conferred on him the degree of Doctor of Divinity.

A witty and humorous man he enjoyed life to the full and everyone he met felt at ease in his company. George loved the village of Innellan where the family often spent holidays and in 1869 he was appointed minister there. It was here that his name became almost international as a preacher and writer.


Crowded congregations were commonplace and as George had an excellent memory he was able during his whole ministry to commit to memory not only his sermon but whole passages of scripture, psalms and hymns. Such was his fame that Queen Victoria invited him to preach at Balmoral in 1855 but it was in 1882 that he composed what was to become his most famous hymn, one that is among the best loved of all time.

Whilst attending his sister's wedding in 1882 in Glasgow the same day he consulted an eye specialist in the city, who told him that in a very short time he would be totally blind. This affected him deeply and at the wedding he informed the young lady he hoped to marry of this fact. Evidently she could not bring herself to face life with a blind husband, for she asked to be relieved of the engagement.

He returned home to Innellan in the evening with his life plans broken and his love denied. Gradually the pain eased as the greater love of God brought relief. It was then that he wrote his great hymn. How poignant the words are when his story is known.



O love that wilt not let me go. I rest my weary soul in Thee. I give Thee back the life I owe. That in Thine ocean depths its flow May richer, fuller be.





One of the greatest tributes paid to the hymn was in 1904 when representatives of 55 different Christian communions gathered from 26 different nations and sang it together on the slopes of Calvary - a long way from the shores of the Firth of Clyde where it was conceived amidst such pain and disappointment but such a testament to the love of God which never deserts anyone.



A thought from the Harvesters Fellowship Group

At Harvesters we have been studying the book of Romans, we have been very challenged by some of what we have looked at. A couple of weeks ago we looked at Romans chapter fourteen, the study was entitled Living in Community and it looked at how we can be guilty of making value judgements on fellow members of the Christian family. At the end of the study we were challenged by this paragraph.

"We all come from various traditions. Some people have habits or behaviours that may be very important to them. Whenever possible we need to honour these traditions and the people who practice them. I am not speaking of legalism or areas of weakness, just traditions that others appreciate. For instance, some people love old hymns played on an organ. Others appreciate praise choruses led by a music group. Both are pleasing to God. There is no right or wrong here, no more mature or less mature taste in musical styles.

The problem comes when we insist our way is the best. Some even claim that their personal likes are God's likes as well. They put down and criticize what is rich and precious to others.

Seek an opportunity to bless and affirm someone else's tradition or tastes. It might not be your favourite, but let them know that you respect their tradition and thank God for all that it means to them."

The next 6 months

As you know we are due back in UK early next year for our 6 month break having completed our first (almost) 3 year term. As we hope very much to return to Namirembe in September we are planning to leave Kampala on Feb 242003. That is now only 5 months away!!

Our last 5 months then should be a time of review with the bishop and dean, the opportunity to talk with our regional manager when he visits in October and to begin delegating and preparing for our departure.

For me George, I have returned from holiday to find my midwifery work escalating at a time when I had wanted to be decreasing!! My colleague has been delayed in UK due to serious ill-health but will hopefully return in November although only able to take up a much reduced work schedule.

I would really value prayer as I try to juggle a hugely increased work commitment (there are no other British midwives in Kampala willing to work) with home and packing. A CMS affiliate has just arrived in Kampala, a trained midwife only here for 6 months but she hopefully will be able to take Some of the pressure off.

The boys back at school

Simon has gone into Year 6 with the teacher who taught him in Y4. He has settled very well and generally gets straight down to his hour's homework every night.

Matt and Adam have a new-to-Kabira teacher who is proving more strict and demanding than Mr. Sharpe!

Please pray for them as they try to get used to each other!! All the boys are very much looking forward to returning to UK in 1 t terms time!!

Impending Events

We had a family service at the cathedral shortly after our return from holiday. It was a bit of a shambles as despite planning meetings before we left no-one had done anything about it whilst we were away. Our next family service is on October 27th to coincide with Harvest ...it would be great to see the other Sunday Schoolteachers taking the initiative to organise plan and present the event.

The bishop is carrying out confirmations on October 20th at Namirembe .

October is also the month when the bishop moves the clergy to different parishes. They get no warning and the only notification is by the 'Change List' being circulated during his annual diocesan meeting.

We are fearful that the other assistant vicar Rev William Sanga Mulinda will be moved after 4 yrs at Namirembe. This is a very difficult time for the clergy as they cannot appeal and it is a huge upheaval for the family interfering with school studies and jobs.
