Dear friends,

One of the great delights of the natural world is the cycle of the seasons. The colours of autumn tell us that the dark depths of winter are approaching fast. The trees are bare and the wind is cold. But we know it won't stay like this. Before very long we will be ready to welcome the first signs of spring and new life in our gardens.



There is also a cycle of seasons in the life of the Church. December brings us to the start of the new year with the season of Advent. For four weeks we spend time preparing for the great festival of Christmas, when we will celebrate once again the birth of the Christ-child in the world. Advent is a time of preparation - both physical and spiritual.

We are now getting busy buying and baking, making our present lists and planning our menus. We will soon be buying our tree and writing our cards, stocking our larders and filling our freezers. Advent is a time for waiting - on the Lord in stillness and in silence. Advent is a time for watching - for Christ when he comes. Christ is coming and we want to be ready when he comes. We celebrate the coming of Christ the infant holy, but we also wait with eager longing for the coming of Christ the king of glory, the judge of all the earth.

An essential part of this waiting and watching is the time we spend in church, gathered together as God's people, listening to, and reflecting on the wonderful stories foretelling the coming of the promised Messiah. We are given renewed hope that the light is coming into the world and the darkness will not overcome it. The joyful celebration of Christmas comes at the darkest and dearest time of the year. It reminds us even more powerfully than that God's own light has come into our world, and we can welcome the light into our own lives as well.

As we come to sing our Christmas carols and light our Christmas candles let us remember whose birth it is we celebrate, whose life, death and resurrection we glory in and whose coming again we long for.

I look forward to welcoming you to St Andrew's during the seasons of Advent and Christmas. May you find peace and joy and Christ in Christmas.

Last month I offered some thoughts about prayer and asked some questions for you to think about: What is prayer? Do you pray? When do you pray? Where does prayer fit into your life?

As individual Christians and as a local Christian community prayer should be something that is seen as important. I quoted the well known saying, 'A growing church is a praying church'. It is also true for the individuals who make up the local church. It is through our praying that we can often experience growth in our relationship with God.

At its core, prayer is about spending time with God. But God is always present; wherever we are, God is there. This means that wherever we are, we can pray. Whether we are washing up in the kitchen, soaking in the bath, sitting quietly in the lounge, we can pray. Wherever we are we can consciously turn our thoughts to God and remember his presence with us. This it seems to me is a good place to begin. We need to remember the saying, Pray as you can, not as you can't.

For some people it is helpful to find a regular time and place when you can be quiet and still to spend time with God. Perhaps you have a favourite chair where you can sit for a few minutes. Perhaps you can best bring your thoughts to God as you walk to work or to the shops. God is never absent so be adventurous in where and when you take time to pray.

Sometimes it is helpful to meet with others and take time to grow in our understanding and practice of prayer. In December I will be leading two sessions when we will look at some different ways of praying. Details are as follows:





With October being the warmest since the 17th century fuschias etc were flowering well into November, they should now have been stored away in a frost free place. Thankfully some of the foot and mouth restrictions are now coming to an end and we can look forward to getting out into the woods and fields again.

There are still routine jobs to be done: -

Make sure all fences and stakes are secure.

Protect terra cotta planters with bubble wrapping and tie leaves of yuccas and cordilines in a bunch to prevent freezing and damaging growing point.

Remove leaves. from rockeries and replenish gravel mulch.

YOUNG GARDENERS Create a festive table display.

1. Fill a flower pot with earth and then put a large potato in it with. about half above the top of the pot.
2. With a skewer, make holes in it and push into them sprigs of holly and conifer to completely cover potato.
3. Make some decorations with coloured card and fix to the tree with wire. Add some small pieces of tinsel and perhaps a long, red candle.

Eliot - a little different from MacCafferty or The Wasteland but I hope you enjoy it.

Journey of the Magi

“A cold. coming we had of it
 Just the worst time of year
 For a Journey, and such a long journey
 The ways deep and the weather sharp
 The very dead of winter
 And the camels galled, sore-footed, refractory
 Lying down in the melting snow”



The poem goes on to describe their long arduous journey with guides, drunken and debauched, running away and the dirty villages they passed through, charging them exorbitant prices

“A hard time we had of it
 At the end we preferred to travel all night
 Sleeping in snatches
 With the voices singing in our ears saying
 That this was all folly”

But on they travelled.

“Then we came to a tavern with vine leaves over the lintel
 Six hands at an open door dicing for pieces of silver
 And feet kicking the empty wine - skins
 But there was no information, and so we continued.
 And arrived at evening, not a moment too soon
 Finding the place; it was (you may say) satisfactory.”

The last verse I find particularly inspiring.

“All this was along time ago. I remember
 And I would do it again, but set down
 This set down
 This: were we led all that way for
 Birth or Death? There was birth certainly,
 But thought they were different; this Birth was
 Hard and bitter agony for us, these Kingdoms,
 But no longer at ease here, in the old dispensation.
 With an alien people clutching their gods.
 I should be glad of another death.”

Recipes for December

Two delicious desserts, ideal for the busy Christmas season. Both are quite easy to make and can be prepared in advance.

TIRAMASU

2 tablesp. instant coffee	200g (8ozs) mascapone cheese
2 tablesp. caster sugar	300ml (½ pt) double cream
3 tablesp. boiling water	300ml (½ pt) ready to serve custard
3 tablesp. brandy	1 – 2 teasp. cocoa
8 trifle sponges	50g (2ozs) plain chocolate (grated)

1. Place the coffee and sugar in a measuring jug, add 3 tablesp boiling water, stir well. Add brandy then cold water to make 250ml (just under ½ pt)
2. Cut sponges into thick fingers, place half of these in a serving dish. Pour on half of the coffee liquid.
3. Whisk cheese, cream and custard until smooth. Spread half over soaked sponges, sprinkle with the cocoa and half the chocolate.

Top with remaining sponges and slowly drizzle with remaining coffee liquid. Spread with remaining cream mixture and decorate with chocolate. Serve chilled.

RASPBERRY MERINGUE BOMBE

4 meringue nests	50g (2ozs) caster or icing sugar
450g (1lb) frozen raspberries	1 tablesp cocoa
600 ml (1pt) double cream	

1. Line a mould or freezer proof bowl with cling film.
2. Break up the meringues into small pieces.
3. Reserve a few raspberries for decoration then partially defrost the remainder and mash lightly with a fork.
4. Whip the cream until thick then lightly stir in the sugar, cocoa, meringue and raspberries. Avoid over mixing and aim for a marbled effect.
5. Spoon the mixture into prepared mould or bowl pressing into the corners. Cover and freeze until firm. (At least four hours.)

It can then be turned out on to a plate and put back into the freezer until required. Transfer from freezer to fridge 30 mins. before serving, decorated with icing sugar and reserved raspberries.

The CMS Yorkshire Conference at Scargill House October 26th to 28th

This year's conference was entitled:

"Lifting the Veil", Understanding Pakistan.

How perfect is God's timing. Who could have known when this conference was planned a year ago, that Pakistan would be so much in the news at this present time, sadly for all the wrong reasons. We learned so much and met so many people, over seventy C.M.S. members were present, plus returned mission partners and Pakistani Christians, Sardar and Violet Ohauri, who are C.M.S. mission partners to this country. They are working amongst the Asian community in Glasgow.

It is impossible to give you an account of all our experiences, the whole weekend was one of learning and sharing and having fun. Then being close to tears as we shared the sadness of our Pakistani friends Sardar, Violet and Nikhta as we heard the dreadful news of the massacre of Pakistani Christians who were gunned down as they met to worship God.

We were gathered together in the chapel at Scargill as Sardar said to us, " This event was not unexpected, but this is a price we have to pay, we have no choice but to follow Christ".

Do please give thanks for the freedom we enjoy in meeting together to praise God in our own churches and remember in your prayers those who do not enjoy such freedom, often paying the price of being a Christian with their lives. Christians form only 2% of the population in Pakistan. Most are from low caste Hindu families who converted to Christianity a hundred years ago. Most Christians remain amongst the poorest in Pakistan. Islamic Sharia Law makes life very difficult for these people, especially when fundamentalist groups take the law and its interpretation into their own hands.

At the end of his presentation, Sardar said to us, " It has often been said that the blood of the martyrs lays the foundation of the church. Therefore we pray that a strong foundation would be laid, for Pakistan has had its share of present day martyrs.. We urge you to pray for your brothers and sisters who are suffering simply because they are Christians"
