The Vicar's Letter...



Dear friends,

It has been said on innumerable occasions that life is a journey. But perhaps, rather than one journey, we should say that life is a complex series of separate, interrelated journeys; each of these individual journeys is significant in its own right, yet gives value to the whole.

The Christmas story tells of one such journey; but even the one overarching story, as we know it, comprises a number of even shorter stories of important journeys.

There is the journey from Nazareth to Bethlehem. God sent his angel to Mary in Nazareth to tell her she would be the mother of Jesus. Several months later Mary and Joseph travelled to Bethlehem, the town of David. Here God made himself known to us in the Christ-child.

There is the journey from the fields to the manger. It was the shepherds who first heard the angels proclaim the good news of Jesus and they travelled to the manger to worship the newborn Saviour.

There is the journey from the east to the stable. From afar the wise men saw the sign that told them a new king had been born and they travelled to pay him homage and present their gifts.

Then there is the journey from Bethlehem to the place where you live now. God came not only 2000 years ago, but he comes to us today and asks to be born anew in each one of us. God asks us to open our eyes and see the true light come into the world: the true light that gives light to every person.


The story of the Christmas journey is an exciting one, but we must remember that the story does not end in the manger or in our own homes. The child Jesus grew up and went about proclaiming the good news of God's love and forgiveness. He spoke out against all that was evil and unjust in the world. He challenged the authorities of the time and for that he was killed on the cross.

The journey we make at Christmas must be continued right through to Holy Week and Easter when we celebrate what is at the core of our faith. The child whose manger we gaze at with joyful sentiment is the man whose cross we kneel at with heartfelt sorrow and whose tomb we run to in wonder and thanksgiving.

May you find peace and joy and Christ in Christmas. But only pause a little while; then continue your journey to Easter and beyond.

AN INTRODUCTION TO LOCAL CHURCH HISTORY

In this series of articles, Michael Baumber will be exploring some of the more Interesting aspects of our local history—church and community PART 3

ARCHBISHOP GRINDAL'S VISITATION 1575

eriodically Archbishops of York conducted detailed visitations. Churchwardens were asked to present all those who for one reason or another had broken the rules and they themselves were also questioned. The offenders would then be summoned before the church courts to explain their behaviour and if found guilty to be corrected. Sometimes a penance would be imposed. The laity were most commonly accused of moral laxity. Anthony Harrison was presented as being an adulterer: Denis Eastburn and Elen Preston for fornication i.e. having sex when not being married; Edward Gibson and Jane Gyll for having lived together 'suspiciously' for many years without evidence of them having been married. This is a relatively short list but it does not necessarily mean that Kildwick was a particularly moral place, rather that the church wardens could not be bothered to inquire too closely into the doings of a very large parish.

The laity could also be presented for not coming to church. John Garfurth of Steeton had absented himself and 'received not the Communyon this last yere at their churche.' Jane Mitchell 'a poore woman, presented to be excommunicated and not to have receyved the Communyon at Easter laste.' The reason could be religious. There were still Roman Catholics in the parish. Edmund Eltoft of Farnhill Hall, steward to the Earl of Cumberland was one and recusancy fines were to play a large part in destroying his family's fortunes but it could equally be hostility to the vicar or some other personal grudge.

The vicar at the time was Alexander Horrocks who had been inducted in 1572. The visitation's silence shows that

he satisfied the archbishop. He was not a pluralist, i.e. vicar of Kildwick was the only office he held, he was resident and he was considered to be properly qualified though he does not appear to have attended either Oxford or Cambridge. Similar negative evidence shows that the services he conducted were considered adequate, mat he preached four times a year 'his quarterly' sermons as he was required to do and that they were of the proper standard. The only complaint voiced did not relate to him but to Martin Heardman, the Silsden schoolmaster, who was 'unlicensed'.

A similar silence suggests that the churchwardens themselves also emerged with a clean bill of health. The fabric of the church was in good repair and so was the parsonage. The church's vernacular Bible was in place and it had a Book of Homilies and also Erasmus's Paraphrases both of which were apparently required reading. In a way it was hardly surprising that Horrocks met the Archbishop's approval. He was Kildwick's first married priest and later evidence suggests that he had puritan leanings. The Archbishop himself was translated to Canterbury shortly afterwards and his puritan preaching so much annoyed Queen Elizabeth that she refused to listen to him.

Recipes for December

A favourite dinner party dessert and some tartlets, which are ideal for a buffet party.

Banoffi Pie

Base. Topping.
200g (8ozs) crushed digestive biscuits. 300 ml (½ pt) double cream.
100g (4ozs) butter. 1 level teasp. Instant coffee 2 teasp. Water.
Filling. Grated chocolate.

4 bananas. Serves 8. (for half quantity use a

1. Place the tin of milk in a large saucepan and cover with water. Bring to the boil then simmer for 2 ½ hrs. Top up the water when necessary to keep the tin fully submerged.

- 2. Melt the butter and mix with the crushed biscuits. Press into the base of buttered 25cm(10") cheesecake dish. Leave to cool.
- 3. Allow the boiled condensed milk to cool for a while before opening the tin, and then pour over the biscuit base.
- 4. Slice the bananas and arrange over the caramel.

1x 397g tin sweetened condensed milk.

5. Dissolve the coffee in the water then whip this with the cream until it stands in peaks. Spread on top of the bananas and sprinkle with chocolate. Chill for 2 to 3 hours before serving.

Mascarpone and Raspberry Tartlets.

2 heaped tablesp lemon curd.

Sweet pastry. Filling
200g(8ozs) plain flour. 200g (8ozs) Mascarpone.

100g(4ozs) butter.

2 level tablesp caster sugar.

1 egg yolk. Topping

2 – 3 tablesp cold water. 200g (8ozs) frozen raspberries (Makes 24 tartlets) Icing sugar to dust.

- 1. Prepare pastry. Sift flour into a bowl, rub in the butter until the mixture is like breadcrumbs then stir in the sugar. Add the egg yolk and enough water to make a stiff dough. Wrap in a plastic bag and chill for 30 mins. Heat the oven to 200c / gas 6.
- 2. Roll out the pastry on a floured surface then cut into 7cm (3") circles. Place in patty tins (as for jam tarts) and fork to prevent bubbles. Bake blind until pale golden, about 5 mins.

To complete. Mix together the mascarpone and lemon curd, divide the mixture between the tart shells and arrange the raspberries on top, dust with icing sugar. Serve chilled. Shortcuts

Use ready made sweet dessert pastry, or when making mince pies make some extra bases for this recipe.

Isobel's Page

When driving out and about Classic FM is usually on my car radio. Last week I heard a piece of music I really like - Eurydice from Gluck's Orfeo. I cannot remember who was singing it on that occasion but it brought to my mind an old record I had, the singer being Kathleen Ferrier.

That in turn reminded me that my mother had great admiration for the famous Lancashire singer after hearing her perform in Messiah somewhere in this locality.

At this time of year Messiah really comes into its own. In years long gone the magnificent Methodist chapel in Temple Street Keighley, now a mosque, would put on an annual performance with renowned soloists and it was advisable to arrive early if you wanted to get a seat. Many people, having heard the first part in the afternoon, would eat sandwiches in their seats in order to secure their place at the evening's performance.

So what makes Messiah so special? It was a favourite of Handel himself and he suggested that it was the product of inspiration of sorts when he said "I did think I did see all Heaven before me and the great God himself."

In 1741, during a low spot in Handel's career in England, - he had been born in Halle, Germany in 1685, - a friend Charles Jennens convinced Handel to compose an oratorio based upon a compilation of Scriptures Jennens had recently arranged and so Handel began work and composed the entire 'Messiah' in a twenty-four day spurt. It was divided into three parts, Christ's birth, death and resurrection, each part breaking down into a series of arias and choruses with a Biblical passage as their basis. It was performed for the first time in Dublin on 13th April 1742.

For more than 250 years this great and most popular of oratorios has survived and endured numerous revisions and re-orchestrations ranging from 'cast of thousands' to emphasis on 'authentic' performance practice employing period instruments and small all-male choral ensembles.

Although it is true that George11 was overwhelmed by the music and stood during the singing of the mighty Hallelujah chorus at the 2nd public performance, during Handel's lifetime - he died in 1759, Messiah did not enjoy the popularity of many of his other oratorios.

The libretto prepared for Handel by his friend and taken from the Old and New Testaments considers the whole of human experience - hope and fulfilment, suffering and death, resurrection and redemption.

Across the span of over two centuries Messiah still holds its extraordinary grip on musician and audience member alike. It reaches us with its directness of expression and its infinite capacity for self-renewal.

News from the Parochial Church Council

The November meeting of the PCC began with the opportunity to express its thanks for two recent gifts to the church. Now in place in the churchyard is a new bench in memory of the late Gerry Greenwood, and at Christmas we will begin to use new altar candlesticks, a new ciborium and new cruets for the water and wine, these items being given in memory of the late Robert and Rachel England. We are very grateful for these generous gifts.

It was agreed to have our details and pictures of our church building placed on a website which is used by film companies and photographers looking for locations. It is hoped that this might generate some additional income for the church.

A draft budget for 2004 discussed. Finances are always a challenge for parishes and next year shows a forecast deficit. It was agreed to share this year's Christmas services collection between St George's Crypt, Leeds and another charity to be decided nearer the time dependent on particular world needs.

The Advisory Groups reported on recent meetings. The Worship reported on a proposal to hold a 'Come and Sing' afternoon in the spring to learn some new songs and hymns. The Nurture group raised the question of keeping the church open during the day. It was agreed that we should investigate improvements in our general security inside the building to enable us to have church open when unattended. The Young People's Work group reported on the proposal to introduce a special session of our successful Wednesday Jets group which will be called Mega-Jets and held in the church with parents staying as well!

Some time was given to a discussion about future building development plans. There have been some interesting conversations recently and more news will be given next month.

Lent Course 2004 - New World, Old Faith

Lent begins next year with Ash Wednesday on 25th February. During the following six weeks a number of small groups will meet across the Cross Hills & District Fellowship of Churches to study, think and pray together.

The course chosen is titled is: **New World**, **Old Faith**. It is a tape based course with input from Archbishop Rowan Williams, David Coffey, Joel Edwards, the Revd Dr John Polkinghorne KBE FRS and Dr Pauline Webb.

The course will have 5 sessions: Brave New World?; Environment and Ethics; Church and Family in Crisis?; One World – Many Faiths; Spirituality and Superstition.

Look out for more details of venues and times of groups in the New Year and make plans to join a group next Lent.

POSADA (TRAVELLING CRIB) – A PROJECT FOR ADVENT



This year we are introducing a new project for Advent. Posada is a Spanish word meaning 'inn'. Posada celebrations originated in Mexico where two young people were chosen to dress up as Mary and Joseph. They used to travel from house to house in their village telling people about the imminent arrival of Jesus and asking them it they would give him a room. On Christ-

mas Eve they would re-enact a community play and bring figures of Mary and Joseph to be place in the crib.

The modern day equivalent is based on this concept, but enables different people to give a home to the nativity figures for a night. Beginning their journey at the 10am service on Advent Sunday (30 November) the figures in the crib will travel around the parish each day from home to home arriving in church at the Crib Service at 4pm on Christmas Eve in time for the arrival of our Lord.

Posada has been encouraged in this country by the Church Army and many parishes now enjoy sharing in this special Advent project. We look forward using Posada to help people celebrate more meaningfully the season of Advent.


