Maria and her Kangaroos!

Ivan, one of the keener members of the Boys Brigade, was walking home one Sunday afternoon, when he noticed a black plastic bag moving beside the path. He stopped and opened it to find a very small newborn baby girl inside. With the help of a lady passing by and a nearby Catholic priest who baptised her, Maria was taken to the Special Care Unit of Mulago Hospital Ivan was very distressed and came to see us the following day and so we became involved with Maria's care. George visited the Unit with Simon, Matt and Adam and we learnt that Maria was probably about 30 weeks gestation, that is about 10 weeks premature, and weighed 900 grams, just less than a bag of sugar. Although Mulago is a Government Hospital it is short of money so we were asked to provide milk, clothes, cot bedding and

"kangaroos for Maria. Kangarooing is a method of nursing tiny babies strapped to their mother's chest, so that the baby is kept warm but also thrives with the skin-to-skin contact. As neither John nor I could spend all day every day 'kangarooing' Maria (!) we paid for 2 girls to share her care. Maria initially did very well...gaining 230 grams and we had begun to investigate a local babies home for her. However when Christine arrived one Thursday morning she found Maria dead in the incubator. It seems she either acquired a hospital infection or got bronchopneumonia.

As her "next-of kin" we spent Thursday and Friday organising a coffin and buying a small plot of land to bury her. We held a small funeral service in the Cathedral and Ivan spoke very touchingly about Maria. Sadly, abandoned babies are very common here....most of them are dropped down pit latrines, so Maria was very lucky to be found at all.

In her 25 days she made quite an impact on our family.

March winds and April showers bring forth May flowers

Time to prune the rose bushes. Cut out dead wood and crossing branches. Shorten other branches to an outward facing bud. Give bushes a good feed with rose fertiliser or a depth of compost.

Split up large clumps of snowdrops while they are still green.

Prepare a trench for runner beans, filling with compost or kitchen waste. Pot up begonia tubers, concave side upwards for later transferring to garden or planters when shoots are about five inches and likelihood of frost is past.

Trim winter flowering heathers and ivy. Prune dogwoods and willows for good bark colouring.

Plant seeds of Coleus and Schizanthus in a warm greenhouse or propagator for colourful pot plants. Planted now they should be in flower by June/July.

Start watering and feeding pot grown Fuschias and re-pot if overgrown. Blossom which appears before the leaves can be seen on Ash and Elm trees and catkins on Alder, Birch, Poplar and Willow trees. Mosses and lichens are at their most colourful while soil and walls are damp. Helleborus niger (Christmas rose) may have come to Britain with the Romans. It holds an ancient and dark secret for its black roots were known as a cure for mania, insanity and melancholy. Eerard in the seventeehth century believed that a 'Purgation of Hellebore is good for mad and

furious men.

I have been reading recently a very interesting book which brings together extracts from the diaries of Victorians. These selections illustrate the diversity of Victorian life as it was really lived. Diary keeping was not, of course a Victorian invention; it had been a popular pursuit since the 16th century. There were many reasons (and still are) for keeping a diary. I would be lost without mine for forward planning but in the past many people kept a diary as an aid to their religious life. others kept a memoranda of household and personal spending, some a narrative of their day to day life, which makes the book I have read so enthralling.

One such account I brought to mind when hearing in the media the discussions on the Health Service. Peter King had been a patient in St Thomas's Hospital, London in 1885. His clear description of life on a ward, from a patient's and his graphic account of his operation are fascinating to read though perhaps not for the squeamish!

"At 5 0 clock breakfast is brought round"

"At 8 0 clock sister reads morning prayers."

April 2 1885 "2 operations were performed in the bathroom" and " I asked if I was to have chloroform" and he said, "No, I will do it without."

"Afterwards sister gave me some brandy and water."

What is clear throughout King's account is that although the workload was heavy and the hours long the nurses pride in their work comes across loud and clear as does their sympathy and kindness to their patients.

Having recently visited Airedale Hospital with a suspected broken ankle I cannot reiterate strongly enough that we are indeed blessed to have such a wonderful hospital on our doorstep with all the latest modem technology. I found the attitude of all the staff there just the same as that man recorded all those years ago, as they treat their patients with the same caring sentiments the nurses did in 1885.

On Songs of Praise recently was an interview with a very remarkable man, a plastic surgeon, who had spent his so called 'retirement' helping people in Ghana who had been hurt in accidents or had disfiguring illnesses. .1 think that only now when he had reached the age of ninety had he decided to retire completely. What achievements he would have to look back on and how his patients loved and respected him. There are so many people from all walks of life all over the world serving others in difficult circumstances. We are so lucky in the western world that with progress things are much safer and easier for both nurse and patient than in the mid Victorian England of the diary I have read.

Two favourites this month.

A tasty lunch or supper dish and a sandwich cake with a difference, to make for Easter.

Recipes for March

Kedgeree.

450g (11b) smoked haddock 225g (½ lb) long grain rice

50g 2ozs) butter

1 med. Onion chopped

1 level teasp. curry powder

2 hard-boiled eggs

1 tablesp. lemon juice

1 tablesp. parsley chopped

Salt and pepper

Suitable garnishes. Lemon,

tomato, egg, parsley.

- Prepare all ingredients then simmer the haddock in a large pan with 600ml (1pt) water for about 8 mins. Drain and flake removing bones and skin.
- 2. Boil rice in salted water until tender, about 12 mins.
- 3. Melt butter in pan used for fish and soften onion in this for a few mins. Stir in the curry powder. Add haddock, rice, eggs, lemon juice, parsley and seasoning, fork together then cover the pan and reheat gently for about 5 mins.

Place in a hot serving dish and garnish.

Lemon Frosted Cake

150g (6ozs) butter 150g (6ozs) caster sugar 3 eggs beaten 150g (6ozs) self-raising flour 1 ½ level teasp baking powder

Topping

75g (3ozs) sugar iuice of 1 ½ lemons

Filling

finely grated zest of 1 lemon

250 g tub mascarpone or cream cheese iuice of ½ lemon

- 1. Heat oven to 190c/375f Gas 5. Prepare ingredients and grease two 18cm (7") sandwich tins and line the bases with greaseproof paper.
- Place butter in a mixing bowl, warm slightly than add remaining cake ingredients and mix until smooth. Divide mixture between tins, smooth tops then bake for 25 - 30 mins until springy to touch.
- 3. For the topping leave the cakes in the tins and while still hot mix sugar and lemon juice together and spoon this over the cakes. Transfer to a wire rack when cool.
- 4. For the filling mix mascarpone cheese and lemon juice together, spread over the sugared top of one cake and put the other cake sugared side up on top. Sprinkle a little caster sugar over the cake. Sugar flowers or small chocolate eggs make a nice decoration


