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

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
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The Vicar's Letter ...

Dear friends.

Alleluia! Christ is risen. He is risen indeed. Alleluia!

After the long season of Lent the church's worship resounds once more with the shouts of Alleluia, and the building looks resplendent with the beauty of the Easter flowers. Easter is indeed the time to offer our praise and thanksgiving to God for the wonderful news of the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ.



Our Lord, who died, was raised to new life and we are invited to share in that new life, not just in the future but now. Our lives, as individuals and as communities, are a series of deaths and resurrections, some quite minor, some more major. Faith is Jesus Christ is not a protection from all the struggles that we all face in life, but it is a source of strength and hope when those struggles come our way – and come they do. Our faith in Jesus helps us face the reality of the crosses in our lives, firm in the knowledge that God can transform even the darkest moments and experiences into times of light and growth.

The glorious message of Easter allows us to shed tears of sorrow knowing that God can transform them into tears of joy and thanksgiving. On Sunday 18th May many will gather for our Annual Service of Commemoration and Thanksgiving for Departed Family and Friends. As we light our candles in memory of those who have died we will do so firm in the hope that God has raised them to new life with Him.

The week before we have our annual Quiet Day. On Saturday 10th May the Revd Paul Slater will lead our reflections on the theme: 'Easter Faith – hitting the road again'. If you have never experienced a Quiet Day before why not give this one a try. We all need to take time to come apart awhile for some spiritual refreshment. (Next year we have a weekend booked at Parcevall Hall, 21-23 May.)

Easter is about new life, resurrection life, and we will be celebrating new life at our Flower Festival to take place 23-26 May. The theme for this festival is 'In celebration of Weddings and Baptisms'; through the floral displays, which will incorporate weddings dresses and baptismal gowns, we will proclaim the wonder of new life experienced in marriage and in baptism. Much hard work has already gone into the preparation for the weekend and I hope many, many people will visit and experience the beauty of the church in radiant splendour. We are also very fortunate to have the new Bishop of Bradford, the Rt Revd David James, coming to share in our main service on Sunday 25 May at 10am.

As I said at the Annual Church Meetings in March, there are many positive signs of new life within our church community. There is a good spirit amongst the people that will take us into the future in hope and trust, eagerly awaiting the new life that God has planned for us. During this Easter season let us shout and sing our Alleluias with renewed vigour and commitment.

What's cooking In May?



To promote good health we are advised to eat more vegetables and fruit. Try these recipes and serve fresh fruit for dessert.

Mixed bean and vegetable stir fry

2 tablesp. olive oil
1 red pepper de-seeded & roughly chopped
1 yellow pepper, de-seeded & roughly chopped
1 large onion, peeled & roughly chopped
2 courgettes roughly chopped
2 sticks of celery, chopped
1 X 420g tin of red kidney beans, drained

1 X 420g tin of flageolet beans, drained

2 tomatoes, chopped
2 tablesp. sun dried
tomatoes, chopped
1 tablesp. Balsamic
vinegar
Salt and pepper
12 black olives (optional)
Herbs to garnish
(optional)

- 1. Prepare ingredients then heat the oil in a large wok or frying pan. Add the peppers, onion, courgettes and celery and stir fry for 4 5 mins.
- 2. Add the beans, tomatoes, sun dried tomatoes and balsamic vinegar and stir fry for 2-3 mins. more.
- 3. Add the seasoning and olives if using, garnish with herbs and serve hot.

Potato and Salmon or Tuna grill

750g (1 ½) lbs new potatoes, sliced length ways 100g (4ozs) garden peas, fresh or frozen 200g tin of salmon or tuna 200g light cream cheese 100g (4ozs) mature cheddar cheese, coarsely grated Salt and pepper

- Prepare ingredients then boil potatoes in salted water for about 10 mins. until almost tender but not breaking up. Add the peas and simmer for another 2 mins. Drain well then place in a mixing bowl and keep warm.
- Drain the fish remove any bones and skin then flake into chunks. Gently toss with the potatoes and peas, season to taste then spoon into a flameproof dish.
- 3. Roughly spread the cream cheese on top and cover with the grated cheese. Grill for a few mins. until bubbling and golden.

have just finished reading a very interesting book. It was a vivid narrative, unraveling extraordinary events which had been widely regarded as an extreme manifestation of the corruption and vice which disfigured the court of James I who came to the throne in 1603. In 1615 the Earl and Countess of Somerset were detained on suspicion of having murdered by poison Sir Thomas Overbury. At their trial the Countess pleaded guilty and with her husband was sentenced to hang. However King James raised public outrage by freeing them after short terms of imprisonment. History makes fascinating reading but not all historical writing is in narrative.

Our choir have been learning an anthem, the music of which was written, even earlier than when the above saga was unfolding, in the reign of the previous monarch Elizabeth 1st who reigned from 1558 - 1603.

Richard Farrant was born between 1525 and 1530 and from 1550 was a singer in the Chapel Royal. In 1564 he became Master of the Choristers of St George's chapel Windsor. He was an early exponent of the verse anthem and he wrote the music for our anthem. However the words had been written much earlier for they are taken from Psalm 27.

'My heart says of you. "Seek his face!"
Your face, Lord, I will seek.
Do not hide your face from me,
Do not turn your servant away in anger
You have been my helper
Do not reject me or forsake me,
O God my Saviour!".

Richard Farrant's music is a joy to hear and sing and the words set to it and attributed to David are as relevant to us now as they ever were. We can be sure that God our Saviour will never turn away from us or reject or forsake us.

To quote something written much later, in the 18th century.

"What joy that blest assurance gives!"

NEWS FROM THE P.C.C.

The first meeting of the new PCC year began on 8th April with a celebration of the Eucharist and a welcome to new members.

Lesley Hudson was elected as Vice-Chairperson of the PCC and then membership of the Advisory Groups was discussed. It was agreed that the PCC members of the Groups would approach other members of the church community directly to invite them to join the Groups. The hope is that new people will be encouraged to be part of the mission structure of the church.

It was agreed to re-establish the Church Building Development Working Group, and to establish a separate Fund-raising Working Group. It was also agreed to give fresh thought as to the best way to plan our church social programme in the future.

Much of the meeting was then taken up with discussion about church finances. More information about some of the discussion is given separately below. The meeting approved the accounts for 2002 and also approved a revised budget for 2003 which shows a deficit of £907.

It was agreed to place a contract for the maintenance of the New Churchyard; the cost will be borne by the churchyard fund.

The next meeting of the PCC is on Tuesday 13th May when the Diocesan Development Officer, Uell Kennedy, will be present to talk about stewardship and fund-raising.

CHURCH FINANCES - PLANNED GIVING & GIFT AID

Last month we reported the recent appointments of Adrian Flint as PCC Treasurer and Pam Brown as Planned Giving and Gift Aid Secretary. Since then much time and effort has gone into looking at how we present our accounts and financial reports to ensure greater clarity for PCC and church members.

The need was also identified to encourage more people to join the planned giving scheme and to ensure that all giving is done in the most efficient way, both for the giver and for the church. Planned Giving means to promise to give a regular amount to the church, which may be weekly or monthly. This should be something that all Christians do, willingly and with joy. The Church of England suggests that people should aim to give 5% of their net income (after Income Tax and National Insurance) to the Church. Planned Giving is important as part of our life of Christian discipleship, our commitment to the life of God's Church. It is important to the Church as it allows it to plan its finances for the year and be assured of a regular income to meet its financial commitments.

There are a number of ways that people can make their planned giving. The most common way is by using Weekly Envelopes, which people bring with them when they attend a service. An alternative way is by Banker's Order, by which a person sets up a Standing Order payment from their bank account to the church's bank account. At present only 8 people give to the St Andrew's Church by Banker's Order. It seems that a number of people were not aware that they could use this method for their planned giving. A third method of planned giving is by Payroll Giving.

Whatever method is used for planned giving it is important that only one person within the church community, the Planned Giving Secretary, knows the details of any individual's giving. For us, this person is Pam Brown.

To facilitate this the PCC has agreed to open a new bank account to receive money paid to the church by Banker's Order. Statements for this account will only be seen by the Planned Giving Secretary, not by the Treasurer. This will ensure confidentiality for those who choose to give by Banker's Order. It is hoped that more people who have a bank account (which is most people today) will choose to give in this way.

It is also important that everyone who is a UK taxpayer chooses to maximise his or her gift to the church by using Gift Aid. This allows the church to claim back the tax already paid on the amount of the gift, thereby increasing the gift by 28% at no extra cost to the giver.

If you would like to change the way you make your planned giving gift to the church, if you would like to begin to use Gift Aid, or if you would like to change the level of your giving, please contact our Planned Giving Secretary, Pam Brown (tel. 631505) who will be pleased to help.

- •Treat bush fuschias to kill off lurking vine weevill larvae.
- Plant gladiolli corms.
- •Prepare hanging baskets and keep frost free until the end of the month.
- •Plant runner bean seeds in peat pots ready for planting out later.
- •Some vegetables with coloured leaves look well planted among the perennials, eg swiss chard, purple basil or bronze leaf loose leaf lettuce.



Church Tourism Conference -**Yorkshire Churches** Harrogate, Sat 29th March '03; 10 am - 1 pm



It was a wonderful morning in attractive surroundings with very impressive catering. The Heaton millennium tapestry was there for us to see and there were displays too from each of the speakers. The conference was *very* well attended – far more people than they were originally expecting; the hall was packed.

Our keynote speaker was the Reverend Professor Myra Shackley, from Nottingham Business School and Southwell Minster, who gave us a Power point presentation on managing visitors to our churches. She said we need to look at making our buildings sing - whether it's for outreach and mission, to publicise church services, to generate cash or whether it's to create a sense of community. Successful church tourism needs adequate resources for promotion, a single committed co-ordinator to head an active planning committee and key festivals or events to attract the visitors. She talked about links with neighbouring churches, links with the pub and links with local businesses (Like B&Bs)

Other speakers were: Rev Eric Norris who spoke about his much-visited church in Herriott country as well as about his own experiences as a church tourist. He emphasised communication - let people know you're open perhaps with a A-board at the gate - particularly that they're welcome. Some he had visited simply had a notice on the door and he gave some lovely examples. He also talked about church trails for children (although trails received a mixed press overall); Angela Bergin and Helen Bond who talked about the events they'd organised as part of the Two Dales Heritage Project; Henrietta Ryott, Development Officer for the Heritage Lottery Fund, who gave us details of lottery funding for heritage projects; and Zoe Kemp (who had organised this conference) gave us a review of the past year in North Yorkshire's Church Tourism Initiative and showed us the newly launched church heritage leaflet - some of which we have at the back of church now.

The overall message seemed to be - open up and offer the best that you have, whatever it is. Lesley, Robin and I were all very impressed by the whole event. It was a good morning.

Yorkshire Surprise Major (first rung 14 Feb 1903, at Ranmoor)



The bells will ring out on Sunday afternoon, 25 May, when a team of ringers lead by Brian Sanders of Barnsley will attempt to ring a peal of **Yorkshire Surprise Major**. This is an 8 bell method when each bell will be rung some 5000+ times without the resulting pattern repeating. A peal usually takes just over 3 hours to ring. and as the tower peal boards bear witness to, it is quite an achievement.

When you are looking at the flowers in church on Sunday afternoon look at the ropes, spare a thought for the ringers behind the partition and wonder at the concentration and skill to ring Yorkshire Surprise Major. (No they don't have to remember 5000+ bell positions, it is all done to a pattern).

What is not always seen, of course, is the prayer that goes on for all the patients we visit, and for the staff who care for them. Without prayer and the strength that comes from that, our work would be impossible and probably in vain. Sometimes these prayers are said in the chapel; sometimes in the office as each name is written down on the lists for visiting; sometimes as we walk along the corridor towards the ward we are about to visit and sometimes at the bedside, if the patient requests it.

My understanding of the healing ministry of the Church is a very broad one. All Christian ministry, it seems to me, is about the Christ in you meeting the Christ in the Person you are serving. It is in that meeting alone that we find healing and hope. As a Hospital Chaplain, the Christ in me is taken out from the boundaries of the Church and into the world, where I firmly believe Jesus wants his followers to be. We are frail vessels but he has chosen us to do this work and we do what we can. Thankfully, however, we are also disciples, which means we are always apprentices – always learning – and perhaps therefore, usually forgiven when we don't do things quite as others would like!

Sometimes I find that those who are sick in body, are more alive to their need for God and are therefore more spiritually healthy and alive than the rest of us. Maybe we are so busy keeping physically fit that we neglect our souls and the souls of our neighbours or loved ones. Yet it is too easy to separate our well being into different compartments rather than recognising the need for a holistic approach to our salvation. The link between spiritual well being and the rate of a patient's return to physical health is well documented and The Department of Health certainly recognises it and it is why they employ Chaplains in the NHS.

The healing ministry is a real Easter ministry, because it is about newness of life, hope, and the recognition that death has indeed lost its sting if we put our trust in the risen Christ. To be part of a missionary team from Church, working out there in the world of our local Hospital is a great privilege; but to be able to do it with the help of such a dedicated band of pilgrim-volunteers is an even greater joy and hopefully a recognition that the mission of the Church in our locality is up, running and in good heart.

Farnhill Parish Council

The monthly meeting of Farnhill Parish Council was held on the 3rd April in Kildwick and Farnhill Institute.

Due to in-sufficient canditates standing there will not be an election held in the Parish of Farnhill. The results of the un-contested election are displayed in the Parish Council Notice Board at the Institute. We have one new Councillor Mr Ian Fulton.

Mr. Richard Law has resigned from office as Chairman and Councillor and was thanked by everybody for the hard work he has done over the years.

Two bus shelters at Connonly Lane End which were owned by the Parish Council have been removed by N. Y.C.C. Transport, but they will shortly be replaced with new style glass shelters. N. Y.C.C. will be taking full responsibility for the shelters, and they will be cleaned on a monthly basis.

Information was received announcing details of the 'QUALITY' parish initiative a scheme that parish and town councils have to pass to be awarded 'QUALITY' Parish or Town Council Status.

The seat has now arrived in Memorium of Mr. Stanley Hargreaves and will shortly be placed on Farnhill Moor. Kildwick C.E. Primary School are kindly contributing to the cost in recognition of the work Stanley did for the school.

Enquiries have been made in the village about brown wheelie bins. The bins will not be supplied at the moment, due to the difficulties of the wagons getting into the village, as the wagons used for the brown bins are larger, but it is an ongoing thing.

The date for the next meeting to be held in Kildwick & Famhill Institute is Thursday 1st May at 7.30pm, followed by the Annual Parish Meeting on **Thursday 8th May at 7.30pm** at the same venue.

Bradford Curry Project. "Working together to help those in need"

The Bradford Curry Project is a multi - faith , multi - cultural society in which all the major faiths in Bradford work together to serve those in need. There are clear problems of poverty, homelessness and social exclusion in Bradford and the project aims to tackle all these.

The project is based at the moment at the El Hudda Mosque in Legrams Lane but has been serving meals to homeless and vulnerable people for over 10 years in and around the centre of Bradford.

It was started by a Sikh, Lashonan Singh who was inspired by the Gurdwara principle:- anyone who goes to a Sikh place of worship is offered food as part of the hospitality. There was always food left over, so it was a case of finding others who might need it!

Meals are served to anyone who comes - varying from teenagers to men in their sixties and seventies, some are drug addicts, some are men who have been homeless for most of their lives, and there are some who have separated from their families through crime and drink problems.

Male and female, young or old, they are all given sustenance by the volunteers - Sikhs, Muslims, Christians, Hindus, and people of no particular faith and, in addition to providing food, the project provides help, advice, contacts, social and group support as well as making referrals when appropriate. The project is very grateful for the active support received from individuals and churches and other organisations in the area.

Airedale Hospital Chaplaincy

On my first day on the wards as a brand new chaplain I was rather nervous and wondered how people would react to seeing a dog collar at their bedside. The very first patient I saw confirmed my worst fears: he said "Eh up - I'm not that bad am I?" I then spent an anxious few moments trying to explain to him that we visit most of the patients who come in and that you don't have to be dying to get a visit from a member of the Chaplaincy Team!

Above all, the work in the Chaplaincy at Airedale is a team effort. Without the great generosity of spirit and dedication of the volunteer chaplains assistants, and other volunteers who contribute to the smooth running of the Sunday services, our ability to serve the patients would be hugely diminished.

One of the real joys of our work is the characters we meet: people from different cultures, beliefs and with such rich experiences of life. It is our privilege to be able to listen to their stories and perhaps by listening, help them to come to terms with what their current illness might mean for them. Sometimes, when a person is able to express in words what they most fear, the sting is taken out of it and they can find peace and therefore speed up the healing process.
