February begins, in the church's calendar, with the Feast of the Presentation of Christ in the Temple (also known as Candlemas). This feast bring our celebration to Christ's birth to a fitting end and, as we first light and then extinguish our candles as part of our service, we are invited to take 'one last look back to Christmas, and now turn towards the cross!'

Ash Wednesday is on 13th February and is the beginning of Lent, the traditional period of 40 days of self-examination and self-discipline: both as individuals Christians and as part of our local Christian community. Based on the story of Jesus' extended period of temptation in the desert, the image is one of retreat from our everyday occupations to take stock of the direction of our lives.

I am delighted that this year on Ash Wednesday we are to be joined at St Andrew's by our friends from the other churches in the Cross Hills and District Fellowship of Churches. It is good that David Warrington, the Baptist Minister, will be the preacher on this most important day.

During Lent we continue to work together across the local churches as we share in ecumenical Lent Groups. This year the course is titled 'The Teachings of Jesus'. The course is professionally produced and uses taped interviews with national church leaders and prepared questions for group members. I strongly encourage you to join one of the groups that will be meeting this Lent.

There is a lot happening on the national ecumenical scene and the same is true locally. A new initiative is to see if we can start ecumenical youth groups. Reflecting a national trend, all of our local churches are finding it hard to sustain their work with young people of secondary school age.

It has therefore been agreed to hold an open meeting to explore the possibility of working together. This meeting will be on **Sunday 24<sup>th</sup> February** at **4.00pm** at **South Craven Baptist Church**. If you are aged 11 years and over or are interested in helping in any way with these new groups please come along to share your thoughts

At St Andrew's, we have been making the final arrangements before restarting our Junior Church work. The exciting news is that KICKs (Kids In Church in Kildwick) will burst into action on Sunday 17<sup>th</sup> February. We have a small team of committed and enthusiastic leaders ready to welcome children of primary school age who would like to come along. After the first meeting the intention is to meet on the  $2^{nd}$ ,  $4^{th}$  and  $5^{th}$  Sunday of the month at 10.25am in the Parish Rooms.

Please pray for the whole life and work of the church is this parish and beyond. 'A growing church is a praying church'.



#### WOMEN'S WORLD DAY OF PRAYER (INTERDENOMINATIONAL)

The Women's World Day of Prayer Movement will celebrate its annual Day of Prayer on Friday 1st March 2002. The theme of the Service will be 'Challenged to Reconcile'.



The Service comes from Romania, a country of contrasts - mountains, plateaux, hills and plains, woods, meadows and a variety of flora and fauna. It is rich in natural resources and the River Danube flows through the Danube Delta into the Black Sea where there are resorts and health spas.

These facts may appear to paint a picture of health, wealth and pleasure. This is not the reality, for many people still struggle after years of difficulty and oppression. However, the people are resilient and do not lose hope. This is evident in their faith and hope in God and their country.

In learning more about their country, the culture from which they come and the difficulties many of them face we cannot help but be 'Challenged to Reconcile'.

Through this day of prayer and in the days to come will we, as a nation and as individuals, take up the challenge of reconciliation? Will we respond with words and deeds spurred on by the courage and fortitude of our friends in Romania?

People of all ages and from many differing backgrounds will be celebrating this Day of Prayer.

We will be celebrating it in Kildwick Church and you are invited to join with us for an ecumenical service on **Friday 1st March at 7.30pm**. The speaker will be Mrs Pam Coles.

We do hope for strong support from the women of St Andrew's Kildwick, and the local churches, so that this service will be one of challenge and Inspiration.


I am very grateful to the Crosshills and

## Castle Cuttings

Mengo 1st Company of the BGB Uganda has about 40 members, all teenagers/early 20's, some of whom are away during term time at boarding schools (Boarding is very common in Uganda either because it enables children to attend schools with much better facilities some distance from home -most people don't have cars to run their kids to school or because in many families both parents are working full time).

The Company meets 3 times per week after school, plus any functions for which the band are hired (weddings etc). The Band make up in enthusiasm for what they lack in musical training and working instruments. In fact, they have to hire instruments in order to be able to play. John has lent them an old cornet, and George brought back a bass trombone and tuba from London when she went back for her aunt's funeral in February. (The cost of these is being reimbursed to us out of the band's income from functions.) There are no music shops in Uganda!

John has now taken up the position of Company Chaplain, and spends half of the Monday session teaching musical notation and playing technique, and the other half doing a Bible study. Both seem to be appreciated, and musical and spiritual progress is evident. Please pray for this to continue

Visitors

People at the gate is very much a fact of life here. Many of them are local people from the Cathedral with messages for John, hawkers wanting to sell mangos, pineapples or green oranges, children wanting money for school fees, refugees wanting assistance to get to Congo, Sudan or wherever, and con-men who have heard that Bazungu live here and wondering if they can spin a sufficiently convincing story! But we also have many upcountry visitors...mission partners coming into town for supplies who call in for coffee or lunch or simply to sit and fill in the time until their car has been repaired. As CMS Rep. people call in to see George about missing work permits, help with getting air tickets, or trying to borrow a car for town use, paying their bills or simply to say hello.

During August we have had several UK visitors, a CMS Encounter Team of young people here for a 3-week taster into African life...we take them swimming and give them the opportunity for burgers and chips as a change from matooke! Two bishops have passed by wanting to visit Namugongo and 5 mission partners and one baby have also arrived! Life is very busy and that's apart from the boys and their after school activities!! In fact I

(George) have found myself reluctantly having to scale down my midwifery as I just cannot meet all these needs.

As the days get longer, the cold gets stronger" or "February fill-dyke".

Take your pick - there are many adages about this month's weather. Things to look out for.

Tree of the Month. Hazel catkins will soon be shedding their pollen and embryo nuts showing red tufts.

Flower of the month, the snowdrop (associated with Candlemas) bloom in profusion in Farnhill Woods.

Visiting Italian monks are believed to have introduced it centuries ago which would explain why colonies are found near abbey and monastery ruins.

#### Jobs for the month.

Cut back Lavateria and Buddlela both of which bloom on new season wood.

Pinch out growing tips of autumn sown sweet peas.

Finish tidying herbaceous border, cutting off old growth and seed heads left for the birds.

Sow dahlia seeds in moderate warmth, pot on into 3"pots and keep protected from frost. They will be good bedding plants by early June.

Other slow-germinating seeds like Petunia, Nicotina, Begonia and Busy Lizzies can be started towards the end of the month.

"The Origin of Plants" the People and Plants that have shaped Britain's garden History since 1000 is a fascinating book with good illustrations and would make a good present for a plants person.


Evening Saturday 23rd 'Bird Ringing and Migration' Mr. Steve Higgins at 7 pm I have taken the path leading to the waterfalls, on Haworth moor, many many times.

Passing the derelict farmhouse I have always been aware of an eerie silence and the feeling of a thousand eyes watching from the dark interior. It has been easy to imagine the Bronte sisters waving to the farmer as he works in the yard, him wiping the sweat from his honest, careworn face as he doffs his greasy cap to `them lasses from t 'Parsonage. However all is now changed. Gone is the peace and quiet, all about is a hub of activity Someone has seen the abandoned house, standing forlorn and neglected, suffering from the creeping destruction of an empty building and seeing the potential is transforming it bit by bit into a 'des - res'. Soon light and warmth will flow in and the old place will be changed forever.

Is it just as we grow older that we seem more aware of change? When I was young our family had clothes which were classed as 'Sunday best' outfits and were only worn on Sundays or on very special occasions. In church ladies wearing hats were in the majority and often the smell of mothballs pervaded the air. How things have changed but is it not better to see youngsters in T shirts, jeans and trainers in church than out of it?

After recently visiting Kings College Chapel in Cambridge and seeing the beautifully vaulted ceiling and the marvellous stained glass windows and the magnificent painting by Rubens I realise that through the centuries people have felt that only the best is good enough for God and that is understandable and praiseworthy but whether we worship in a large cathedral or small village church, take communion at a High altar or a Nave altar, whether we wear fashionable clothes or, as our Lord, have "but one seamless robe, it is what is in the inside of each of us that matters.

2 med. onions, peeled and chopped1 beef stock cube700g (1 ½) lb. Potatoes, peeled and thinly sliced.<br/>herbsgood pinch of mixed340g tin of corned beef, sliced1 – 2 teasp Worcester sauce415g tin of baked beanssalt and pepper to taste

- 1. Prepare all ingredients and heat oven Elec. 190c/375f Gas 5.
- 2. Spread half of the onions in a 1.7 litre (3pt) casserole dish, add half of the corned beef then half of the potato slices.
- 3. Pour in the baked beans then repeat the layers of onions, corned beef and potatoes.
- 4. Dissolve the stock cube in 10 fluid oz. (1/2) pt boiling water, add the herbs, Worcester sauce, salt and pepper then pour this over the casserole.
- 5. Cover and cook for 30 40 mins. until potatoes are soft. To crisp the potatoes remove lid for the last 10 mins.

#### **Spicy Tomato Chicken**

2 tablesp. flour salt and pepper <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> - 1 teasp chilli powder 6 - 8 chicken thighs 1 tablesp. veg oil 1 onion, peeled and chopped 450g (11b) tomatoes, quartered 600ml. (1pt) chicken stock 2 cloves garlic, crushed 2 tablesp. Tomato puree 4 potatoes, peeled and cut into chunks 2 courgettes cut into chunks

- 1. Prepare all ingredients. Mix together flour, salt, pepper and chilli powder, chicken thighs and toss to coat. Reserve the flour mixture.
- 2. Heat oil in a large pan with a lid. Add chicken and fry over a moderate heat for 8 10 mins. turning once. Transfer chicken to a plate.
- 3. Add onion to the pan and cook for a few mins. to soften. Add flour and mix well, stir in the stock, garlic and tomato puree.
- 4. Return chicken to pan with the potatoes, stir and bring to the boil. Scatter on the courgettes and tomatoes, cover and simmer until the chicken is ten-
