

The Vicar's letter.....

Dear friends,

November is the month of remembrance. It is also a time when we think about the meaning of community and communion shared with all God's people, past, present and future.

We begin the month with the Church's celebration of All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day and then we move to the national observance of Remembrance



The observance of All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day serves to remind us that no Christian is solitary. Through baptism we become members one of another in Christ, members of a company of saints whose mutual belonging transcends death.

All Saints' Day celebrates women and men in whose lives the Church as a whole has seen the grace of God powerfully at work. It is an opportunity to give thanks for that grace, and for the wonderful ends to which it shapes a human life; it is time to be encouraged by the example of the saints and to recall that Godly love and goodness may grow in the ordinary circumstances, as well as the extraordinary crises, of human living. So we celebrate not just those people who names are known to the whole Church from history, such as Andrew the Apostle or Francis of Assisi, but also all those whose names are known just to us personally and those whose names are known only to God.

All Souls' Day, also known as the Commemoration of the Faithful Departed, celebrates those who have gone before us through death in a more local and intimate and immediate key. It allows us to remember with thanksgiving by name those whom we have known more directly; those who gave us life or who nurtured us in faith.

These days lead us to reflect deeply on the nature of God's presence with us in the world and the meaning of the good news of the gospel story of Jesus.

There has recently been a meeting of the College of Bishops of the Romans Catholic Church in Rome to mark the 50th anniversary of the opening of the Second Vatican Council. The Anglican Bishop of Sheffield, Stephen Croft, invited to be an observer at the meeting, drew attention in his blog to the briefing document for the meeting. Under the heading "Jesus Christ, the Good News of God to Humanity" the document begins as follows:


"The Christian faith is not simply teachings, wise sayings, a code of morality or a tradition. The Christian faith is a true encounter and relationship with Jesus Christ. Transmitting the faith means to create in every place and time the conditions which lead to this encounter between the person and Jesus Christ. The goal of all evangelisation is to create the possibility for this encounter, which is at one and the same time, intimate, personal, public and communal".

Stephen Croft goes on to say, "The gospel is great good news: the question asked by humanity in every generation is the same: is God there and is God good? The good news we proclaim is that God has broken his silence and spoken and Jesus is his word. God is a God who loves us, suffers with us. God is no longer the great stranger. God has spoken and has broken the great silence. This is good news today as it was in the days of the apostles".

As we remember all those who have witnessed to the truth of God revealed in Jesus the Christ may we do all we can in our own lives today to proclaim the love, joy and peace that is God's will for the world.

God bless you, and bless you richly.





The churchyard yew tree

You may have noticed that the yew tree located immediately to the left of the church porch has grown over the years to such a size that it is now rather unsightly and is also encroaching on the church building itself. It is also possible that the tree roots will cause problems to the fabric of the building in the future.

At its meeting in September the PCC noted that the tree is not the type of yew which was intended to be planted, being spreading rather than vertical growing. It further noted that managing the tree by pruning would not stop ongoing difficulties of managing the growth and appearance of the tree.

The PCC therefore agreed that the appropriate action to deal with the situation would be to fell the tree and resolved to apply to Craven District Council for permission. Consultations have taken place with representatives of Kildwick Parish Meeting and the CDC Tree Officer.

It is expected that permission to fell the tree will be granted in early November. Once permission is received arrangements will be made to carry out the work.

Posada (Travelling Crib) - A Project for Advent



This year we will again be sending two travelling cribs on a journey around our community during Advent. Posada is a Spanish word meaning 'inn'. Posada celebrations originated in Mexico where two young people were chosen to dress up as Mary and Joseph. They used to travel from house to house in their village telling people about the imminent arrival of Jesus and asking them it they would give him a room. On Christmas Eve they would re-enact a community play and bring figures of Mary and Joseph to be place in the crib.

The modern day equivalent is based on this concept, but enables different people to give a home to the nativity figures for a night. Beginning their journey at the 10am service on Advent Sunday (2nd December) the figures in the cribs will travel around the parish each day from home to home arriving in church at the Crib Service at 4pm on Christmas Eve in time for the first celebration of the birth of Jesus.

Posada has been encouraged in this country by the Church Army and many parishes now enjoy sharing in this special Advent project. We look forward to using Posada to help people celebrate more meaningfully the season of Advent.



BIBLE HISTORY

JESUS THE TEACHER: 3.THOSE WHO HAVE EARS TO HEAR LET THEM HEAR;



Isteners may well have taken them at face value but others would have been puzzled. What was the fate of the prodigal son, for instance? Returning to his father may well have saved him from starvation but it surely condemned him to be his brother's servant for the rest of his life. And what about the day labourers, paying the last comers the same as those who had borne the heat of the day was both unfair and economic nonsense which would soon bring the employer to bankruptcy. In one story Jesus condemned the servant who buried the money he had been given in the ground when he might have employed it usefully, yet elsewhere he told his followers to take no care for the morrow at all! And what about this king or lord who lurked in the background? Who was he? Most of the rulers they knew were far from benign and were as much to blame for their sufferings as the corrupt servants Jesus so often berated.

This confusion of mind extended even to Jesus' disciples. After he told the parable of the sower and the seed, they came to him and asked him to explain it to them. His response tells us not only the real meaning of the parable but what Jesus was trying to do. Good teachers will put before their classes examples of what they want them to learn, in the hope that they will then use them to solve similar problems without prompting from the teacher. So Jesus explains how the sower was sowing not seed but God's word. Some of the listeners would grasp fully what he was telling them, and they would use what they had learned to interpret the other parables. If the seed was God's word not seed, then the king, lord or landowner in the background of many of them was God' not earthly power brokers and, like the parable of the sower, they were also using familiar situations to explain what God's purposes were. They were the hundredfold. Not all the seed would land on good ground. Some would partially understand, with some it would go in one ear and out of the other and many would reject God's message all together.

This use of parables had an advantage. Jesus knew that sooner or later he would fall foul of those in authority. What he needed to do was delay the inevitable as long as possible so he could get his message across to as many followers as possible. John the Baptist perished because he had openly denounced Herodias, the wife of Herod Antipas. At no point do the evangelists record Jesus as attacking any of those in power individually. instead he uses his parables as a weapon against the system itself without naming names. Unfortunately it also had a disadvantage. His hearers might well misunderstand what he was driving at and many of them did.

Bonfire Yorkshire Parkin

This Parkin Recipe is easy to make and creates a lovely, moist sticky cake - though you can eat the cake almost immediately it gets stickier if you wrap and store it for several days. The other beauty of the cake is it keeps really well in an airtight tin, can be eaten as a cake or warm as a pudding with a dollop of custard.

Prep Time: 20 minutes

Cook Time: 1 hour, 30 minutes

Ingredients:

- 8 oz/220g soft butter
- 4 oz/110g soft, dark brown sugar
- 2oz / 55g black treacle/molasses
- 7oz / 200g golden syrup/ corn syrup
- 5oz/ 120g medium oatmeal
- 7 oz/ 200g self raising flour
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 4 tsp ground ginger
- 2 tsp nutmeg
- 1 tsp mixed spice
- 2 large eggs, beaten
- 2 tbsp milk



Preparation:

Heat the oven to 275°F/140°C/gas 1

- 1. Grease an 8" x 8"/ 20cm x 20cm square cake tin.
- 2. In a large heavy-based saucepan melt together the butter, sugar, treacle, golden syrup over a gentle heat. Do not allow the mixture to boil, you simply need to melt these together.
- 3. In a large, spacious, baking bowl stir together all the dry ingredients. Gradually add the melted butter mixture stirring to coat all the dry ingredients and mix thoroughly.
- 4. Gradually, beat in the eggs a few tablespoons at a time. Finally add the milk and again stir well.
- 5. Pour the mixture into the prepared tin and cook for $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours until firm and set and a dark golden brown.
- 6. Remove the parkin from the oven and leave to cool in the tin. Once cool store the Parkin in an airtight tin for a minimum of 3 days if you can resist eating it, you can even leave it up to a week before eating and the flavours really develop and the mixture softens even further and become moist and sticky. The Parkin will keep up to two weeks in an airtight container

LEAVING A LEGACY

Leaving a gift in your Will to a cause close to your heart is your opportunity to make a huge difference. For many charities – including the nine that run Will Aid together – gifts in Wills account for up to 50% of their income. Without these legacies so much of their work would not be possible.

Legacy gifts to charities are tax-free under current legislation. There are three types of gift. You can:

- Leave a share of your estate (a residuary gift)
- Leave a fixed amount of money (a pecuniary gift)
- Leave a particular item (a specific gift)

The most valuable gifts to charities are residuary gifts. But any gift in your Will, large or small, will give hope to vulnerable people in the UK and around the world.

Why review your will?

Ever since the first edition of the Book of Common Prayer nearly 500 years ago, the Church of England has encouraged people to ensure their will is up to date. Why? Well, if you don't leave an up-to-date will it can cause needless problems and expense for your family and executors after your death – and possibly even family disagreements. It will almost certainly cost more time, trouble and money to sort out than the time and effort it will take you to make or revise a will in the first place.

- It gives you absolute peace of mind that your current wishes will be carried out.
- It ensures that any young children or other dependants you care for will be looked after as you wish (e.g. appointing guardians).
- It ensures your treasured mementos (e.g. jewellery) will be given to the particular individuals you want to receive them.
- You can specify the type of funeral service you want.
- It reflects the latest circumstances of your family and friends.
- It is the only way to ensure support for your favourite church and charities.

Most people need to review their will at least every five years, to check that it is still reasonably up-to-date. Why not make a mental note to do it at every birthday that ends in "0" or "5"? Other events that may trigger a review are major life events in the family – births, (re-)marriage or divorce, deaths, house moves, step- or grand-children etc. You are advised to get independent professional advice when making or substantially revising a will.

Making a will is also an opportunity to make a gift to the church or charities that you have supported in your lifetime. Rather than making pecuniary legacies - fixed amounts of money like £1,000 – it is generally advisable to leave most legacies as shares of the residue of your estate (after debts, taxes and expenses) – for example X% to person A and Y% to charity B. Residuary legacies suffer less from the ravages of inflation, and save you having to amend your will so frequently as your financial circumstances change. If you don't write a will at all (the lawyers talk about dying intestate):

- Your possessions will be divided only among certain close relatives under complex legal formula. Partners and children do not necessarily automatically get all of the estate, and unrelated friends get nothing.
- The Court will appoint someone from amongst your family and friends to act as Administrator of your estate not necessarily the most appropriate person, and they get no recompense for this task they are assigned.
- There is no opportunity to try to minimise the amount of Inheritance Tax payable there are quite legitimate ways to reduce your eventual tax bill through a will.
- A surviving spouse may have to move to a smaller home to pay the various bills.
- You cannot specify which relatives and friends should get your most treasured mementos as they will need to be sold off, probably cheaply in a house clearance.
- The church and favourite charities you generously supported during your lifetime will get nothing.

Following another successful outdoor nativity last year, the event is to be repeated this year. We will again need lots of people to be involved in difference ways.



He hopes to train the staff further in children's work and encourage the leadership teams who put together all the programmes and services that Jigsaw runs. financial needs of Jigsaw. Each month through regular giving, one off donations and surprise sometimes anonymous gifts, all the money that is needed has been given. We stand in amazement at the miracles we see in this provision.

FARNHILL PARISH COUNCIL SUMMARY OF DRAFT MINUTES

The meeting of Farnhill Parish Council was held on the 2nd October 2012 in Kildwick/ Farnhill Institute. The meeting was chaired by Counc H Matysniak. Five members of the council were present plus NYCC Rep Counc P Mulligan. CDC Rep Counc P Fairbank and 1 member of the public.

The minutes of the meeting held on the 4th September were approved by the Council and signed as a correct record by the Chairman.

NYCC have made the following proposal and wish to receive comments on

NYCC (Parking and Waiting Restrictions) (Various Roads, Craven District) Order 2012

Schedule 11- FARNHILL Newby Road (North Side) from the intersection of the northern channel line of Newby Road and the western channel line of Starkey lane to West for a distance of 5.5metres. Restriction Type- No waiting at any time.

The Parish Council responded stating they had no objections to the above proposal but stated that due to the short distance of the extension to the lines already in place they regarded it to be a waste of money which could be better spent elsewhere.

Martin Webster has instructed their contractor to fill the pot holes either side of the tunnel, and expose the culvert entrance on Bradley road. He states that the footpath from the junction of Main Street & Grange Road which carries on down Main Street is not in too bad a condition compared to others in Craven. He has put it on the list for consideration to be slurry sealed in a future scheme run by colleague D Jones.

Gary Atkinson has had a look at the path at Redmans Lane and he will ask the contractors to clear the path of any overgrowth. With regards the surface he says that given the gradient of the path the surface of the path at present is the best that could be asked for and the surface is in good condition. He states that it is debatable whether handrails would help in this situation, but the Rights of Way section would have no duty to install handrails, their maintenance obligations extend only to the route's surface.

Clerk to ask NYCC when the crash barrier on the A629 which was damaged in a recent accident will be replaced.

CDC Rep Counc P Fairbank reported on the licensing committee with regard to taxi's. Previously taxi's had to be replaced every 8 years but the taxi's wanted it raising to 10 years. This has now been agreed but the time limit for extra stringent testing has been reduced from 7 years to 6years.

She also reported that CDC had been considering removing Recycling Bins from any land not owned by them due to CDC introducing commercial recycling. This was met with opposition from the overview and scrutiny committee and CDC have now agreed not to remove the bins at the White Lion at Kildwick and from Lothersdale.

CDC have been discussing charging for car parking at some of the car parks which include Farnhill and Hall Street Crosshills. The overview and scrutiny committee will be discussing the issue.

CDC are to carry out a Cost Benefit Analysis on Council Tax Benefits. The decision on who can claim Council Tax Benefit has now been passed from the government to District

Councils. Page 21

NYCC Rep Counc. P Mulligan reported that a report has been sent to the Executive of NYCC asking him to consider the recommendations of the Transport, Economy & Environment Overview and Scrutiny Committeee Vehicle Activated Signs Review. It has been proposed that several temporary VAS Signs be purchased for use across the district. Each sign costs £2500 to purchase and the cost to the Parish Council to deploy the sign would be £330. Counc P Mulligan has addressed the executive for priority to be given to the A629 at Connonly Junction. The full report has been e-mailed to all Councillor's along with a copy of the Speed Management Protocol.

He also reported that NYCC are seeking to apply for and then operate Civil Parking Enforcement Powers. NYCC Highway Authority will then be responsible for enforcing onstreet parking restrictions instead of the police.

The Parish Council resolved to purchase a wreath for Remembrance Sunday and to discuss who will represent the Council and lay the wreath at the next meeting.

The Parish Council agreed that the Parish Meeting be held on Tuesday 20th November 2012 at 7.30pm in Kildwick/Farnhill Institute.. Councs G Simon, G Harling & D Atkinson to meet up and discuss final arrangements for the meeting and the newsletter and forward to Councillors for agreement at the Parish Council's November meeting.

ROSPA have carried out the Play Area Safety Inspection and the overall risk rating for the play space is medium.

Need a tonic this autumn? Join a choir

Think about it. When did you last sing, or even hum to yourself? Almost certainly on a day when you were feeling pretty good. Singing, it seems, goes along with contentment, even happiness.



It feels good to sing in a choir. Some experts even believe that joining a choir could improve the symptoms of a range of health problems, including depression and some lung diseases. As one voice specialist has explained, singing uses the vocal muscles, and when you exercise them, a lot of other good things happen, too. Your posture improves, as does your respiratory stamina. These can mean fewer chest infections and improved sleep.

Music is also a great mood enhancer. A recent Swedish study suggested that singing not only increases oxygen levels in the blood, but triggers the release of happy hormones, which can lower stress levels and blood pressure. Researchers in mental health found that some 60 per cent of people with depression had less mental distress within a year of joining a choir.

The Bible often urges us to sing and be happy – to enjoy the fact that we are loved by God. 'Speak to yourself in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody in your heart to the Lord...' (Eph 5.19) We have something to sing about! St Paul would have approved of choirs.
