#### The Vicar's letter.....

Dear friends,

A happy Christmas and a happy New Year to you. I hope you are continuing to celebrate with great joy and gladness the good news of Christmas as we give thanks for God's gift to us of himself as the Christ-child, God with us, Emmanuel.

Christmas is, of course, about the coming of God into our world, the human world, in the person Jesus. The story of the birth, life, death and resurrection of Jesus is the Christian story; the story that has challenged and encouraged the peoples of the world for the past two millennia.

As we begin another year the story of Jesus, God-with-us, is one that invites our deepest reflection as we gaze in wonder at the Christ-child in the Christmas crib and contemplate the mystery of this Love made flesh. The challenge, as Rowan Williams reminded us, in his last Christmas sermon as Archbishop of Canterbury, is "to look at Jesus, who asks of us initially just to stop and reflect, to stay for a moment in the light that allows us to see ourselves honestly and to see the world differently". He also reminds us that, "Jesus does not come to give us a set of techniques for keeping God happy; and he certainly doesn't come to create a harmless eccentric hobby for speculative minds. He comes to make humanity itself new, to create fresh possibilities for being at peace with God and each other; and he does this by summoning us to be with him".

The story of Jesus is one that speaks of what it means to be truly human, living in fulfilled relationships of loving forgiveness with each other. As we gaze in wonder at all that Jesus is, the shock is to realise that it is as though we are gazing into a mirror which reveals, if we can only see, the truth about ourselves, as individuals and collectively. Jesus is the One who shines the light of love and forgiveness into the darkness of our human nature and reveals our brokenness and weaknesses.

The good news is that, again picking up Rowan Williams in his New Year message, the Christian story "isn't a social problem or an old-fashioned embarrassment; it's a well-spring of energy and source of life-giving vision for how people should be regarded and treated".

As we move into this new year will you resolve to see yourself more honestly and see the world around you differently, doing all within your energy and power to make a difference how everyone is regarded and treated?

I have quoted Rowan Williams who has now stepped down as Archbishop of Canterbury. We now look forward to Bishop Justin Welby taking up the mantel; he will formally take up the office on 4<sup>th</sup> February before his enthronement in Canterbury Cathedral on 21<sup>st</sup> March. We give thanks for the ministry of Archbishop Rowan and we now pray for Archbishop-elect Justin as he seeks to hold before us the vision of the gospel in the years ahead.

Personally, I am now preparing for taking a period of study leave from the parish for 3 months from 10<sup>th</sup> May. During my time away the parish will be in the care of the churchwardens and retired clergy. More details will be given nearer the time.

I hope that you will know God's presence close to you in your journey through this year. May the Love and the Light that God has revealed to us in Jesus be your encouragement and your challenge.

# Week of Prayer for Christian Unity 18<sup>th</sup> – 25<sup>th</sup> January

In 1989 when the Churches committed themselves afresh to the ecumenical vision of full visible unity, they stated clearly that they were to be "no longer strangers but pilgrims together". The image of 'pilgrimage', which recurs throughout Christian theology and spirituality, is a powerful and important one for the ecumenical movement. Pilgrimage implies walking and for this year's Week of Prayer for Christian Unity we are asked to reflect upon our ecumenical pilgrimage: how we walk together and walk humbly with God.

This year the theme is "What does God require of us?"


The British and Irish resources for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity 2013 are based on the international material compiled this year by the Student Christian Movement of India (SCMI), along with the All India Catholic University Federation and the National Council of Churches in India. In reflecting on the significance of the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity they decided that in a context of great injustice to Dalits in India and in the Church, the search for visible unity cannot be disassociated from the dismantling of casteism and the contribution to unity by the poorest of the poor.

Casteism results in the Dalits being socially marginalized, politically under-represented, economically exploited and culturally subjugated. Almost 80% of Indian Christians have a Dalit background. During the Week of Prayer, Christians all over the world will explore in ecumenical fellowship what it means to do justice, to love kindness and to walk humbly with God (Micah 6:8).

This theme is developed over the eight days by the metaphor of walking. For Dalit communities, the walk towards liberation is inseparable from the walk towards unity. So our walk with Dalits this week, and with all who yearn for justice, is an integral part of the prayer for Christian unity. Christians in India should reject caste divisions, just as Christians worldwide should not accept the divisions among them: "Is Christ divided?" (1 Corinthians 1:13). As we gather to pray for the unity which Christ wills for his Church, we are called to break down such walls of divisions among and between us.

The text is taken from Micah 6.6-8:

- <sup>6</sup> 'With what shall I come before the LORD, and bow myself before God on high? Shall I come before him with burnt-offerings, with calves a year old?
- <sup>7</sup> Will the LORD be pleased with thousands of rams, with tens of thousands of rivers of oil? Shall I give my firstborn for my transgression, the fruit of my body for the sin of my soul?'

#### 100,000 downloads for BRF Bible reading apps

While surveys show that daily Bible reading is an uphill struggle for many Christians, with time pressure, relevance and simply knowing where to start being key reasons, there appears to be no shortage of interest in trying new ways to solve the problem.

The Bible Reading Fellowship (BRF) launched their first daily Bible reading notes app, based on their New Daylight series, in February 2010. Two more apps have followed, based on their Guidelines notes (offering a wider breadth of theological viewpoints) and Day by Day with God, (daily reading notes written by women for women). Today, downloads of their three apps have passed

100,000, with readers spread worldwide.

#### **BIBLE HISTORY**

**JESUS THE TEACHER: 5. THE INCLUSIVE JESUS** 



esus attacked the Pharisees because they observed a whole range of purity rituals which set them apart from the majority of the population. They believed that only those who observed them would enter the coming kingdom of heaven. Jesus believed these practices led to religious extremism and then in turn to political disaster when others united to destroy them. He took the opposite course. The Pharisees criticised him for eating with publicans and sinners. This does not mean evil people. For the Pharisees sinners were all those who did not or, who because of their employment, could not follow their purity rules. It was this sort of inclusive behaviour that made Jesus so popular with the Galilean peasants and fishermen and even his inclusion of a tax gatherer among his disciples does not seem to have dented his reputation.

Jesus' story of the wedding feast where the invited guests who were summoned failed to attend and which led the manager of the feast to go out into the highways and byways to find replacements showed that inclusiveness extended to the poor as well. Nor did Jesus forget women. In a society which suspected the morals of any woman who lived in a non-familial setting, the existence of a group of them who followed him around, and were welcomed not disowned, was a matter for considerable comment. Other examples of inclusiveness, however, led to more serious questioning.

When an expert in the law asked Jesus what he should do to inherit eternal life, he replied by asking him what was written in the law. He answered. Love the Lord your God, with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind and your neighbour as yourself. When the expert then asked him to define who his neighbour was Jesus told the story of the Good Samaritan. The story is really a criticism of ritual purity and Jesus chose a Samaritan as his charitable neighbour to underline the offensiveness of such practices but it does imply that individual Samaritans could enter his kingdom. For Galileans this was inclusiveness going too far. They hated Samaritans and shortly after the crucifixion the Romans had to intervene to stop fighting between them.

Jesus' message was to the Jews but what about Gentiles? The only direct reference to them is the story of the Syro-Phoenician woman whose sheer persistence persuaded Jesus to cure her daughter.

Mark tells us that Jesus tried to keep his visit to her house a secret. I noted in an earlier article two examples of Jesus curing people from a distance. Both were Gentiles and some scholars believe that Jesus performed the cures in their homes and that the miracle stories were designed to cover up visits which would be unacceptable to orthodox Jews. These examples suggest that when the manager of the feast went out into the highways and byways some of the replacement guests he brought back could have been Gentiles.

The club is lead by our wonderful SEN team leader supported by an assistant and a hardworking volunteer. The children come and play, have chance to be creative and receive one to one attention. The hearing impaired children are learning to sign and together they experience the love of Jesus. In June with the support of our social workers it was wonderful to see 4 of the children join a SEN learning unit run by a local school. This is a very challenging time as the parents have to accompany their child each day to school. Jigsaw helps with the bus fair and school needs but the majority of the

support and work comes from the children's amazing and caring mothers. Please pray for our SEN work as our dream is to have a specially dedicated room for the project, more training for teachers and to be able to reach more SEN children living in the slum, squatter and street communities that Jigsaw works in. Please pray especially

for 2 deaf and mute children who are unable to come at the moment as the area where they live has become too dangerous for our staff to collect them from. This is so sad as this may be their only opportunity in life to receive the specific love and care that they need. SAFE PLACES FOR CHILDREN TO BE CHILDREN, TO PLAY & TO KNOW THE LOVE OF CHRIST was the starting point of Jigsaw almost 10 years ago. Today this foundation has not changed. Playing is a gift from God to His children. #### Training manual for children and advocates

The manuals train children to know how to react when they see signs of different abuses in their communities. Jeannette and Jenalyn shared with me how proud they were when the books were published as on the back were the logos of UNICEF, World Vision and others and there in the middle was the logo of Jigsaw. God is certainly using Jigsaw in powerful ways.

#### Solid Rock - Love struck!!

SOLID ROCK is Jigsaw's youth ministry headed up by Venus and Aaron our youth leaders. One of the goals of Solid Rock is to nurture the youth in faith and life skills. Some of the many difficulties for the youth in the slum and squatter areas originate from boy/girl relationships; many have never known or seen Godly and loving youth/marriage relationships. Recently, solid rock held its 'Love Struck' seminar for over 90 young people lead by an author who presented his book 'love struck.' Love struck is all about Godly loving and responsible young people's relationships. This is so pioneering to bring Gods good news and ways of relationships to these young people. Venus and Aaron said, "The day was such a huge success, the young people's eyes were opened to something so new, God's ways for young people and marriage relationships. It was amazing and within the day a number of toughened and hurting young people heard of love and found Christ for the first time." Praise God.



# Saints and Such

#### 14 Felix of Nola (d 260)

What do you do when you find a large spider web in your house? If you ever feel some sympathy for the spider who went to all that trouble, then Felix is a good patron saint for you. He was saved by such a spider, spinning such a web.

Felix had been born to a Syrian soldier who had retired to Nola, near Naples in Italy. When his father died, Felix gave his property and money away, and was ordained by St Maximus of Nola. Felix went to work with him, ministering to the people of Nola.



Then Decius, the Roman Emperor, began another persecution of the Christians. Maximus escaped to the mountains, but Felix was arrested and badly beaten. Legend has it that he was rescued – and freed from captivity - by an angel. In any case, Felix followed Maximus and found him sick and in need. Felix hid him in an empty building, and prayed for God's protection. The soldiers were out looking for the two men, but then a spider arrived at the door of the building where they were hiding. The spider spun such a magnificent web across the door that it fooled the imperial soldiers into thinking the building was long abandoned. The spider save Maximus and Felix that day, and the two men stayed on the run until Decius' death in 251.

After that, the people of Nola wanted Felix as their bishop. But Felix refused, and returned to farming his lands; giving the poor most of the food that he managed to grow. Though Felix went on to die naturally, he was still thought of as a martyr, or 'witness' because he had suffered torture, imprisonment and privations in the persecution. Felix did not mind: he served a King who was not of this world, and he looked forward to a better future life with that King in a new heaven and a new earth.

#### 27 Angela Merici (1474 - 1540)

With international concern about the welfare of children, Angela is a good saint to remember as the year gets underway. Not only did she herself survive a harsh childhood, but she went on to dedicate her own life to helping children in need.

Angela was born near Lake Garda, in Desenzano, where she was orphaned as a young child. The 1480s were hardly an easy time for orphaned girls, but somehow Angela survived to grow into her teens, when she became a Franciscan tertiary. However miserable her own childhood, Angela chose to let it work for good in her life: she decided to devote her own life to the education of poor girls. Girls! This was a time when most of the men were illiterate!

#### National roll-out of the 2013 Real Easter Egg Campaign







#### Farnhill and Kildwick History Group - Review of 2012

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Looking back on 2012 the Farnhill and Kildwick History group can be proud of how far it has come in such a short space of time. In this, our first full year, we have become well established with regular meetings, talks and mention fieldtrips; not to researching stories of local interest and publishing photographs and articles on our web pages.



The History Group would like thank everyone who has contributed to making our first full year as a group such a success.

If you have attended a meeting or talk, brought along information, contributed photographs and articles for the website, helped to arrange trips and events, put up posters, spoken at one of our talks or played host to the group – a big thank you. If you haven't been to a meeting or event we look forward to welcoming you in 2013.

During the year we have enjoyed a variety of informative talks from guest speakers. In April Bronte expert Isabel Stirk told us about the lives of this literary family and their local connections. Historian Ian Dewhirst captivated us in October with his tales of Keighley in the inter-war years. In November, Dales archaeologist Dr Roger Martlew, explained some of the mysteries surrounding the ancient barrows on Bradley Moor.

Thankfully we were blessed with fine weather for our summer field trips which found us exploring the long barrow on Bradley Moor and taking a closer look at the Farnhill Hall estate and the great barn at Farnhill Hall Farm.

In our meetings we have looked at artefacts and documents ranging from coronation souvenirs that were given to villagers in 1937 to late 19th century plans for row upon row of terraced housing at Middleton in Farnhill which was never built. We've looked at old photographs and heard old poetry about Kildwick and Farnhill.

Guests at our meetings have included Alison Armstrong who spoke about Medieval Architecture in relation to Farnhill Hall, and Marcel and Keith Bunnett who helped us discover how a former resident of Farnhill was involved in the "Great Escape" from Stalag Luft III in World War II.

Members have researched and written about a range of topics from the Kildwick typhoid epidemic of 1898 which killed 10 people, to how the villages celebrated past royal events including the building of Farnhill's Jubilee Pinnacle, and more light-hearted matters such as "When the milk came by donkey" and "When the circus came to town". But Angela was an audacious woman, and she had only just begun. She and some close companions set to work in the name of Christ, seeking out the poor families in their community. Angela taught the young girls all that she could, and prayed with them, assuring them that even they were precious in the eyes of their Creator.

All of which left the Roman Catholic Church badly baffled. What should they do with religious sisters who had taken no vows, still wore their lay clothes, and who, instead of walling themselves up in some nunnery to lead an enclosed life, spent their days in a decidedly mobile, highly visible fashion – out and about in community support?

It wasn't until 1565, some 25 years AFTER Angela's death, that the Church decided it approved of such work. By then the Ursuline nuns, as they were by then called, were going from strength to strength. They still flourish today, with some 2400 Ursuline Sisters in 27 provinces on six continents, and have been well described as 'the oldest and most considerable teaching order of women in the RC Church.'

It took nearly 300 years, but in 1807 the Roman Catholic Church decided that Angela, unveiled, unenclosed and unsupervised as she had been, had been a saint after all – and 'made' her one.

#### FARNHILL PARISH COUNCIL SUMMARY OF DRAFT MINUTES

The meeting of Farnhill Parish Council was held on the 4<sup>th</sup> December 2012 in Kildwick/ Farnhill Institute. The meeting was chaired by Counc. H Matysniak. Six members of the council were present.

The minutes of the meeting held on the 6th November were approved by the Council and signed as a correct record by the Chairman.

Trustees of the Kildwick/Farnhill Institute gave a report on why they need continued funding from the Parish Council and stated that any money they had in reserves and the funding they receive from the Council will all be needed in the next couple of years. There is a lot of ongoing maintenance required and the kitchen needs updating in order to bring it to an acceptable standard for people wishing to cater. Members of the Council were invited to the Institute's meeting on the 12<sup>th</sup> December when discussions were to take place on further maintenance. Clerk to write and inform them that although we would like to support the Institute, in order to maintain accountability and justify the Council's spending, the Parish Council would like them to provide more detailed information on what they intend to use the money for and a rough estimate of cost and timescale of the work. The Parish Council will then consider their request at the January meeting.

Craven District Council have responded to the request to provide a solution to the water running down Main Street from the moor and they say there are 3 gully's very close to each other that will deal with the surface water easily. Any water coming off the moor in exceptional weather conditions might on occasion overwhelm the system, but that has happened in many places throughout Craven this summer. As this is not flooding properties it would be low priority.

CDC have responded to letters about parking problems on Grange Road and state there is very little prospect of providing a 20mph limit together with traffic calming measures due to the relatively low score such a scheme would achieve in their prioritization system. In 2008 a scheme was investigated and scored at being around 60<sup>th</sup> in the list of proposals for the Craven area alone. Their funding for such works has been reduced considerably over recent years hence there is very little likelihood of any scheme being implemented for the foreseeable future.

With regard to yellow lines, these can be installed to remove dangerous parking, however putting yellow lines down will remove the parking but will also have the likely effect of increasing traffic speeds. There will also still be the possibility that wherever they stop the yellow lines, vehicles will still park and may still create a hazard, and if these are local residents vehicles they would object to such a proposal. They have agreed to repaint the white lining already in place on the entrance to the Arbour and would consider extending the white line above the Arbour entrance on the brow of the hill if the Parish Council agreed to this. Clerk to respond saying that they would be agreeable to extending the white line as a starting point and the situation could then be monitored to see if there was any improvement.

NYCC Rep Counc P Mulligan informed the Parish Council that NYCC budget settlement is expected 19<sup>th</sup> December and that NYCC have had cuts of 69 million over 4 years and are expecting a further 22 million over the next 2 years. Area Committee are withdrawing subsidy for school journeys and things will get worse, but they are trying to preserve frontline services. He stated that there are seven areas in Area 5 and whereas there used

to be 7 managers this has been reduced to 4 and there are concerns about being less democratic. Positions are being shared with Boroughbridge and Harrogate and several executives are from the Hambleton area causing concern over our geographical representation.

After advertising the vacancy for Parish Councillor an election has not been requested, therefore the Parish Council can go ahead and co-opt a Councillor. The vacancy will be advertised and a note put on the website and any applications will be considered at the January meeting.

The Parish Council thanked Counc's D Atkinson and G Harling for organzing the Let's Talk Event which provided some useful contacts and ideas for activities and improving the village. An IT Class has already started in the village which has been kindly organized by Joyce Wood and Derek Blackwell and they hope to start a light exercise group in January. Kate Fulton is hoping to start a book club in the Institute and Counc J Waring is hoping to hold an activity day in the Institute with the help of All Together Now Group at Carers Resource . Counc H Law is corresponding with villagers on speeding and parking issues and is hoping to arrange for the speed gun to be used with a volunteer from the village and the police. Counc I Fulton will be gathering information about the need for allotments in the village. Counc H Matysniak updated the Council on an application made to Craven District Council Localism Reserve Fund for a grant for an information board for the car park. He provided a presentation to CDC, unfortunately the working group gave a recommendation not to fund the proposal due to: Little evidence of wider community support and no commitment to fund from the Parish Council plus the full amount was applied for. The Parish Council will consider gathering more information before making a decision on whether to make a further application at a later date.

Parish Councils have been advised to hold off the decisions for setting the precept for 2013/2014 as changes in the way help with council tax is administered mean that some parish tax-bases could differ significantly from previous years.

Craven District Council have provided an update on the future of the Car Park at Farnhill. The officer recommendation to Select Committee was to dispose of the car park, including retaining wall, at Farnhill Main Street. It is understood that the recommendation Select Committee are to put before Policy Committee in January 2013 is to retain the car park for the time being, and the question of ownership revisited when the economic climate is more favourable, in the meantime officers would seek to minimize maintenance costs and establish projected maintenance costs for the retaining wall. Select Committee is to meet again in early January and they suggest that the Parish Council provides any alternative solution for consideration to Select Committee prior to this meeting. Clerk to write to Craven District Council to advise them that the Council need more time to consider an alternative solution and that they should retain the Car Park for the time being. In the meantime the Parish Council Resolved to register the Car Park and Play Area as Community Assets under the localism act.


