Galilee and to Jerusalem, does not seek revenge and retribution; instead, the risen Jesus says to those he meets

he meets "Peace be with you, do not be afraid".

The Love shown to us by Jesus is a radical, subversive love that invites a transformation of heart and mind; a transformation which moves us

from darkness to light, from violence to non-violence, from death to life.

Our loving, liberating, lifegiving God, whom we meet in the person of the risen, crucified Jesus,

longs for the healing and renewing of the nations, for the healing and renewing of creation. God, who is true Love and true Light, calls us, in all our dealings with one another to speak the language of Love, which is the language not of destruction but of creation, not of self-interest but of self-sacrifice, not of acquisition but of self-giving and generosity.

evidence of this is all around us. The world feels a very uncertain place right now. Relationships within, and between nations, are changing and it is hard to see very far ahead. The consequences of the American people electing Donald Trump as President remain unclear; the people of France are about to elect a new President; in September there will be federal elections in Germany.

Here at home, we are facing another General Election, only two years since the last one, the result of which will affect greatly the forthcoming Brexit negotiations and our relationships with our neighbours across Europe and, quite possibly, our relationships across the United Kingdom.

As we come to exercise our democratic right, and citizen's responsibility, to vote in the general election on 8th June the following words written in the lead up to the 2015 general election are worthy of reflection: "We might be asking: how might Jesus' message inform our perspective on issues such as the economy, foreign policy, war, immigration, the national debt, and how we look after the sick, disturbed, unemployed and the undeserving. Deep reflection on this begins to reveal how radical, political and upsetting the Way of

Jesus is. I suspect Jesus would be no friend to any of our modern political parties."

What are we looking for in our elected politicians? People who will serve our own self-interest or people who will serve our neighbours in need? As another writer asked: "Are we prepared to vote for the needs of our neighbours who don't look like us?"

Jesus embodied and taught a subversive message of compassion, mercy, justice and welcome to the despised. These must be the values that will inform the difficult decision of where to put your X on our ballot paper.

A further significant change will happen soon here in this parish. I announced recently that I would be moving on, after nearly 16 years as Vicar here, to take up a new post as Vicar of Warton and Borwick with Yealand in the Diocese of Blackburn; my last Sunday here will be 23rd July. The coming weeks will give time to reflect on the journey of the last 16 years and to prepare for the vacancy until a new Vicar is appointed.

As we each face these times of change, times of challenge and opportunity, may the God of Love and Light continue to guide us and bless us.

Well, that's a turnup for the books. It looks as though we are approaching quite exciting times! Our first major deadline happens really soon – when we submit the first part of our application for the repair of our leaky roof. Louise has written about this (on page 17). To do nothing about the roof is not an option, really. If it gets worse, we'll have to move out of the building.

As a rock-climbing student at Lancaster I got to know the old quarry at Warton! We all wish Robin, Elizabeth and their family well in their new parish and we'll be over there in force to support him as he is installed on September 4th.

The new PCC takes on extra responsibilities as we now approach our own vacancy. One of the first statutory tasks is to compile a "Parish Profile". This is partly an official document with statistics but it can also be an altogether glossier "advert" for the parish which we'll hope will attract the right priest. This meeting (called "Section 11") will also appoint two representatives to take the process forward alongside the Bishop and our patrons, Christ Church, Oxford. This meeting is of the PCC alone. They can (and probably will) request a "Section 12" meeting later at which the bishop and the patron will be represented. Christ Church are well used to this process and are likely to be a great help to us.

A common question is "How long before we get a new priest?" No one can tell us that – but many parishes seem to spend around a year, finding a new incumbent. Running the parish amongst ourselves will bring out the best in us!

Reflective bible reading during May

On 3 Sundays last October we enjoyed using our open space at the front of the nave by gathering in small groups for the first part of our 10am service, after which we moved into the chancel at the east end for Communion. Being able to gather in small groups made it possible for there to be shared conversation as we explored the diocesan vision themes of Confident Christians, Growing Churches, Changing Communities.



During May, on Sundays 14th, 21st and 28th, we are again going to enjoy using this space to allow us to do some reflective bible reading during our 10am services.

Instead of hearing three different readings on these Sundays, we will hear the gospel reading read three times by different voices. The pattern that we will follow is this:

- The passage is read aloud the first time.
- Everyone thinks about the passage in silence and begins to notice what has struck them.
- The passage is read aloud the second time.
- Each person is invited to say out loud a word or a phrase that has struck them. Others in the group listen to the responses without comment.
- The passage is read aloud the third time.
- People are invited to share with each other why this word or phrase jumped out at them, what it might mean and what questions it raises. Shared conversation follows to draw out questions from the passage and points of interest.

Each person will have a copy of the gospel reading, with a few pointers to help the reflection begin. But the aim is to see what you notice and can draw out from the text. The time spent in this will be approximately 15 minutes, the

same time as we usually spend hearing our readings and listening to the sermon.

Listening and talking together the group learns to read, digest and reflect on Scripture in ways that will be helpful for the living out of the faith each day as well as understanding what it means.

This is not a bible study; the learning comes through the experience of scripture reflection and attentive listening to one another. We are seeking to be formed more into the image of Christ, not accumulating intellectual knowledge. Ironically, wonderful insights often come when we abandon pursuing them and instead focus on being in God's presence together and listening to the Word. We can often learn more from personal experiences than we do from receiving a teaching or discussing opinions. We seek to become more like Jesus by being with him in a shared gathering and listening to Scripture with our hearts.

Some will recognise the above way of reflecting on scripture as based on the ancient way of reading Scripture known as *Lectio Divina*; this simply means godly reading, so it's nothing fancy or to be fearful of.

If this will be your first time engaging in reading Scripture in this way I hope you will look forward to discovering something new and exciting, which you can then apply in your own bible reading at home.



St. Andrew's Church Prayer Loops

This is a new way of praying for specific needs which has begun at St Andrew's. There are two discrete groups of people who have agreed to pray for specific requests for the period of a week, after which time, the prayer is completed. This is aimed particularly where the need for prayer is urgent: for example, if a friend or family member is suddenly taken ill or there is some family crisis. The person being prayed for doesn't need to be a member of our congregation; anyone who needs prayer is welcome.

This initiative does not replace the Prayer Board in church, nor the list for prayer which is circulated by way of the News Sheet. It's important to know, too, that those who have agreed to be a part of the Loops have promised their complete confidentiality.

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Annual Church Meetings – Sunday 30th April

These two very important meetings were held on 30th April following the morning service. The first meeting is held to elect two people as Churchwardens – and it will please you to know that the two previous post-holders had done such a good job that they were re-elected nem con! The second meeting elected representatives of the laity to the PCC. Sue Hargreaves had come to the end of a three-year term and she was thanked for her hard work. Brenda Brock and Marie Stinson were elected to serve for the next three years, but we still have two vacancies to fill, one for three years and one for one year. Could this be you? Think about it!

The new PCC meets together for the first time on 9th May and will begin with a celebration of the Eucharist to set its work for the coming year in the context of worship of God.

All the necessary paperwork for the meetings had been circulated beforehand; we heard statistics about attendance, about baptisms, weddings and funerals and about the Electoral Roll. We learned about our finances – and the great difficulty we face in paying the Share requested. We had a major presentation from the Repair and Renovation Group – that is going to be a significant focus for us in the months ahead.

And of course, we listened to Robin's remarks in his final Annual Meeting as our incumbent – we wish him well for the future and there will be time to acknowledge the contribution of the Figg family. The vacancy and its ramifications will, though, be the other main focus for us as we travel through this coming year.

Jigsaw Kids Ministry


Dear friends – greetings from everyone in Jigsaw.

I am recently back from the Philippines after a wonderful yet challenging trip. It was humbling to see God moving through the power of His love bringing love, light and hope to so many children and families in difficult situations. Prayers are so important to bring the power and wisdom of God to the ministry of Jigsaw and all your prayers are transforming lives through God's Love. Please join me in prayer for the needs below as we seek to combat poverty in the lives of children and families through the Love of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Please Pray urgently for one of our staff who is under huge pressure from her mum and extended family to leave her two children and Jigsaw to

go abroad to the Middle East to be a housemaid (modern day slave). She and her mother have recently lost their slum home due to debt caused by a health emergency and so are currently squeezed into her sister's small slum house. Her extended family see her working overseas as the way to pay the debt and to have regular income for them all, they don't see the needs of her or her children. This is a terrible situation as it will separate her from her children and then what she will face abroad I can't bear to think about.

As it stands she is at the mercy of her extended family and is being told she will be ostracised if she doesn't go. She has a small plot of land (which she is buying over several years from the Habitat for Humanity organisation) on which Jigsaw would like to help her build a small house for her and her children. However, even this may not solve the problem as culturally there is huge pressure to follow the wishes of her family. Please pray that God will intervene to change her family's hearts and minds so that they will not pressurise her to leave her children and country and that they may see other ways to solve their problems.

Please also pray that if it is God's will Jigsaw may have the funds to help her build a small house which we hope will bring security to her and her children for years to come.

Please Pray for two girls, Jess and Dona, who have had to leave their home as their father is physically abusing them. Please also pray for another girl, Mana, who is also being beaten by her father when he gets drunk. Please pray that God will intervene and they may be able to return home to a safe and secure place. Please also pray for the Jigsaw staff who are helping care for the girls in this very difficult time.

Please Pray for our new 'Life groups'. These are small groups for 13 to 17 year olds living in the slums and on the streets to come together to share what is happening in their lives and to pray and support one another. The groups are just beginning and are to be led by young people from our 18+ Jigsaw community groups. Please pray for wisdom for the young leaders and the Jigsaw staff who are mentoring them and for the youths who will attend the groups. Pray that God will use the groups to help bring the community, security, significance, creativity, and boundaries that so many need and crave and that Faith, Hope & LOVE may grow.

Please Pray for Lendhel and the Jigsaw leadership team as they continue with Jigsaw's registration with DSWD (department of social welfare.) Previously we have been registered as a Christian Children's Ministry but as we are including more social work in our ministry we need to change our registration. Please pray that God may make the paths straight and guide Jigsaw by His wisdom. Please also join us to Praise God for all his provision and pray for the continued provision for all that Jigsaw needs.

It is better to die in a camp than to die in a war.

That's what Nejebar thinks.



It's better to travel for months, in rain and snow, with young children. To walk until you injure your feet. To risk your children's lives in a plastic dinghy. And to leave everything you know behind.

When the alternative is fear and terror, almost anything is better. When the alternative is bombs, bullets and war, almost anything is better.

Fleeing horrors

Nejebar's husband Noor was a teacher in Afghanistan. Imagine the horror the family felt when the Taliban announced they would kill anyone, like Noor, who worked for the government.

Imagine how they felt when the Taliban carried out that threat on another family member, taking out

his eyes before killing him.

Almost anything has to be better than that.

But now they've arrived in Greece, all they have is a tent. They have no other protection against wind and rain. There's no school for their five children. And they have no certainty or clear idea of what will happen to them now. They thought they would stay here for 10 days, but it's already been six months and there's no end in sight.

Noor describes their initial reaction to arriving in the camp in Greece: 'It was like suicide for us. But we took the decision that it is better to die here than to die there from war.'

Together

Throughout it all, Nejebar has desperately wanted what is best for her children. But her circumstances make it very difficult.

Her youngest, Sudai, is five years old but looks much younger. He hasn't been growing as he should. His tummy is swollen and they don't know what is wrong with him. And because the only



on-site doctor is Greek, they haven't been able to find out. They don't have the language to explain that Sudai is much older than he looks.

Nejebar's strength and steadiness make her the rock at the centre of her family, holding them together in this difficult and uncertain situation. But she hasn't stopped there. Despite her circumstances, she has welcomed two brothers, Faraidoon and Farzad, into her home.

Faraidoon and Farzad don't know where their parents are, or if they're even alive. Nejebar has welcomed them into her family, giving them refuge as they wait for news.

An uncertain future

Nejebar says: 'We still have some hope that one day we will get out of here and we have hope for our children's future.

'Our wish is to get out from this situation and to be able to go further. We only want a peaceful life. We want our children to have an education, to go to school. The most important thing is for our children.'

We ask this for Jesus Christ's sake. Amen







Raising the Roof at St Andrew's

'It's possible that your wedding will have to take place in the chancel or another church'.

This was not the news I wanted to hear in the last meeting with the Vicar before my wedding. Ceiling plaster had started to fall within the Nave and an inspection was due to be carried out shortly.



Fast forward two years and I find myself part of a working group scoping the repairs to the church and investigating additional elements, for example level access to the building, that would not impact on the historical significance of the building but would allow more people to enjoy and celebrate it.

St Andrew's is a Grade I listed building. There is a record of a church in Kildwick in the Domesday Book, one of only two in Craven at the time, and fragments of stone crosses found at the site point to a possible mid-10th century origin. The present nave and aisles date largely from the early 14th century. During the 15th and 16th centuries the church was lengthened eastwards. The church was last reordered in 1901–3 and has not significantly changed since that time.

Currently work is focussing on repairing the roof and ceiling plaster. These essential repairs are costly. We have already been successful in securing a grant from The Headley Trust and are in the process of applying for other grants. But this is not enough! We need to raise lots more and you can help. 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



Bishop Nick encourages all to engage in the General Election

As the campaigns for the General Election on 8th June get under way, Bishop Nick has encouraged all in the diocese to pray for the election, to engage in debates – and to vote.

There are a number of resources available from the churches nationally to help people prepare for the elections.

Churches Together in Britain and Ireland (CBTI) produced some excellent resources for the 2015 election, which are still largely relevant. Go to www.ctbielections.org.uk/resources or www.churcheselection.org.uk to find out more.

One of the initiatives was to produce a '2020 Vision of a Good Society' statement, as follows:

- All citizens have access to enough income to enable them to live with dignity, either through paid work or through a properly functioning welfare safety net.
- Reasonably priced homes where people can flourish are available for everyone who needs them and there is a reliable safety net for all homeless people.
- All children and young people are enabled to live fulfilling flourishing lives, their contributions are valued, and they are enabled to grow and achieve their potential.
- An economy that is in service to every person irrespective of their wealth or the market value of their labour; including robust action to clamp down on tax dodging.
- UK greenhouse gas emissions are falling rapidly, and the Government has helped to secure a global climate deal that limits global temperature rises to 2 degrees.

Farnhill Parish Council

The Council met on the 23rd March in the Institute. David Akrigg was co-opted onto the Council.

Waste Management CDC Rep Pat Fairbank reported that a new manager has been appointed and they are now working nearly within budget.

Assets and Commercial Services are doing reasonably well. Parking meters now take cards and money; the bus station toilets have been revamped. The Aireville swimming pool café has been refurbished and should increase revenue. There are Lottery grants for improvements to the Town Hall and a government grant to refurbish Aireville House on Broughton Road for the homeless. Improvements are also to be made to the entrance at Engine Shed Lane and the offices refurbished.

The police attend the Select Committee quarterly. They now have four extra experienced officers and two PCSOs in the district. One based at Belle Vue Mills is appreciated by the public. Burglaries in Kildwick & Farnhill have increased and the police are asking people to take extra care with security and not to leave valuables on view.

Counc P Fairbank announced that she is standing down as District Councillor due to ill health. Appropriate thanks were expressed

Grants for a projector and dongle (CDC) and the installation of a defibrillator (NYCC) have been received. The defibrillator will be fitted shortly. A training and awareness session will be held on Tuesday 16th May in the Village Institute and all members of the village are welcome to attend.

The Annual Parish Meeting is to be held on Tuesday 23rd May in the Institute and NYCC & CDC Representative Counc Patrick Mulligan has confirmed that he will be able to attend. All residents of the village are welcome to attend.

Lower Arbour The Parish Council will ask Clean Cut Gardening Services to remove the brush pile and to spread the pile of woodchip but not to plant any trees as the Parish Council are considering planting the trees themselves.

The Play Area is checked regularly and there are no further issues of concern. The Clerk provided quotes for rubber matting to be used by the Play Panels but it was decided to level the area with some sand first and then review the situation.

The Birds in Your Garden





Since 2011 the British Trust for Ornithology has been satellite-tracking Cuckoos to find out why we have lost almost two thirds of our population of these iconic birds in the last 20 years. We have found out a lot about their migration, but much remains still to be discovered. To date we have tagged over 50 birds, all adult males bar one, as they are generally larger than females and so better able to carry the tags. Once smaller tags are available, we hope that we will be able to tag females and juveniles too.

UK Cuckoos spend the winter around the Congo rainforest and understanding where they winter and the routes they use to get there could be an important factor in determining the causes of their decline.

We have discovered that Cuckoos leave the UK much earlier than thought. The earliest departure date so far has been 3rd June, and in each year over 50% of our tagged Cuckoos have left the country by the end of June, much earlier than expected! Most of them arrive around the end of April and leave during June and July. This means that Cuckoos spend about two months in Britain, about six months in Africa, and the other four months of the year migrating.

They head out of the UK in a variety of directions, some due east across the North Sea to the Netherlands and Belgium while others head south across the English Channel into France.

One migration route was found through Italy as expected from ringing data, but in the first year two Cuckoos went via Spain, highlighting a brand new migration route with a stopover site north of Madrid. This has been followed by many English birds and has a higher mortality rate than the Italian route used by most of the Scottish and Welsh birds.

Stop-over sites are important fuelling areas for migrant birds, allowing them to fatten up for the journey ahead. Many of our Cuckoos have spent time near the River Po in Italy; others stopped in Spain which latterly has been afflicted by droughts which have probably reduced the quantity of food available to fatten up.


The Cuckoos followed so far use a different return route to get back to the UK to the one they followed on their outward migration. They head to West Africa before making the return crossing over the Sahara Desert. We think this is linked to a weather system called the Inter Tropical Convergence Zone (ITCZ) the rains from which produce sufficient food for the return journey.

Increasing the number of individuals tagged, and following them for a number of years allows us to answer yet more questions. Short-term studies can give misleading results; for example the habitats that were used in the Congo basin by English and Scottish Cuckoos in the first two years are not the same habitats being used in latterly.

There is still a lot more to be done to fully understand Cuckoo migration, and we need to keep tagging to increase the robustness of our data. Because each year is different, it will not be until we have several years more results that we will be sure that we have found (at least some of) the answers we are looking for. You can follow them on the BTO website - try it; it's fascinating!
