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A Pastoral Letter

November

Yes, this is a time for remembrances.

Remember, remember the 5th of November, gunpowder, treason and plot... I forget the rest of the old chant. I do however remember chumping for firewood for the exciting bonfire and the feast of roast potatoes, parkin, toffee and soft drinks to wash the goodies down.

All Saints Day. 1st November is the first day for remembering and giving

thanks to God for all those ordinary people who, down the ages, lived extra-ordinary lives and often lost them in serving others or good causes. Therefore they earn the title Saint.

All Souls Day. 2nd November comes next when we recall those near and dear to us who have departed this life after living lovely lives and being much loved by ordinary folk like ourselves.

Remembrance Day. 11th November follows soon after when the whole nation remembers the sacrifices of a vast number of our Armed Forces and others whose lives were cut short in terrible conflicts, over many years and even today. This service is accompanied by the placing of poppy wreaths on War Memorials which takes place all over the country. Do try please to join us at St. Andrew's, Kildwick at 11.00am on Sunday 12th November.

St. Andrew's Day. 30th November is the last day of remembrance we celebrate this month. St. Andrew is the Patron Saint of our Parish Church of Kildwick. He is also the Patron Saint of Scotland, Greece and Russia.

He was an ordinary fisherman who responded to the invitation of Jesus to leave his boat and nets to join him in fishing for people. Andrew, together with his brother Peter became part of a group

known as "The Twelve" helping Jesus.

"Do this in remembrance of me" said Jesus as he presided over the Last Supper with his disciples on the evening before he was crucified on Good Friday. Ever since that Maundy Thursday evening Christians have obeyed Jesus' request by placing the service of bread and wine at the very centre of their worship. This act of worship is known as Holy Communion, Eucharist, The Lord's

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"We don't pay salaries; we don't have any money."

These words from Milano, the Diocesan Secretary in Wad Medani in Sudan, preface a report from John Poole after a recent visit. The church in Sudan is one of our diocesan link partners. No standard "publicity" can approach the reality of a personal visit such as this.

I'm over half way through a visit to Sudan in which I'm working in three of the church Offices, helping treasurers be better account keepers. For the first time this work has taken me 100 miles up the Nile to Wad Medani, to sit with Guzuly, their Treasurer.

There is an enormous welcome in these places. They are so pleased to be visited, to be remembered, and to reminisce about old friends. A visitor gives opportunity to show off developments, ways in which they have pushed back difficulties and reached out to a hoped-for future.

Bp Samaan is proud of the way he has initiated income generation projects. The main one is the building of a car wash business on the edge of the cathedral grounds. No faculties are required here, so he's got away with it! For five years, rent from the business must go into paying off the investors who financed its construction, but then rent will come in. Shops are under construction on the same basis. We have been unable to obtain investment capital from a Christian source, so the money is borrowed from Muslim business men.

Whilst these new buildings are created, the church facilities are extremely dilapidated. There is no money to renovate them. There's that phrase again. Well of course there's money - there's always money. God's money is in the pockets of God's people. That's what you tell yourself: it's a question of priorities.

We help in small ways. Last October a group of four visited from our Diocese and one of our women wanted to give something to help the Sudanese women. We proposed a figure to Andrew, the Relief and Development Officer and he said he could get two sewing machines for that, so we were well pleased. I'm not sure what was imagined, probably a simple one of those white or cream machines that you can even buy in Argos nowadays. It's our imagination that lets us down every time here. Life for our brothers and sisters in Sudan defies our imagination.

I've now seen the two sewing machines. They are elderly, the old Singer treadle type. I don't want to knock the elderly, being one myself, but they are just not what I expected. They are much appreciated, and those old machines are really rugged and just keep going and I can see that's needed here. I regularly see tailors sat outside their shops with this type of machine. When

Andrew said he could get machines for what was given, we didn't check out enough what it was he could get. We would have wanted to give something better. The women at one place said the money left over from their machine purchase was put into their 'farm'. They hope to raise money from that to buy a second machine!

Working with Guzuly has thrown up three main challenges. One is accountancy – guiding him to standard ways of keeping accounts. Another is IT – helping him develop his computer skills so that he can keep the accounts in Excel. The third is language – everything is in Arabic and I have to work with a translator.

It has its funny moments. "Why are you spending so much on 'communications' (which includes phones and wifi)"? Discussion shows they mean buses and other transport. They have no cars.

And those who use Word and Excel – would you like a mental challenge?

Can you picture where all the menu items are, so that if all labels are changed to Arabic, can you still go to the right place? Don't forget that because they are in Arabic, everything that is normally on the left of the screen is now on the right, like a mirror image. And it's an older version of Office than the one you are currently familiar with. I did so want to use Print Preview.

Today I was getting Guzuly to input his own data from January to March 2017. It is a privilege to be allowed to see the cash books and documentation normally kept private. As the data is input I query it so as to understand their accounts and train Guzuly how to apply UK Charity Commission standards. The income is very thin. Two of the three months are overspent. It happened like that in Manningham, where I'm treasurer: we had to rely on our opening balances. But here, at the beginning of the year there was nothing in the tin, and nothing at the Bank. So, they borrowed. We talked about how to account for loans, and then I questioned affording what was spent. In Sudan they pay a lot of incentives: these are encouragements and thanks for hard work. "In that month the incentives are big, quarter of a salary. And where are the salary figures?" "We don't pay salaries; we don't have any money."

Now can you imagine that?

Oh, and if anyone asks about funding we send, every pound is passed through to the projects. Nothing is taken or held back. I've seen it in three Offices.

Posada – A Project for Advent

This year we will again be sending two travelling cribs on a journey around our community during Advent.

Posada is a Spanish word meaning 'inn'. Posada celebrations originated in Mexico where two young people were chosen to dress up as Mary and Joseph. They used to travel from house to house in their village telling people about the imminent arrival of Jesus and asking them if they would give him a room. On Christmas Eve they would re-enact a community play and bring figures of Mary and Joseph to be placed in the crib.



The modern day equivalent is based on this concept, but enables different people to give a home to the nativity figures for a night. Beginning their journey at the 10am service on Advent Sunday (27th November) the figures in the cribs will travel around the parish each day from home to home before arriving back in church at the Crib Service at 4pm on Christmas Eve in time for the first celebration of the birth of Jesus.



Posada has been encouraged in this country by the Church Army and many parishes now enjoy sharing in this special Advent project. We look forward to using Posada to help people celebrate more meaningfully the season of Advent.

Just a Moment

It starts with a change so outwardly insignificant that no-one would notice except the person behind you in the aisle. Just a moment when instead of seeing rows of labels on a supermarket shelf you imagine the people behind them, tilling the earth, sowing the seed, gathering the crops. And you pause, wondering what their names are, where they live, what difference it will makeif your hand picks up this box instead of that, wondering: how do I love these neighbours? Can I help change this child's long journey for water, her mother's lack of health care, the prospect her father faces of another year unable to feed his family well? Just a moment. And the person behind you, her impatient baby squirming in the trolley, may never realise that in that brief hesitation, a life hung in the balance. (from Christian Concern for One World)

This powerful meditation was used as a part of the Crosshills and District Fellowship of Churches' joint service during One World Week. It is a timely reminder that the choices we make always have an effect on someone else. As we see here, what is certainly not a life-changing decision affecting us assumes much bigger dimensions when put alongside the work done by thousands of workers around the world.

Please take time to look in the shops you use, to see if you can make even a small difference. Farnhill Parish Council

- **A meeting of the Council** was held on the 28th September and attended by four members of the Council, a CDC Representative and the Clerk
- **Waste Management** have not been in contact since last month's meeting but they are using a smaller vehicle and wheelie bins are no longer at the bottom of Back Mary Street. The guidance document "Wise" advises that householders should be consulted and that note should be taken of the weather conditions when determining equipment and ways of working. It was agreed to decide at the next meeting if any further response to waste management was needed.
- **There has been another dumping of rubbish** on Bradley Lane. This is at the site of the second CCTV camera the one closest to the boundary with Bradley. Clerk to report the matter to CDC Waste Management & Environmental Health.
- **The Canal & River Trust** are sorry to hear that we are disappointed with their response regarding the condition of the fencing on the Leeds & Liverpool Canal at Farnhill. Their waterway manager would like to meet on site to look into the concerns that we have raised.
- **The external audit** has been satisfactorily completed. Anyone wishing to obtain copies can contact the Clerk.
- **Gary McKinney** was confirmed as the Peggy Wilson Trust Representative Trustee for Farnhill Parish Council for a further term.
- **Recent improvements** to Lower Arbour are appreciated but the new grassed path ends in a couple of steps and a treacherous gravelled section with a ball bearing quality. Cllr M Scarffe will prepare some drawings for another two steps to reduce the gradient and a continuation of the grass.
- **Bradley Lane End** During a site meeting to discuss the dangerous junction, an old lady was seen waiting in the middle of the road for 3 mins to get across. CDC Rep Cllr A Brown reported that a traffic island similar to Cononley Lane End would be a cost effective improvement if not a solution.
- **Farnhill Parish Council election** will take place on the 3rd May. Nomination Forms must be submitted by the 6th April.
- **Rubbish has been reported** in the beck adjacent to Langkirk Close. Clerk to report the issue to the owner of the property plus CDC & the Environment Agency.
- **Kildwick Railway Crossing** was discussed by NYCC Craven Area Committee. Network Rail is developing a centralized signal centre in York in the early 2020's. This could reduce the times the barriers are down at Kildwick, but only by a matter of seconds rather than minutes



The Birds in Your Garden





Goldfinch

As the year draws to an end it is worth having a look back to see how our garden birds have fared. The weather picture nationally was quite varied, with the southeast having some hot, dry periods whilst we, here in Yorkshire, shivered through much of August with temperatures reaching only 12°C on at least one day.

If you can remember that far back, the start of the year was warmer than average after yet another mild winter, though there were storms

around. This makes it all the more surprising that Redwings, Fieldfares, Pied Wagtails and Bullfinches particularly were more apparent in our gardens than usual.

At the other end of the scale, Chaffinch numbers were well down, and indeed have continued downwards since: possibly because they, like our Greenfinches, are being affected by trichomonosis. I hope not, but it does emphasise the need to keep feeders clean to minimise its spread. Blue Tit and Great Tit numbers were also down, which was not unexpected following their poor breeding season in 2016, though having had a good 2017 Blue Tit numbers have subsequently recovered to around normal. Sparrowhawk numbers were also down, possibly because tits are a major part of their prey, or possibly too, because the cold wet weather directly affected the survival of their young last year.

The number of seed eaters reported visiting gardens, birds such as Siskins, Coal Tits, Blackcaps and Bramblings (I should be so lucky!) were down too, suggesting that unlike last year the natural seed crop was good.

Despite a cold spell at its end, March was the fifth warmest since 1910. Hedgehogs were widely seen by the end of the month and there were reports of Brimstone, Comma and Small Tortoiseshell butterflies on the wing, presumably woken early by the warmth. Resident birds that make several breeding attempts per year, Dunnocks, Robins, House Sparrows and Blackbirds, are likely to have benefited from this early start and all being well should have had a productive season. There were even reports of Blackbirds sitting on eggs in February! April, May and June were reasonably dry and saw the return of our summer migrants, many of which were recorded in more gardens than usual. Swallows and House Martins for example, were seen in twice as many gardens as usual, but their overall numbers were down, with the average number seen per garden being lower. The same appeared to be true in the wider countryside too. It's not clear what could have caused this as it was reasonably dry in May: were they perhaps foraging for insects further afield in more gardens, and making use of garden ponds? Were House Martins nesting under more eaves but in lower numbers than usual? The answers are not yet clear but these results have certainly raised some interesting questions.

Goldfinch and Bullfinch numbers continued to increase, and both seem to have enjoyed a good breeding season. The reason for these trends is not obvious, but climate change and continuing changes in farming practice will certainly have had an effect.
