Alleluia! Christ is risen. He is risen indeed. Alleluia

You will be reading this as we celebrate the joy of Easter and rejoice that Jesus, who died, is alive and lives with us forever. As God's people, his family on earth, we are called again and again to celebrate the presence of the living Christ with us. Brother Roger, the leader of Taize' community in France, has spoken about the importance of Christ's continual presence through the Holy Spirit; "What astonishes us about Christ is his presence. He is not visible to our eyes and never does he impose himself on us, But, risen from the dead, Christ could say to each of us: `Are you not aware that, by the Holy Spirit, I live in you? Never forget that you are 'inhabited Even if we often feel nothing of this mysterious presence, it remains there forever."

Christ is always present. It is our choice whether to make this truth a reality in our lives or not. The good news is that faith in Christ is a gift from God, freely given. The `bad news,' we might say is that whilst the gift may be free, it does require a very real response on our part.

But by the grace of God, the `bad news' is changed into more good news as we say our 'Yes' to God, accept the gift of Christ's presence in our lives and allow him make a difference,

The hope must be that we can genuinely review our 'Yes' to God not just occasionally but at the dawn of each new day. The following is a prayer used daily in the office for Morning Prayer: 'As we rejoice in the gift of this new day, so may the light of your presence, 0 God, set our hearts on fire for love for you; now and for ever. Amen.' You might like to commit this prayer to memory and use it from time to time.

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THE CHURCH AT PRAYER (4)

After the prolonged period of wet and windy weather there are many things needing attention in the garden:

- •Fencing seats and decking to be repaired and treated with p1ant-friendly preservative
- lawns to be spiked and given a dressing of moss killer and lawn feed,
 roses to be sprayed on a windless day, remembering the surrounding soil as blackspot spores linger there.
- •plant tomato and bedding plant seeds in a warm position on a window `sill or greenhouse. ..-
- •set begonia and dahlia tubers in compost ready for planting out in June.•declare war on creeping buttercups, bittercress before it seeds

Grow some mixed salad leaves in a grow-bag for cut and come again. Various varieties available such as "Nice and Spicy" or "Meek and Mild".

<u>Grow your own dinner collections</u>. Packets of mixed seeds available for young gardeners.

Easter is a good time to take a walk in the woods to look for spring flowers - primroses, celendines violets, anenomes and kingcups by the ponds and streams. Another herald of spring is frog and toad spawn in still waters.

Minced meat is easy to cook and very versatile. Try beef for the meatballs and lamb for the Moussaka Meatballs

225g (8ozs) minced beef	1 garlic clove, crushed
100g (4ozs) sausage meat	295g tin condensed oxtail soup
salt and pepper	300ml (½ pt) water
plain flour	3 tablesp. Tomato puree
2 tablesp veg. oil	2 teasp. sugar
2 onions, peeled and sliced	

- 1. Mix together beef, sausage meat, salt and pepper. On a floured surface shape the mixture into 16 even sized balls.
- 2. Heat oil in a pan, add meatballs, cook over high heat until browned. Remove onto a plate. Lower heat; add onions and garlic, cook gently for 2 –3 mins.
- 3. Return meatballs to pan, add all remaining ingredients and bring to the boil. Cover and simmer for approx. 20 mins.

Moussaka

3 medium aubergines, sliced	2 tablesp. tomato puree
450g (11b) minced lamb or beef	90ml (3fl ozs) red or white wine
2 tablesp. olive oil	½ teasp. ground cinnamon
2 onions, peeled and chopped	1 teasp. dried oregano
2 garlic cloves, crushed	salt and pepper
1 level tablesp. plain flour	Topping
Oven Elect 180c (350f) Gas 4	450 ml (¾ pt) homemade

	now available in supermarkets)

- 1. Put aubergines in a colander, sprinkle with salt and leave to stand for 30 mins.
- 2. Meanwhile heat 1 tablesp. oil in a pan and cook meat until browned, stir to break up any lumps. Add onions and garlic; cook until softened then stir in the flour.
- 3. Add tomato puree, wine, cinnamon, oregano and seasoning. Simmer for approx. 20 mins.
- 4. Drain aubergines on kitchen paper, heat 1 tablesp. oil in a frying pan and fry each slice until golden.
- 5. Place half of the slices in a casserole dish pour in the meat mixture then cover with remaining aubergines. Pour cheese sauce on top and cook in a preheated oven (uncovered) for approx. 45 mins until golden.

Did you Know

Look to...Treble's going....She's gone... is the call used to let the other bell ringers know when to start ringing.

3 bells were rung from the ground floor when the tower was built 600 years ago.

In 1780 a new peal of 6 bells were installed in the tower. The bells bear the inscriptions of the vicar and the church wardens.

The 1780 inscriptions can still be seen on the bells today.

In 1914 the 6 bells were recast and a new treble (lightest bell) and a new tenor (heaviest bell) were added to make it up to a ring of 8 bells - it is these bells we ring today.

The heaviest bell weighs 15cwt.1qtr.18lb - that's ³/₄ of a ton, or a Ford Focus. Yet despite its weight and size it can be rung by a 12 year old.

The hearse was kept in the tower (1772) to save the 5 shillings (25p) per year it was costing to keep it at the pub. You can still see where the door was enlarged to get it in the tower. The doorway was restored during the 1901-3 restoration.

When we ring for a wedding we raise the font cover so that we can see when the bride and groom walk up the aisle.

St Andrew's, Kildwick is one of the few towers left in the country to have Yorkshire Ends. That's the fluffy bit on the end of the rope.

When the weather is damp the rope can shrink in length by 1ft (30cm)

Each rope is about 60ft (18m) long.

From September we will not be ringing on Sunday unless we get more bellringers.
