The Vicar's Letter . . .



Dear friends,

Happy Christmas, and a happy New Year! The Christian Church continues its celebration of Christmas until we keep the Feast of the Presentation of Christ in the Temple, or Candlemas, on 2nd February. Long after the world around us has forgotten about Christmas, the Church continues to kneel before the Christ-child in the crib and wonder at the greatest gift that God could have given to us.

During the Christmas season we continue to celebrate God's gift to us of himself as the Christ-child, God with us; we continue to reflect upon the meaning of God coming amongst us with great humility, in the tiny child, born of a young unmarried woman. Through all the 'nice' comfortable trappings of our Western approach to the Christmas season God speaks to the world simply and quietly, yet with a message that challenges much of the values of our present day individualistic, materialistic culture.

At the heart of Christmas is the 'nice' story of the birth of a baby. It is seemingly a comfortable story of angels and shepherds and animals in a stable. But...we must not lose sight of the fact that the birth of Jesus is only the beginning of the story. As we ponder the great mystery of God we must allow our journey to continue beyond Bethlehem and the stable to Calvary and the cross.

The Christian writer J. Heinrich Arnold said: 'The Christian mysteries are an indivisible whole. If we become immersed in one, we are led to all the others. Thus the way from Bethlehem leads inevitably to Golgotha, from the crib to the cross. When the blessed virgin brought the child to the temple, Simeon prophesied that her soul would be pierced by a sword, that this child was set for the fall and the resurrection of many, for a sign that would be contradicted. His prophecy announced the passion, the fight between light and darkness that already showed itself before the crib.'

That is why the wood of our church Christmas tree will become, in only a few weeks time, the wood of our Lenten cross, on which we will place the symbols of the passion of our Lord.

The Gospel may have come quietly, wrapped in swaddling cloth, but it is not a passive Gospel. The message that God speaks to you demands a response and it should lead you to action.

May the Christ-child, who became the crucified and risen Christ, continue to speak to you in power and simplicity this Christmastide and always.

God bless you in the coming year.

The Parish Mission Statement

Called to be the Body of Christ,
we are here to share God's love with all people
through outreach and service
in our community and the world
through the power of the Holy Spirit.

We move on in our look at our Parish Mission Statement to consider this month what we are do in sharing God's love with all people. We began by saying who we are as God's people in this parish, then looked at why we are here.

But first a further thought about the Mission Statement as a whole. The Statement is more than just a slogan or a 'catch-phrase'. It is a statement to encourage and challenge, both the established Christian community and others, to think about what it means to be part of God's Church in this parish. Someone once explained why they found a particular bible story helpful; they said, 'basically because it is sufficiently complicated to need thinking about (so that you can have a decent conversation and not come across as too 'preachy') and sufficiently sensible that most people grasp it when it's explained'. It is hoped that the same can be said of our Mission Statement.

So, what are we to do as God's people in this place? We are to share God's love with all people through outreach and service. Jesus himself told us that 'the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve and give his life as a ransom for many'. The Christian faith is not a passive faith, but an active faith. All are called to respond to the amazing gift of God's love for the world in our own acts of kindness and service to those around us.

At the end of every baptism service we present a lighted candle to the newly baptized. This is done a reminder that all God's people are called to 'shine as a light in the world to the glory of God the Father'. In one of the final prayers said at our services of Holy Communion we say, 'Send us out in the power of your Spirit *to live and work* to your praise and glory'.

Shortly before he was to die, Jesus spoke to his disciples about the importance of showing love in action. 'I was hungry and you gave me food', said Jesus, 'I was thirsty and you gave me drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you clothed me, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me.' The disciples asked Jesus when they had done these things. Jesus replied, 'Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me'.

Love must lead to action. If we truly love we can do no other! St Francis of Assisi said enough when he said, 'Preach the gospel; use words if you must!' So...'go in peace to love and serve the Lord'.

NEWS FROM THE P.C.C.

The PCC met on 10th December and, after the essential business, enjoyed a short meditation/reflection on Advent and Christmas.

The Worship Advisory Group reported that a 3rd setting has been chosen for our Sung Eucharist services; called 'The People's Eucharist', this setting will be introduced on 9th February. It is hoped to arrange a short course in 'Understanding Worship' next year and also some sessions to help those involved in different aspects of worship (e.g. lesson readers, intercessors, servers, sidespersons) share their experiences and develop their skills in these areas.

The Outreach Advisory Group had met for the first time and began to explore ways of increasing people's awareness of our links with church missionary organisations and other charitable groups. It is proposed to have regular articles in *The Bridge* about these links. Watch this space...

The Pastoral Care Advisory Group reported that they had discussed the plans to establish an ecumenical Grief & Loss Support Group to serve the local churches. It is hoped that funds to set up the initial training course will come from money devolved by the Diocese to the Deanery.

It was reported that the Public Notices for the faculty application for a new church heating system, an extended trench around the NW corner of the church to address the internal damp problem, and the permanent removal of 4 pews from the north aisle are now on display for the statutory 28 day period. The Public Notices for the Phase 1 reordering scheme will also be displayed very soon.

What's cooking In January?



A hearty one – pan meal and a warming soup.
Both dishes are easy to make.

Smoked Haddock Stovie's

2 Onions
1kg (2lbs) potatoes
knob of butter
1 tablesp. veg. oil

425ml (¾) pt hot water
½ kg (1lb) skinned, smoked
haddock cut into chunks
salt and pepper
chopped parsley

1. Peel and thinly slice the onions then peel and thickly slice the potatoes.
2. Heat the butter and oil in a large, wide pan, add the onions and cook for 5 mins. until lightly browned. Add the potatoes and cook for a further 5 mins. stirring often.
3. Add the water and seasoning then the fish and bring to the boil. Cover and cook until the potatoes and fish are tender 10 – 15 mins. Scatter with chopped parsley just before serving.

Curried Parsnip or Carrot Soup

25g (1oz) butter
750g (1 ½ lbs) parsnips or carrots
or a mix of both
1 large onion
1 – 2 cloves garlic

2 teasp. mild curry powder
1.8 ltrs. (3pts) vegetable or
chicken stock
salt and pepper
2-tablesp cream (optional)

1. Peel and chop the vegetables and crush the garlic. Melt the butter in a large saucepan, add the vegetables and cook gently for 5 mins.
2. Stir in the curry powder and cook for 1 min. then blend in the stock and seasoning. Bring to the boil stirring then cover and simmer for 20 mins. or until the vegetables are tender.
3. Puree the soup in a food processor or blender until smooth, check the seasoning. Serve hot with a swirl of cream on top.

Elsewhere in this magazine you will have read about the book club and the book we have been reading based on the 23rd psalm. Many authors have taken inspiration from it, with many hymns based on it; The King of Love my Shepherd is, Jesus tender Shepherd hear me, He shall feed His flock, There were ninety and nine that safely lay in the shelter of the fold- the list could go on and on.



I will recall a story about a well known actor who was invited, along with various other speakers, to give an after dinner speech. He stated that he knew no finer writing than Psalm 23 and proceeded to recite it in a clear ringing voice with perfect diction and the emphasis on exactly the right words. The whole thing was just perfect. The last speaker of the evening was an old shepherd and he too recited the same psalm. It was not the same professional oration, nor was it as well presented as the actor's but the audience were gripped by its sincerity and many a tear was shed round the hall that night. Afterwards the actor congratulated the old shepherd on his rendition " the difference between us is this- I know the psalm but you know the Shepherd"

What a good illustration this is of the difference of knowing about a person and knowing the person himself. The old shepherd knew in a personal real way, as we would know our dearest friend, the Shepherd and to know Him and be safe in His fold is life's dearest treasure for us all.

The hymn 'There were ninety and nine' has always captured my imagination and I end with verse two from it, which to me depicts God's love for all of us in a wonderful way- a love, with us through thick and thin, that will never forsake any of us however far we may wander from the path leading to Him.

Lord, Thou hast here Thy ninety and nine
Are they not enough for Thee?
But the Shepherd made answer, This of Mine has wandered away from Me;
And although the road be rough and steep
I go to the desert to find My sheep.

CMS is a voluntary association of people rooted in the Anglican Communion who are united in obedience to Christ's command to fulfill his Great Commission. They strive to share the love of God with people of all races and to gather them into the fellowship of Christ's Church. That means that all members of CMS try to participate actively in Christian mission wherever they are, in their home country or overseas.

Founded in 1799, CMS has attracted upwards of nine thousand men and women to serve as mission partners during its 200-year history. Today there are about 150 mission partners in 26 countries in Africa, Asia, Europe and the Middle East. A budget of £5.75 million a year is needed to maintain and expand this work.

CMS six main priorities are:

- leadership training and theological education;
- support for small and struggling churches;
- evangelism and church planting;
- dialogue and witness with people of other faiths;
- community development and health care;
- work among refugees and migrant peoples.

Good gardening in 2003. Now is the time to look forward to a successful season. Why not send an evening looking through seed catalogues and ordering a variety of summer annuals or maybe consider plug plants; there is a large choice available and mail order plants are good value if you have room to grow them on ready for planting out in June.

Some ideas for this month -

- Fill a hanging basket with evergreens. These will last for a few weeks and replace the Christmas wreath
- Continue clearing borders of dead foliage and with winter digging.
- Shake heavy snow off dwarf conifers to prevent branches snapping or alternatively tie them round if snow is forecast.

Look out for brightly coloured bark on Salix, Cornus and some Prunus and Acers. Winter heathers are coming into bloom together with Witch Hazel, Viburnums, Yellow Jasmine and brilliant Mahonia. Tree skeletons look magnificent against winter skies when the shape and texture can be seen. With a layer of hoar frost they look even better.

Mission Links - news from Stephan and Margaret Tirwomwe in Uganda

Greetings in the name of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ whose birthday we are remembering these days. Jesus' mission started with the terrified shepherds who were comforted by the angel's words "'Don't be afraid! I am here with good news for you, which will bring great joy to all the people.'" (Luke 2: 10 GNB) He is always ready to come to our rescue. We have seen this since we arrived back to Kabale. Although culture shock overseas is quite bad, RETURN CULTURE SHOCK is even worse! It is subtle! Although it is now nearly 5 months since Margaret, Geraldine and I returned to Kabale, Uganda, we are still suffering return culture shock. Different aspects in life for example the banking system, people's expectations are teasing us.

Family News

Margaret & Stephen. Margaret is re-learning to live in Kabale where she has to cope with some comments about different things but with her resilient character she is surviving them. Her abdominal pains persist and people over here comment thus "By the way, what happened? We thought that the white doctors would solve your health problems Why did you come back with them?" But her answer is simply that she trusts in the Great Physician - Jesus Christ - who heals all diseases and he is the only one who enables the doctors to do what ever they are able to do. She needs your prayers.

Stephen has been on leave since we arrived in Kabale and he will. start work in January 2003. Meanwhile he has been undergoing orientation in the mission work as well as supervising the building of our house at home. In matters of orientation, he has just returned from Dar es Salaam, Tanzania, for a ten days seminar about Evangelism to Muslims (18th - 28th. November 2002). There is an Islamic resurgence in Africa, which goes hand in hand with violence e.g.. Nigeria, and, there is need for the Christian Church in Uganda to be aware of:' the danger hovering over us by tile spread of Islam.

We thank God for giving us a family! car to enable us move about as Margaret finds it hard to climb Kigezi hills. After refreshing himself in lessons in a driving School, Stephen now drives it.

F ARNHILL PARISH COUNCIL MEETING DECEMBER 5th

- Waiting restrictions were discussed for the bottom of Starkey Lane & Newby Road to ease congestion, subiect to a Traffic Regulation Order.
 - The placing of a street light for the footpath between Bucklar Hill & Parsons Bridge was discussed, also Clerk to write to N.Y.C.C. to see if they will carry out a risk assessment of the lighting for the whole village.
 - It was decided to purchase a Notice Board for the Parish Council to be displayed at the Institute, due to the increasing amount of information that needs to be displayed for the public.
 - The Precept was calculated for the year 2003/2004

- Concerns were expressed about the speed of vehicles using Grange Road, Clerk to enquire about Traffic Calming Measures.

6 January - Epiphany



On 6 January we celebrate Epiphany - the visit of the wise men to the baby Jesus. But who were these wise men? No one knows for sure. Matthew calls them 'Magi', and that was the name of an ancient caste of a priestly kind from Persia. It wasn't until the third century that they were they called kings - by a church father, Tertullian.

Another church father, Origin, assumed there were three - to correspond with the gifts given. Later Christian interpretation came to understand gold as a symbol of wisdom and wealth, incense as a symbol of worship and sacrifice, and myrrh as a symbol of healing - and even embalming.

Certainly Jesus challenged and set aright the way in which the world handled all three of these things. Since the eighth century, the magi have had the names Balthasar, Caspar and Melchior.
