The Vicar's letter.....

Dear friends,

Alleluia! Christ is risen. He is risen indeed. Alleluia!

We continue to proclaim this joyful acclamation at every service until we conclude the great fifty days of celebration between Easter Day and the Day of Pentecost (19th May). During these seven weeks the Christian Church proclaims to the world that we are an Easter people and Alleluia! is our song.

We sing our Alleluia! because we believe that in the death and resurrection of Jesus the world was shown something unique and precious. In the Jesus event the world was shown the true meaning of Love. On the cross Jesus opens wide his arms and says to those who are killing him, "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing". To love is to reach out with forgiveness even to our enemy, to the one who would do us harm.

The power of this Love, which is forgiveness, is affirmed in the resurrection. The risen, crucified Jesus, who has been ridiculed and abandoned even by those who journeyed with him through Galilee and to Jerusalem, does not seek revenge and retribution; instead, the risen Jesus says to those he meets "Peace be with you, do not be afraid".

The Love shown to us by Jesus is a radical, subversive love that invites a transformation of heart and mind; a transformation which moves us from darkness to light, from violence to non-violence, from death to life.

The world of full of violence as we know only too well from news reports around the world and from our own experiences of life as well. The tragedy, perhaps, is that so much goes unnoticed and unreported. We can find ourselves too easily immune from the shock of what is happening around us.

But we cannot ignore the shocking reality and are left struggling to make sense of the evil that one human being can inflict on another. The Boston Marathon bombing on 15th April shocked the world; the horror of such days must leave us asking big questions about evil and our human vulnerability. It always raises questions about our desire for justice.

After such events we invariably hear our national leaders promising that those responsible will feel the full weight of justice. But as one commentator said, "The phrase 'the full weight of justice' is always a veiled call to violence. The logic of violence is that it's always committed in the name of justice. The 'good' guys and the 'bad' guys always have the same justification for violence - and that justification is justice. Victims always see the violence committed against them as evil. When we are under the myth of redemptive violence, each side falsely believes that justice requires violent retaliation".


Is there any hope? we may well ask. The answer is that there is hope, but only when we each realise that before we can be delivered from the violence of others we need to be delivered from our own violence. Martin Luther King Jr said, "Darkness cannot drive out darkness, only light can do that".

We will be delivered from the darkness of evil only when we refuse to respond with evil of our own. Justice will only happen when we follow Jesus' command to love our enemies. True justice, true peace, is only possible with peaceful actions.

This is the message of the Easter season when we proclaim the One who is the forgiving victim of our human violence. The message of the risen, crucified Jesus, the One we are called to imitate in our daily lives, is the message of peace, joy, love for all humankind. Jesus, who is the human face of God, reveals through his life, death and resurrection that "God is love and those who live in love live in God and God lives in them" (1 John 4.16).

This joyful message of the Easter season, that each of us is infinitely beloved, has the

power to transform and renew hearts and minds.

This is the message that I carry with me as I begin my sabbatical on 13th May. The word sabbatical is derived from the same root as *sabbath* and the purpose of a sabbatical is to provide time for rest, study and reflection which can lead to renewal and re-creation. The focus of my sabbatical will be the completion of my dissertation for my MA in Psychotherapy & Counselling which I have been undertaking at the University of Leeds. This course has been a challenging and an enriching experience as I have reflected on the meaning of my own story lived in relation to others and in relation to the One I call 'my Lord and my God'.

During my absence from the parish the Churchwardens will be the first point of contact and they will be assisted by the retired clergy. I am most grateful to them and to everyone who will enable the life of the church here to continue until my return to duties on 27th August.

Until then I wish you every blessing and much peace.

Christian Aid Week 12th – 18th May

Seven amazing days

Christian Aid Week is seven amazing days of fundraising, action and prayer. It's a time when communities all over the country get together to raise funds to make real and lasting changes in the lives of some of the world's poorest people.



For example, people such as Catherine Nyaata, in the slums or informal settlements of Nairobi, Kenya have been given a significant boost as they try to work their way out of poverty. Thanks to Christian Aid partner organisation MNU, members of Catherine's community have been able to install five toilet and shower blocks. 'They have brought us more dignity. Previously there was none,' says Catherine.

Christian Aid is an international development agency with a vision – an end to poverty – and it believes that vision can become a reality. It works through partner organisations in around 50 countries for profound change that eradicates the causes of poverty, striving to achieve equality, dignity and freedom for all, regardless of faith or nationality.

The beginnings

The week started out as the churches' response to the horrors of the refugee crisis in Europe after the Second World War. The different churches in the UK and Ireland got together and started fundraising – sending the money through partner organisations that were best placed to make a difference on the ground.

Christian Aid Week

Christian Aid Week is Britain's longest-running fundraising week and has been a firm fixture in the calendar of many thousands of people each year. It continues to make a massive impact in the fight to end the scandal of poverty around the world.

The week raises about £9 million each year – and nearly £1 million in Gift Aid alone. The red Christian Aid envelope is an iconic symbol of the generosity of people in the UK and Ireland – giving money to those who need it most.

Some 22,000 churches work together to help make the week the success that it is. And it's not just the churches who are involved – schools, workplaces and individuals are all getting involved – whether through fundraising or by giving directly.

Report on Jigsaw Kids Ministries

Four of us attended the Annual General Meeting of Jigsaw Kids Ministries at Kirkheaton near Huddersfield and celebrated ten years of Jigsaw in Manila.

Children in the Phillippines do not matter so Jigsaw developed to enable children to be central and important effecting a transformation of the adults around the children. God has grown a body of supporters in the UK to provide funding so Jigsaw Kids Ministries UK has developed.



As Jigsaw has grown it has become more difficult for one person (Tim Lee) to fulfil all the needs of both organisations leading to poor communication.

Regular giving last year was maintained but is insufficient to support Jigsaw and this has resulted in periods when money was not available to pay staff wages and provide for the centres. This resulted in workers using their own money to keep the centres running. Money from one off donations and events is welcome but the uncertainty of this makes budgeting difficult.

A new Board of Trustees is proposed mainly based in St Ives in Cambridgeshire to facilitate the organisation. A Friends of Jigsaw is to be formed in the North to co-ordinate fund raising events. A similar group is running in St Ives which meets monthly to pray and fundraise.

Finance Plan

- 1. Current aim is to become fully funded on a monthly basis: this needs 300 people to commit £20 per month.
- 2. In the meantime to work towards future growth of Jigsaw being funded by a combination of giving and low risk sustainable projects organised by a Ways and Means Committee in the Philippines.
- 3. In the future (ten years ahead) Jigsaw will be funded by low risk sustainable business projects organised by Philippines Board.

New leaflets are available in Church about all the work of Jigsaw in Manila and donation forms for Jigsaw and School Sponsorship are available from Christine Anderton.

Future plans involve two websites for Jigsaw Manila and Jigsaw UK and Collection Boxes. As previously advertised Tim is taking a group to visit Manila in October which is a wonderful experience.

Please pray for more financial support for Tim and Jigsaw UK, for Tim's visit to Manila in May and for the staff and children at Jigsaw.



BIBLE HISTORY

written by Michael Baumber CRISIS IN GALILEE: 3. THE FEEDING OF THE FIVE THOUSAND



he story begins with Jesus going with his disciples into the desert beyond Bethsaida in an effort to get away from the crowds but he fails because the enthusiasm he has aroused is so great that he is pursued by around 5,000 people. We are told that he addressed them for so long that they became hungry and the account then focuses on how this vast audience was fed. Neither Matthew nor Mark tells us anything about what Jesus taught the crowd but both indicate that the meeting ended in confusion. They both reported that Jesus instructed his disciples to get into a boat and go before him across the lake to Capernaum, while he dismissed the crowd. What an odd thing to do, especially as it was late in the evening and the journey would have to take place in the dark. After a meeting like this surely it should have been the job of the disciples to disperse the crowd, not Jesus who must have been very weary.

Luke on the other hand is more forthcoming and writes that Jesus taught them about the Kingdom of God and healed many sick people. John adds a very revealing detail. He says that the crowd attempted to come and make him king by force. It has happened since. There was a revolt in the Sudan in 1881 allegedly led by a holy man known as the Mahdi. Proclamations were issued in the Mahdi's name by his so called deputy the Khalifa for four years before it was revealed that he had died in 1882. The action of Jesus in getting his disciples out of the way suggests strongly that he thought that a similar situation might arise and that they would side with the crowd.

This was the setting for the story of Jesus walking on the water. John simply says that Jesus retired into a mountain by himself and Luke makes Peter's confession of Christ as the Son of God take place immediately after the crowd disperses but Matthew and Mark again agree that he managed to rejoin the disciples on the lake. Did he do it by walking on the water as the two gospels say or was this a later embroidering of how Jesus escaped and somehow reached them by commandeering another boat? Luke does not include the story at all, even though he used Mark in other places and only Matthew has Peter trying to walk on the water as well as Jesus.

Whatever the truth of the stories the situation was clearly getting dangerous. What Jesus was doing had reached the ears of Herod Antipas. Time was running out. The last thing Jesus wanted was to end up in the Machaerus prison. The time for action was approaching rapidly.

Our churchyard nature reserves

I remember in May 2000 standing in a field opposite St Mary's Church, Hornham. As I said it was May, but it was raining and I remember asking the Bishop of Dunwich, who arrived in full kit, whether his robes were drip dry. It was one of a host of memories I have of travelling the country distributing Millennium Yews – small saplings propagated from ancient trees estimated to be at least 2000 years old and therefore alive when Christ walked on Earth. The Conservation Foundation gave almost 8000 young yews to parishes to celebrate the new millennium.


People came from their parishes to distribution services held in nearly every diocese. They were great affairs and we saw several cathedrals with standing room only. The size of the crowd at St Paul's Cathedral one dark November Sunday evening came as such a surprise that we very soon ran out of hymn sheets.

Another memory is having managed to arrange a lift for our young yews from our nursery in Bedfordshire to Chichester Cathedral on a brewery lorry. The lorry was too big to drive close to the cathedral and so a human chain was organised to pass the trees from volunteer to volunteer bridging the gap between lorry and cathedral.

Now 13 years later I wonder how those young trees are doing. We know that some have been lost for one reason or another, but we hear of others which are doing really well and should be well on their way towards their first one thousand years.

Maybe you remember planting a Millennium Yew in your churchyard, but maybe it's been forgotten. Many people bought commemorative plaques and put the tree's certificate on display to ensure that their special tree would be remembered. Please take a wander and make sure if you do have a Millennium Yew that it is not forgotten. Cooking Corner

Carrot and walnut cake with mascarpone and lime topping

Cake Ingredients

285g/10ozs unsalted butter, softened
285g/10ozs light brown sugar
5 large free range eggs, separated
Zest and juice of 1 orange
170g/6ozs self-raising flour.
1 slightly heaped tsp baking powder
115g/4ozs ground almonds
115g/4ozs shelled walnuts chopped + a handful for topping.
1 heaped tsp ground cinnamon
A pinch of ground cloves
A pinch of ground nutmeg
½ tsp ground ginger
285/10ozs peeled and coarsely grated carrots

Lime Icing

115g/4ozs mascarpone cheese 115g/4ozs full fat cream cheese 85g/3ozs icing sugar, sifted Zest and juice of 2 limes.

Method

- 1. Preheat oven to 180C/350F/gas 4
- 2. Grease and line a 22cm/9in square cake tin, equivalent round tin or 2 loaf tins with greaseproof paper
- 3. Beat butter and sugar together until pale and fluffy
- 4. Beat in egg yolks one by one
- 5. Add orange zest and juice.
- 6. Stir in the sifted flour, baking powder, ground almonds, walnuts, spices and grated carrots and mix well together.
- 7. In a separate bowl whisk the egg whites with a pinch of salt until stiff and then gently fold into cake mixture.
- 8. Scoop in to cake tin and cook for about 50 minutes until golden and risen
- 9. Cool in tin for 10 minutes then turn onto wire rack.
- 10. To make topping combine all the icing ingredients together and spread over cake.
- 11. Finish with sprinkling of chopped walnuts.

14th May: St Matthias

If you're saying to yourself, 'Who?' you'll be in good company. May 14th is the feast day of St Matthias the Apostle, and in describing him thus we have said just about all there is to know about him. He gets just one mention in the Bible, in the first chapter of Acts, immediately prior to the day of Pentecost, where it tells us that he was elected to take the place in the ranks of the twelve apostles recently vacated by the betrayer Judas Iscariot.

Eusebius, in the fourth century, says in his history of the apostolic era that Matthias was one of the seventy disciples sent out by Jesus (Luke 10:1), and that seems reasonable. When it was necessary to fill the vacancy among the apostles it would be natural to turn to someone who had followed Jesus from earlier years, as well as being a witness of the resurrection. Two names were suggested and prayed over. Then the apostles cast lots, following the Old Testament practice of the high priest's Urim and Thummim, one assumes. When they did, 'the lot fell on Matthias'.

Casting lots to fill vacancies on committees or councils, or even, I suppose, to appoint bishops, would seem to us a bizarre and risky practice, and it may be, as the great Victorian preacher Campbell Morgan suggested, that the eleven acted in haste and preempted God's choice of Saul (later known as Paul), who at that time was busy persecuting the Church, arresting Christians and having them thrown into prison. He hadn't yet travelled the Damascus Road.

Be that as it may, Matthias was elected, and for us he can stand for all those excellent, consistent, reliable and faithful servants of Christ who never make a headline, not even in the parish magazine. He was chosen because he could be a 'witness', and so are we.

Doubtless he fulfilled that responsibility admirably, without, as we say, 'setting the Thames on fire'. Let's salute him on his day - the 'Unknown Apostle'.

Day of Pentecost Sunday 19th May

On that long ago first morning of Pentecost, Jerusalem was crowded with thousands of visitors, for it was one of the most popular feast-days in the Jewish calendar – the Feast of Firstfruits, looking forward to the wheat harvest.

In one small room of that great city, a small group of people who had followed Jesus were praying. There was nothing else for them to do: Jesus had died, he had risen, and he had ascended, promising to send them 'a Comforter'. They were left alone, to wait at Jerusalem. And so they waited – on him, and for him. They were not disappointed: for that morning the Holy Spirit fell upon that small room, and transformed those believers into the Church, Christ's body here on earth. Pentecost was not the first time that the Holy Spirit came to the world – throughout the Old Testament there are stories telling of how God had guided people and given them strength. But now his Spirit would use a new instrument: not just isolated prophets, but the Church, his body on earth.

Acts opens with the preaching of the gospel in Jerusalem, the centre of the Jewish nation. Within 30 years the gospel had spread throughout the northern Mediterranean: Syria, Turkey, Greece, Malta... to the very heart of the Roman Empire: Rome. The Church was on the move – God was on the move! He was calling people from every nation to repent, turn to Jesus for forgiveness of their sins, and to follow him.

It was....

- 250 years ago:- on 16th May 1763 that the British literary figure Samuel Johnson met his future biographer, James Boswell, for the first time, in London. 'The Life of Samuel Johnson' is claimed by some to be the greatest biography ever written.
- 200 years ago: on 5th May 1813 that Soren Kierkegaard, Danish philosopher, theologian, religious writer and critic was born. He had a major influence on Existentialism.
- Also 200 years ago: on 22nd May 1813 that Richard Wagner, major German composer, best known for his dramatic operas (eg. The Ring Cycle), was born.
- 125 years ago: on 11th May 1888 that Irving Berlin, prolific Russian-born American composer and lyricist; one of the greatest American songwriters, was born. His songs include 'White Christmas', 'There's No Business Like Show Business', 'God Bless America' and many more.
- 100 years ago: on 25th May 1913 that Richard Dimbleby, pioneering British journalist and broadcaster, one of the greatest figures in British broadcasting history, was born.
- 90 years ago: on 26th May 1923 that the first Le Mans 24 hours endurance race was held.
- 80 years ago: on 2nd May 1933 that the first modern sighting of Scotland's Loch Ness monster was reported in the 'Inverness Courier'.
- 70 years ago: on 16th May 1943 that the Dambusters Raid took place when Britain's RAF launched Operation Chastise, deploying bouncing bombs to bypass anti-torpedo nets and breach dams, causing catastrophic flooding in Germany's Ruhr Valley.
- 65 years ago: on 14th May 1948 that David Ben-Gurion declared Israel an independent state as the British mandate in Palestine came to an end. The neighbouring Arab states of Egypt, Transjordan, Lebanon, Syria and Iraq invaded Israel the following day in support of the Palestinians, and Saudi Arabia invaded three days later.
- 60 years ago: on 29th May 1953 that New Zealand mountaineer Edmund Hillary and Sherpa Tenzing Norgay became the first people to reach the summit of Mount Everest.
- 40 years ago: on 17th May 1973 the Watergate hearings began in the US Senate, and were televised nationally.
- 25 years ago: on 11th May 1988 that Kim Philby, British intelligence officer and Soviet double agent, a member of the Cambridge spy ring, died.

- Also 15 years ago: on 11th May 1998 that a French mint began producing the first euro coins.
- Also 15 years ago: on 23rd May 1998 that the people of Northern Ireland voted to accept the Good Friday Agreement, with 75% in favour of a Northern Ireland Assembly.

FARNHILL PARISH COUNCIL SUMMARY OF DRAFT MINUTES

The meeting of Farnhill Parish Council was held on the 2nd April 2013 in Kildwick/Farnhill Institute. The meeting was chaired by Counc G Harling. Five members of the council were present plus CDC Rep Counc P Fairbank & NYCC Rep Counc. P Mulligan.

The minutes of the meeting held on the 5th March were approved by the Council and signed as a correct record by the Chairman.

No members of the public were present but the following e-mails were received from the public.

An e-mail was received from Kate Fulton about the book exchange which had four visitors on the 1st opening which she thought was quite good. She asked if the Parish Council could send out a flyer advertising the book exchange when sending out the newsletter. The Parish Council agreed to do so.

An e-mail was received from a member of the public regarding an attempt to create a flower bed at the top of the Arbour and could the Parish Council offer reassurance that the manicuring of Upper Arbour is not being further developed. The Parish Council agreed to take a look when meeting at the Arbour to see the results of the tree inspection.

An e-mail was received from a member of the public regarding parking issues in the village. It appears that some people think that they have reserved parking outside their houses and nobody else is allowed to park there. Clerk to reply to the e-mail stating that the highway is owned by NYCC and nobody has reserved parking outside their home, unless they are disabled and have applied for permission to have a white no parking line outside their house. Unfortunately the Parish Council have no powers to take any action with regards parking issues and can only offer general advice.

CDC Rep Counc P Fairbank informed the Parish Council that charging for the removal of garden waste is likely to start in the summer. Attempts to introduce an annual £24.00 charge were rejected by CDC three months ago but Councillors have now reversed that decision saying they need to raise more money. While it still needs the go ahead at full Council on April 23rd opposition Councillors claim it is already a done deal. The service is not one the Council have to provide and currently costs around £141.000 a year. If a third of the users agree to pay, the service will break even, with the potential to make money in future years. Introducing the charges could result in a drop in the council's recycling targets.

NYCC Rep P Mulligan reported that BT's project for rolling out superfast Broadband is going ahead and 90% of homes should be able to get superfast broadband by December 2014 with wi fi systems available for the other 10%. Farnhill & Kildwick will be getting an open reach upgrade. People need to be aware that once the infrastructure is in place they have to apply to their service provider to opt in to the package, it does not just happen.

The budget account and receipts & payments acc and supporting statement were received by Council and were Resolved to be a correct record and duly signed off. The Accounting Statement for the Annual Return was also approved and signed by Council.

The Clerk has made arrangements to meet up with the tree surgeon for him to explain in a bit more detail the results of the tree report from the inspection at the Arbour. The Parish Council will then meet at the Arbour and have a walk round to see issues first hand and

assess what needs to be carried out and eventually prepare a management plan for the Arbour. The Council will meet at the entrance to the Arbour by Arbour Holls At 200pm on Tuesday 9th April.

The Parish Council confirmed that the Annual Parish Meeting will be held on Tuesday 14th May 2013. Clerk to confirm with the Institute and book the downstairs room and the kitchen. Ideas were discussed for the format of the evening and the meeting will start with a summary of what happened at the last meeting and how things have progressed forward from there and a short brief on the precept. Having a short questionnaire on issues in the village was another possibility and then to possibly have a mini surgery where people could chose a table which they have an interest in. It was resolved that the flyer for the Annual Parish Meeting should be brief and contain details on the content of the evening.

After considering the report prepared by the Chairman on the results of the meeting with Gill Burkes on the different options for running the Institute the Parish Council Resolved not to pursue the matter any further. It was Resolved to refer the donations for the Institute through the donations policy and decide on a case by case basis as we would expect anyone else to do within the village . Trustees of the Institute have expressed an interest in meeting up with Gill Burkes to discuss liability issues and Clerk to ask if she would be willing to meet up with them.

Sergeant Taylor has forwarded our request for the community speed gun to be deployed to Sue Marklew for her attention:

Clerk has written to NYCC to remind them about the white lining at Arbour Top and they have apologized for the delay in getting the lining done as agreed. They are hoping for this together with other bits and pieces to be done in April. They do have lining contractors in the area at present however they are having to concentrate on the yellow line refreshment as part of Civil Parking Enforcement which is due to be implemented within the next couple of months.

Clerk has written to NYCC to remind them about the painting of the heritage lamp and they have replied by saying that all of their painting jobs are on hold until the weather picks up.

An e-mail has been received from Gary McKinney, stating that his elected period as the representative trustee for Farnhill PC on the Peggy Wilson Trust (Kildwick rec) ends on 18 July 2013. He is happy to continue in the role if the PC so wishes, and could we add this to the agenda of a meeting before 01 Jul this year and advise accordingly.





Have you been lucky enough to see Siskins, redpolls and, just possibly, Waxwings in your garden recently? A shortage of seeds and fruits in the countryside has forced many species of birds to raid gardens for substitutes. For anyone interested in watching the birds that come and go in their garden, the last few months have been fascinating.


You may also have seen an increased number of Blackbirds over the last few months, many of which breed in Germany and surrounding countries and migrate to the UK, joining our resident Blackbirds, to avoid the harsher winters in these areas. Winter is a busy time for birds in gardens and the help we give them during severe weather keeps many thousands alive, as well as providing us with a wonderful display of colour and movement.

Long-tailed Tits, easily recognised because they have what their name suggests; Redwings, which are like Song Thrushes but have white stripes across their eyes and, yes, red underwings; plus Chaffinches, are just some of the birds that have been more frequent visitors to gardens than usual this year. If you have seen these birds, it might well have been for a short stopover; although if they liked what they found, they will have come back more than once.

It's too early to tell what has happened to our more resident birds during the long hard winter and the record breaking wet "summer" that preceded it. Wrens, for example, are so small that they have a limited ability to keep warm, while Blue Tits suffered badly last year; the wet weather during their breeding season meant that the caterpillars they needed to feed their young were scarce. In both cases we can only wait until the end of the new breeding season to really find out how their populations have fared.
