The season of Easter is now over and in the Church's calendar we have moved into what is known as Ordinary Time. After seven weeks of joyful celebration of the Resurrection, culminating in the joy of Pentecost and the celebration of the coming of the Holy Spirit, the pace becomes a little gentler.

But for many in the community life feels anything but ordinary. In recent weeks we have shared together the experience of two sudden deaths that have affected many of us. The deaths of Michael Dexter, a well-known local plumber, and of young William Vernon, a regular at our pram service, have shocked people across the village and church communities. Both these people are greatly missed and we pray for their families in their deep sadness.

The month of June will also be far from ordinary for other reasons. The beginning of the month sees the grand celebrations to mark the Golden Jubilee of the Queen's reign as monarch. The Church has a major role to play in these celebrations and at St Andrew's we will play our small part during the morning services on Sunday 2nd June.

For some people loyalties may be torn that morning as England open their World Cup campaign with a match against Sweden in South Korea (there's always the video!). No doubt many happy (hopefully) hours will be spent in front of the big screen during the month following the fortunes of our sporting heroes!

Later in the month, on Saturday 22nd June, we have our grand Summer Fair, a joint event with Kildwick School. I am delighted that the church and school can share in this way and I hope you will come and share the enjoyment of the day. At the May PCC meeting we welcomed the Headteacher, Alan Robertshaw, who spoke to us about the life of the school and led a helpful discussion about the future development of the church-school link. The link is very important aspect of our community and I am very much looking forward to my first summer fair.

At the end of the month Cathy Medd, one of our KICKs (Junior Church) leaders and a professional dance teacher is organising a major dance show in Leeds. She aims to raise money to help Chernobyl children to have a holiday in our beautiful area. Cathy has organised several previous successful shows so watch out for posters and book a ticket!

Chris Croden, a Paramedic with the Yorkshire Air Ambulance, gave an interesting illustrated talk on the work of the helicopter ambulance, based at Leeds /Bradford Airport, covering all Yorkshire. This gives fast response to remote locations and speedy inter-hospital transfers. The service is paid for by charity.

Val Harrison presided at the meeting, welcoming three new members. She then detailed one resolution to be discussed at the forthcoming National meeting. This urges the Government to support Small local Abattoirs, which are being reduced in favour of fewer large ones resulting in long distance travel for the animals.

Pam Brown introduced the second resolution, to urge the Government to apply stricter controls on the importation of foodstuffs into this country. Both resolutions were passed by the members.

Future events include The Summer Lunch at St Peter's Hall, Cross Hills, a visit to George Smith's Garden near York and a trip to Holken Hall. The WI would have a cake stall at the Cross Hills Gala and would be helping children at Glusburn School to learn knitting and stitching.

The next meeting is on 2nd June, the speaker Mr Robert Wood on "The Hidden Power of Gemstones", in a gala evening to celebrate the Queen's Golden Jubilee.

On 2nd June the Queen celebrates 50 years since her Coronation Day. Buckingham Palace has released some facts about her life and work from official duties, foreign tours and unusual live gifts, to personal events, here is a selection of them.

- •The Queen is the fifth longest serving British monarch (she becomes the fourth longest serving monarch in June 2002.) Only four other kings and queens in British history have reigned for 50 years or more. These are: Victoria (63 years); George III (59 years); Henry III (56 years) and Edward III (fifty years).
- •Queen Elizabeth II is the 40th monarch since William the Conqueror obtained the crown of England.
- •Unusual live gifts from foreign tours include: two tortoises in the Seychelles in 1972, a seven-year-old- bull elephant called Jumbo from the President of the Cameroon in 1972 to mark The Queen's Silver Wedding, and a canary given to the Queen after the State Visit to Germany in 1965.
- •The Queen has sent almost 100,000 telegrams to centenarians in the UK and the Commonwealth.
- •The Queen has sent more than 280,000 telegrams to couples celebrating their diamond wedding (60 years) anniversary.
- •The Queen has given out about 75,000 Christmas puddings to staff continuing the custom of King George V and King George VI.
- •History was made in 1982 when Pope John Paul II visited Britain, the first pope to do so for 450 years. The Queen, titular head of the Church of England, received him at Buckingham Palace.
- •The Queen has attended 46 Maundy services in 35 cathedrals. A total of 5,100 people have received Maundy Money.
- •The Queen and Duke of Edinburgh have been married 54 years. There were married on 20 Nov 1947 in Westminster Abbey.
- •The Queen has laid her wreath at the Cenotaph on Remembrance Sunday every year of her reign except 1959, 1961, 1963, 1983 and 1999, when she was either pregnant or overseas on an official visit.
- •There have been five Archbishops of Canterbury during the Queen's reign (Archbishops Geoffrey Fisher, Michael Ramsey, Donald Coggan, Robert Runcie and George Carey.)

Flower of the Month - The Rose

A month of long, warm evenings when we can stay outside and enjoy the many scented plants in our gardens. There are some which could be called healing plants such as those used in Aroma therapy to obtain essential oils - Lavender Rosemary, Thyme, Chamomile, Lemon Balm, Southernwood,

scented leaf geraniums, Eucalyptus, all of which when rubbed through the fingers create a soothing scent.

Among plants for medicinal uses are Digitalis (heart), Feverfew and Sweet Basil (headaches), Comfrey (bruises) Pragno (disinfectant), Peppermint (wounds). Growing any or all of both categories will encourage insects.

A look at Goodies and Badies in the garden

"Goodies" - Lace Wings, Hoverflies, Bees, Butterflies, Damsel flies, Ladybirds. Blue Tits, Ants and Ladybirds will keep down Aphids.Thrushes, Hedgehogs and Frogs enjoy Slugs and Snails

"Badies" - Aphids, Vine Weevil, Red Spider Mite, White fly, Solomon Seal and Gooseberry Sawfly, Slugs an Snails.

Also fungal attack by mildew and black spot.

Aphids are best destroyed by squashing, messy but effective and Slug's by beer traps

Protect young and tender, plants from slugs by surrounding then with grit or bark and keep chemical sprays to a minimum to avoid harming Bees.

Gardening for Children

Encourage them to plant annuals such as Night scented Stock, Sunflowers or Nasturtiums.

For wild flowers the hay meadows of Upper Wharfedale or further afield Swaledale are, colourful this month.

My friend regularly sets out from his home in Glasgow to 'do a Munro. Now you could be forgiven for wondering what kind of company I exactly keep visions of a Scotsman, resplendent in tartan waving a can of 'Iron Bru', setting out on a Saturday night ready to pick a fight with anyone unfortunate enough to go under the name of Munro spring to mind! Nothing could be further from the truth my friend is one of the kindest people I know but he loves to get away from the pressures of a demanding job and the hustle and

bustle of the busy city and climb mountains; mountains which spring up suddenly and steeply and assume weird and fantastic shapes and have wonderful names like Suilven, Stacy Polly and An Teallach.

A Munro, in climbing parlance, is a Scottish mountain exceeding 3,000 feet in height and the name is a tribute to Sir Hugh Munro who, in 1891 published his meticulous records of all the mountains in Scotland over 3,000 feet. Munro's Tables created a challenge enthusiastically taken up by climbers ever since.

The Bible has a lot to say about hills and mountains. Mark tells us that one day Jesus took Peter, James and John into the hills, apart by themselves and we learn that Jesus was transfigured and two of the Old Testament prophets Moses and Elijah appeared and had a conversation with him. We know, and understandably so, that Peter, James and John were moved and afraid and Peter, not knowing what else to say, probably spoke for all three when he said that as it was so good for them to be there on top of the mountain they should erect three tabernacles, one for Jesus, one for Moses and one for Elijah Peter didn't want to leave, he wanted to remain there but Jesus refused the wish of his three followers.

It must have been puzzling for them but the answer to why he refused is answered when they got down to the bottom. There they found the remaining disciples surrounded by a crowd of people and the scribes were questioning them. The subject of the talking was a boy who obviously suffered from epileptic fits. The boy's father had asked the disciples to cure him, they could not but Jesus did.

I like to think that Peter, James and John learnt a great truth that day, which is just as relevant today as at anytime - whilst we must spend some time on the tops, Christian faith is incomplete without action and we must always remember those at the base of the mountain.



Celebrate the Queen's Golden Jubilee with party dishes using golden ingredients. Here are three ideas.

Apricot and Almond Traybake

100g (4ozs) soft margarine

grated rind of 1

orange 100g (4ozs) golden caster sugar (**T**) 125g (5ozs) self – raising flour 1 level teasp. baking powder 50g (2ozs) ground almonds

1 tablesp. orange juice 2 medium eggs plus 1 yolk 100g (4ozs) soft dried apricots chopped (T)

- Heat oven Gas 4 Elect 180c, grease and line the base of a 28cm X 20cm (11" X 8") roasting tin or Swiss roll tin.
- Prepare ingredients. Soften marg. in mixing bowl, add remaining ingre-2. dients and mix well. Spread mixture in tin.
- Bake for approx. 25 mins. until golden and firm to touch. 3. Sprinkle with sugar then allow to cool before cutting into squares

Sultana and Mars Bar biscuits

100g (4ozs) soft margarine 75g (3ozs) golden caster sugar (T) 50g (2ozs) golden sultanas 1 egg

150g (6ozs) self – raising flour 1 1/2 Mars Bars

- Heat oven Gas 4 Elect 180c Grease 2 large baking trays. 1.
- Prepare ingredients. Soften marg. in mixing bowl; add sugar, egg, flour, sultanas and half of a Mars bar cut into small squares. Mix well.
- Roll walnut sized pieces of the mixture into balls. Place well apart on 3. baking trays; flatten slightly with a fork.

Bake for 10 – 15 mins until pale golden.

Have ready a Mars bar cut into small squares place one on each biscuit while still hot, then allow to cool on a wire tray.

Honey and orange sauce for ice cream

50g (2ozs) butter 2 tablesp. orange juice 1 level tablesp. cornflour 1 tablesp. lemon juice 100g (4ozs) honey **(T**) 3 tablesp. warm water

25g (1oz) golden sultanas or raisins (T)

Heat butter in pan, stir in cornflour with a wooden spoon and cook for a few minutes. Off the heat slowly stir in the honey, orange and lemon juice and water. Return to heat, bring to boil stirring continuously. Add sultanas or raisins and serve hot on ice cream.

The clock you see today dates from 1867, and it was set going on August 24th 1867.





The clock is wound up by hand. This requires someone to wind 3 heavy weights up using a pulley system.

The clock will work for about 4 days if it is fully wound up.
